VALUABLE ADVICE.

The Fossil paper last week again "slopped over" with abuse, advice, etc. for our county court, for which the court is duly thankful, no doubt. Such advice will prove very valuable to them indeed, as it comes from such reliable authority. And the fact of its being of such raw, foreign origin ought to make it all the more valuable to the court. It's a good deal like a gentleman was heard to remark after wading through the Journal's effusion: "If our free American laws are not framed to suit the raw greenhorn, why don't the bigotted calf go back to where he came from?" etc.

All the honest taxpayers and "bona fide citizens" thoroughly appreciate the careful and economical manner in which the county's finances are managed by the court, and little does it matter to them how much the Journal bellows.

The Journal, as usual, also misrepresented the grand jury's report concerning the county well. The report of the late grand jury on this subject was:

"We recommend the sinking of the county well deeper, and think that plenty of water can be found within a few feet of the bottom of said well."

Notwithstanding the fact that about half the Journal's patronage is from the business men of Condon, its bumptious publisher never misses an opportunity to stab the town, through pure, unadulterated envy and jealousy of Condon's rapid advancement and prosperity. This is a very selfish, narrow-minded spirit, and which the good people of Fossil do not approve of. Probably the best thing they could do for their town, should the Journal continue to encourage such a little, jealous spirit, would be to "squell" the paper, which for the past two years has been more of an injury than a benefit to the town, anyway.

On the contrary, Condon does not entertain any such selfish feeling against any of her sister towns, but is anxious and always pleased to see every town and community prosper while we are enjoying such brilliant success ourselves. This accounts for Condon's widespread popularity.

Edwin Hahn, the hack-driver who made such a vicious attempt to kill Sadie Quiner (formerly of Arlington) on the night of September 30th, at her home in Portland, was found guilty by the jury in his case, although the young lady, strange as it may seem, tried her utmost to prove him innocent of the crime. Hahn appeared surprised at the verdict, though it recommended him to the mercy of the court. Evidently he expected that Miss Quiner's statement that he was not the man who assaulted her would be believed by the jury, and that the prayers she offered up in the clerk's private office for the safety of the defendant would have some weight in his favor; but in this he was mistaken. The evidence was overwhelming. Saturday morning Hahn was arraigned and, without any preliminary lecture or moralizing talks, Judge Bradshaw sentenced him to two years in the penitentiary, to which institution of learning (trades) he was taken the same evening.

The secretary of war has accepted the bid of Messrs. J. G. and I. N. Day of San Francisco for completing the canal and locks at the Cascades of the Columbia. It now only remains for the successful bidders to file satisfactory bonds and begin operations.

A shaft has been run into a subterranean fire at Webb City, Mo., in the zinc mining region. The hole is 164 feet deep and has been growing hotter since a depth of 20 feet was reached. It had to be abandoned, as the flames burst through the various shafts.

The Grants Pass Courier truthfully says: "Every time a legislature meets it is pestered by some little faction of ambitious office-seekers who wish to cut off some portion of a county in order to create a new set of county officers, the projectors of course expecting to 'stand in.' As the complement of state senators is full, according to the state constitution, any new counties cut off in future must slice up their senatorial representation. But there are counties enough now. There is no sense in splitting up every few townships into a new county just to please a few narrow-minded office-seekers. Of course the next session of the legislature will have to be bored by these propositions from various parts of the state, but it is not likely the schemers will succeed. All fair-minded citizens who have the state's best interests at heart will agree that our population is even yet too sparse for proper support of the counties now in organization. There should be a marked increase in our population and wealth before we cut off any more counties in Oregon."

The election is over, and now is the appropriate time to advocate laws restricting immigration. Before election it might injure either party to make an onslaught on the foreign element in our population; but now that the ballots have been counted it can do no injury. It is, perhaps, a fact that great good would result to the country by closing the gates to the undesirable classes; but it would accomplish greater good to pass laws to regulate the elective franchise. There are too many ignorant voters in the country, and if these were debarred from the privilege of electors, their power of making mischief would be greatly curtailed.

Even an unpretentious comet has a mission to perform on earth. A Kansas farmer upon hearing of the trouble to come on account of the late comet, prepared himself for death. He paid up all his debts, many of which had been standing for years, and some of which were outlawed. He went to the Presbyterian church, confessed his sins, joined the church, and spent the day and night in fasting and praying. He had long been known as a hard character and financial dead beat. Oh, that a comet—or anything else—would have a similar effect upon some of the dead beats in this section.

A new form of field for base ball is being seriously contemplated. It will have an extra base, in order to make base running oftener and more exciting. The distances will be home to 1st, and 4th to home, 90 feet, as now; 1st to 2d, 2d to 3d, and 3d to 4th, 70 feet. Under this arrangement the runner will have less distance to run between the bases, and the catcher a less distance by 8 to 10 feet to throw to 2d and 3d base, and without any player intervening. This will do away with shortstop, requiring the same number of men as now.

Baker City, La Grande, Pendleton and Union are the commercial centers of three counties which possess a gross valuation of over \$12,000,000, and have a population of over 50,000. This is a good showing for a country that eight years ago was described in a much-used geography as "a land of which far the greater part is a desert covered with sage and sand."

The roads of Oregon should be improved by convict labor, and the next legislature should enact laws that these criminals who are fed at the expense of the state should be put where they would do the most good.

The official vote shows that G. Cleveland carried California by a majority of 390. The republican majority in that state four years ago was about 10,000.
