Grange Resolutions.

The following resolutions were adopted by the Gilliam County Council at Fossil, Oregon, on Jan. 7, 1893:

Resolved that the Franking System be abolished, and instead thereof the Congressional Record be sent to every postoffice and posted in a conspicuous place for the benefit of the public.

We are opposed to appropriating any more money for the Oregon Militia, and recommend that they be disbanded.

We ask that our laws be so amended as to allow women the privilege of signing petitions for liquor license, also remonstrances against the same.

We are in favor of free and unlimited coinage of silver, and the election of U. S. senators by a direct vote of the people.
