PLAIN FACTS.

The following from the Moro Observer applies to many other localities as well as in Sherman county: "Some people, especially those afflicted with the big-head, growl at the editor because they don't receive the notice in his columns which they think themselves entitled to. Whether they deserve especial notice or have merited extra notoriety or not, they imagine it is the editor's duty to keep them continually before the public. In this they get gloriously left, and justly so. If they raise a big crop they expect him to know all about it by intuition or some other mental process, and if the editor fails to evolve the expected item out of his own inner consciousness they stand back and sulk, or sometimes make complaint to their neighbor of the editor's neglect.

Now, we desire to say right here that unless people will take the trouble to impart such news to us they must be content to remain in that obscurity which comes from not being mentioned in their county paper. We cannot be expected to know when a "domestic occurrence" takes place in a man's family unless he or someone on his behalf informs us thereof. Neither can we be supposed to know that a man has raised the largest crop in the county without being notified of the fact in some way.

The fact of the matter is that some people are chronic fault finders. They begin by expecting the county paper to devote columns of its space to their affairs, and everything mentioned must of course be so worded so as to tickle their appetite for eulogy. Such vain rosters are too shallow to see that a paper filled up with personal boasts for themselves, is of no interest to any of the readers except themselves. Should the editor be so unfortunate as to publish anything not quite in accordance with their wishes or in the shape they expect it to be in, they imagine a slight has been put upon them, and even go so far as to say that it was intentional on the part of the editor. Such people should be made to know that they are but common clay like the rest of the human family, and that when they expect their county paper to shape its journalistic course according to their narrow views, they hug to their bosom the ghastly skeleton of disappointment."

Now that the political campaign is over we crave the privilege of calling attention to the glorious climate of this section. Nature has been behaving herself beautifully of late. The summer drouth was wet down early and at judicious intervals since there has been sufficient moisture to promote farming operations and not enough to impede them. The soil is in admirable working condition, and an enormous acreage is being sown in fall grain. If the next season proves favorable, our farmers will more than make up for the dull season just closed. The roads are yet in excellent condition, and everything invites the farmer to make things snug and cozy for the winter season. There is poetry in all out of doors. The breezes sing a symphony, ripe leaves carpet the lawns and walks and such deciduous trees as still cling to their foliage are vying with each other in blushing and whispering those wondrous tales that only fairies understand.

Just at this time when the United States is embarrassed by the necessity of keeping Chinese laborers out of the country, it is rather a fortunate occurrence for the Chinese that the Brazilian government according to a dispatch sent to the state department by the United States Minister Conger, has just passed an Act for the encouragement of Chinese immigration.

PUT UP THE BARS.

The question of regulating immigration is again being discussed by the leading papers of the country, and this is a pertinent one so soon after the general election, says the Times-Mountaineer. That the privilege of suffrage is too freely granted in this country but few will deny, and that the United States has received and is still receiving an undesirable class of people from foreign countries, will also be endorsed by nearly every citizen. It may be the spirit of our free institutions that this should be the asylum of the oppressed people of all nationalities, and that in this country the poor and the rich, the educated and the ignorant, should be equal before the law; but there are certain classes of society who seem to have no other object in life than to create mischief, and are as undesirable in a republic as in a monarchy. These should not only receive no inducements to come to our shores, but should be debarred from entrance. The gates of Castle Garden should be forever locked to such, and stringent laws should be enacted and enforced to keep them from landing. We do not need any foreign immigration, either good or bad. They are political lepers who spread the contagion of discontent among unsatisfied people, and the evil they attempt to sow is much easier killed in the germ than throttled to destruction after it has matured into active life. Action in this regard cannot be taken too soon to avert the consequences which may follow. And while legislators are saving the nation from the influx of political mischief breeders, the ballot box should be carefully guarded, and none but those who are in harmony with our institutions and can intelligently exercise the privilege, should be granted suffrage. Only honest, industrious and law-abiding citizens should be allowed to vote.

California takes the record this year in everything. Now it is about to beat the political record by having the closest vote on electors of any state in the Union. From present appearances it will not be more than 100 either way. But a miss is as good as a mile.

N. Y. World: The board of trade and transportation at its meeting last week held a lively discussion of the subject of immigration. Jas. H. Seymour introduced a resolution to request congress to consider the desirability of prohibiting immigration for three years. This resolution was adopted. The board also referred to a committee of five on the question of restricting immigration, reciting that a grave question now confronts the people of this country by reason of the promiscuous and unrestricted immigration from other countries.
