THE BANK ROBBERS

Held to Appear in the sum of \$10,000.

A dispatch from Ellensburg Tuesday states that Cal Hale, Tom Kimsey and Geo. Zachary had an examination before the justice there that day. They were identified by Cashier Abernethy, Dr. Lyons and Prof. Jenkins, whom they held up in the bank. Kimsey, who took the money from the safe and bagged it, was identified by each witness. Zachary was positively identified as the man who did the shooting in the alley near the bank. At the conclusion of the examination the outlaws were bound over to the superior court in the sum of \$10,000 each. In default of bonds all went to jail.

The identification of Zachary was a surprise to everybody who met him in Portland. In conversation with a number of persons, he gave a plausible account of himself during the month of September, and three different stories told by him at different times during the day did not vary in the slightest particular. Messrs. Thiel and Sullivan had conclusive evidence of his guilt, but were so impressed with his story that they directed the Ellensburg authorities to release him at once if he could not be identified. Mr. Thiel says Zachary is the most indifferent and coolest man he has ever seen in his long experience with criminals.

Later dispatches say that two more of the suspected bank robbers have been arrested and lodged in jail at Roslyn. These are Willis Zachary and Peter Humphrey, and were caught at the Fort Colville Indian reservation by Sheriff Pugh of Spokane county. Byron Barnard, the last of the gang, is the only one now at large, and they expect to have him in custody within a few days.

The Military Ball.

As predicted by this excellent family paper (which is only \$1 1/2 a year, in advance) the largest crowd that ever attended a ball in this country participated in the grand military ball given at Condon Thursday night, 125 numbers being sold. The floor was in excellent condition, and the immense building was crowded to its utmost, there being over 600 people in the hall the fore part of the evening. All agree that it was the best-managed and most enjoyable event of the kind ever given in this portion of the country. Several distinguished visitors from a distance were present, among them being Adjutant S. Collins of Arlington and Capt. B. Gaffney of E. Co.

Excellent music was furnished for the occasion by Messrs. Ellbridge M. Clymer, Geo. Knox and E. A. Freed. The supper gotten up by Mrs. Maddock at the hotel was one of the grandest and most tastily-arranged ever enjoyed in the county. The only unfortunate occurrence of the evening was the stealing of about a half-dozen good hats from the hall. The thieves are "spotted," however, and they will be heard from again before long.

During the day there was an interesting shooting contest. In the free-for-all contest for the military men, Ed McKinney won 1st prize, with a score of 19; S. S. Grider and A. S. Rice tied for 2d place with 18; and B. K. Seary and Col. Lucas tied with 17.

A portion of the report by the grand jury of Grant county last week says: "We have returned a large number of not true bills, for the reason that there was not sufficient evidence upon which to find an indictment; and we must condemn the practice of arresting and binding parties over to await the action of the grand jury, without sufficient cause or the probability of an indictment being returned."

Pat Skelly has purchased the lot on the corner just south of the new Armory hall, and says he expects to build a fine hotel thereon in early spring. Pat has lots of money, and he says he will fit up the hotel in magnificent style, regardless of expense. It is to have all the modern improvements, also a fine bar in connection. He says the building will cost about \$4,000. Mont Downing sold this lot to Bill Thurnague Saturday morning for \$65, and within five hours Pat bought it for \$95.

The State Military Board concluded its business at Portland Friday. After considering the matter it was decided to not hold an encampment next year, for the reason that there are no funds available and not likely to be for some time; at least not until the pending tax litigation between Multnomah, Lane and other counties against the state is finally decided. From the first funds that become available, it is the intention to secure new uniforms and other equipments for the entire national guard. Provision was made for the formation of a naval battalion without increasing the national guard of the state beyond 33 companies.
