OFF FOR A REST.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—President-elect Cleveland has left town for a much-needed rest, presumably for the South, where he will remain until March 4th. Since the election Mr. Cleveland has been overrun with callers, and the volume of his correspondence has been something enormous. His appearance indicates to some extent the fatigue consequent upon his labors and the confinement to which he has been subjected. In speaking today of the absolute necessity of relief from the annoyances and exactions which are his daily lot at home, he said:

"I have been amazed and exceedingly gratified by the thousands of letters of congratulation which I have received since election from the American people of every station in life and from every quarter of the land. It has been utterly impossible, however, for me to read even the letters of that description which I have received with the other interruptions, which have thus far seemed unavoidable. I fully appreciate, however, the good will and friendliness which these letters indicate, and shall not omit, as time allows, to read every one of them. These good friends of course will not expect any replies to their communications, for that would be out of the question, and the most that I can do is to say, through the press that I am not unmindful of their kindness.

Many of the callers whom I have been obliged to receive would not, I think, have encroached upon my time if they had given the matter a moment's reflection. Those who have called to talk about offices, it seems to me, have been a little inconsiderate and certainly unnecessary premature. I desire to give as much publicity as possible to the statement that I do not propose to consider applications for office prior to my inauguration, and I shall avoid all interviews upon that subject. Those who, under any pretense, gain an opportunity to present their applications orally, and those who burden me at this time with written applications, cannot possibly do anything which would so interfere with their chances of success. Written applications will be so little regarded that I doubt if they ever see the files at Washington, for there is no reason or decency in my being overwhelmed with such matters at this time."

Good, plain English was spoken by Mr. Cleveland, and he did not hesitate to emphasize the fact that he had been chosen by the people, not by the politicians. "I am under no obligations to Tammany Hall or any other organization for my election," he said, "and I do not propose to be dictated to by anybody. Now that I am president it is my intention to be the head of this nation in reality, and I will not permit any dictation as to my future actions."

An exchange says that it is a matter of congratulation that the election has been so decisive as to leave no room for disputes; also that it is to be decided by the electoral college. While the election of president by the house and vice president by the senate would have been perfectly legal in the event of a failure of either candidate to receive a majority of the electoral college, conservative men regard it as dangerous; and long ago the prediction was made that if this government ever falls, its fall will be brought about by that very proceeding.

Time brings its revenges. On the 4th of March next, one Adlai E. Stevenson will, as vice president of the United States, preside over a senate which refused to confirm his appointment as one of the justices of the supreme bench of the District of Columbia.

WILL TRY NEGRO LABOR.

There is a little tide of negro immigration into California. It comes from Tennessee, Alabama and Kansas. The first party has arrived at Stockton and been distributed throughout the country. This may be a successful scheme, and help to solve the labor problem in California. Thousands of Chinamen have been employed year after year there by farmers, large land owners, raisin growers and corporations, because it was claimed that they were the only class that could stand the excessive heat. No white man could endure the labor under such conditions of climate.

The necessary employment of the Mongolians in such work has naturally made them numerous in California, until they are in everything and are constantly getting in the way of a higher class of wage-earners. Negroes are not warred against by labor organizations, and down South they belong to them. Wherever a negro can secure work, a white man makes no complaint, because colored labor is recognized all over the country. If the negroes, then, come to California they will tend to crowd out the Chinamen, because they can stand the severest work under the hot sun, and at the same time in spreading into other kinds of labor will not excite the enmity of organized labor. While Chinamen spend little money here; are not citizens, and are only thinking of the day when they can return to China, the colored men spend their wages, to the usual extent, are citizens, have families, and are permanent residents. California's experiment will be watched closely on account of its possible developments effecting the Chinese question.

Many people who read about the Chinese "Six Companies" do not understand just what they are. They are, in fact, seven "companies," but are not companies at all in the usually accepted sense of the word—money-making institutions. The head of the 7th and largest institution is a representative of the emperor, and the six minor organizations are merely his helpers. It requires this leading spirit and his cabinet, with six wise Chinamen as heads, to watch the Chinese interests in this country. Chinese news reaches all Chinamen in America through these seven representatives. All American news of interest to Chinamen is disseminated through the same channel. Railroad maps, books, clothing, wives, coffins and return tickets for corpses—in fact everything that a Chinaman in America needs—comes to him from headquarters. It is little wonder, therefore, that the "Six Companies" are powerful with their people.

A painful rumor recently arose that England had pardoned a criminal on condition that he at once leave for America. This country, noting with emotion the distinction thus implied, sent a deputation to the wharf to receive the ex-prisoner. The question of allowing him to land is now under advisement. The claim is made in behalf of the individual that he is merely a political offender. His political offense consisted of his killing a man who belonged to the other party, a circumstance that almost seemed worth consideration.

Saturday's Portland Dispatch: "From the account we published yesterday over the signature of the sheriff of Gilliam county, it is very clear that 'Detective' Sullivan has again put his foot in it and arrested men who had nothing to do with the Roslyn robbery. That fellow is a grand fraud as a detective and he'll get his head taken off some day for arresting innocent men."
