Passed Off Quietly and Resulted in the Election of the Following Ticket:

MAYOR—George Tatom.
COUNCILMEN—John Maddock, S. P. Shutt, J. H. Downing and D. M. Rinehart.
RECORDER—H. N. Frazer.
TREASURER—G. W. Rinehart.

Following is the official vote and count of each candidate:

For Mayor—Geo. Tatom, 32; L. W. Darling, 14.

For Councilmen—John Maddock, 29; S. P. Shutt, 20; J. H. Downing, 26; A. Henshaw and D. M. Rinehart tied with 22 each; W. L. Barker, 20; J. W. Barr, 18; Geo. Knox, 17.

In the contest to decide the tie between Henshaw and Rinehart, the latter drew the lucky ticket and was elected.

For Recorder—H. N. Frazer, 31; J. R. Clark, 15.

For Treasurer—G. W. Rinehart, 23; H. B. Hendricks, 18; G. W. Mackey, 6. There are more legal voters at Condon than we were aware of. Forty-six legal votes were cast and four more were absent. Besides these, there are more than a dozen of our male inhabitants, over age, who were not entitled to a vote at the city election.

A meeting of the council has been called for Monday evening to appoint a marshal and transact other important business. Within a few months our bustling little city is expected to have a decided improvement in appearance—new sidewalks, graded streets, clean barn-yards, etc.

The newly-elected officers fully realize the great responsibility that has been placed upon their shoulders, and they will no doubt all fulfill their respective duties in such a manner as to leave no room for regret or disappointment from the citizens who have placed the welfare of the city in their hands.

Rev. Delos Howells a Bigamist.

The following which appeared in the last issue of the Hood River Glacier will be interesting news to the people of this place, as the parties in question are well known here, having resided at Condon during the year 1891:

"Hood River has a case calling for condemnation and pity. The former for a weak man, the latter for an injured woman. The Rev. Delos Howells is the man, his wife the woman. We knew of the matter five weeks ago, but refrained from giving it publicity, but since it has become common property we append a brief review of the matter, to put it in its proper light.

The story Mr. Howells tells is this: He left a wife and family in Nebraska in 1886 and went to California. There he heard that his wife had secured a divorce from him. Believing this story, he proposed marriage to the lady who passed for his wife here, and was married to her at Cottonwood, Cal., in 1887. Last fall while in Ferndale, Washington, he met an old neighbor from Nebraska, and through his family writing to Mr. Howells' folks in Nebraska, he learned that his information concerning his wife having been divorced from him was false, and that in fact no divorce had been procured.

In January of this year he first stated the subject to the woman he had so deeply wronged. To her it was a thunderbolt had fallen, but she bravely did what duty required of her—separate from the man she had called her husband.

As we have stated, the above is his story, and his alone; but whether true or not, it is sadly so, in the one particular that Mr. Howells had a wife living whose rights were prior to those of the brave little woman here who was so honestly and earnestly assisting him in building up a home. To her he had always represented that his first wife was dead, and the statement that she was not only alive, but still the legal wife of Mr. Howells, was the first indication Mrs. Howells had that the oft repeated death-bed scene invented by him was false. It is a blow to her from which she will never recover, and yet no shadow of blame can attach to her in the matter.

Mrs. Howells has both the sympathy and respect of all those who know her. Mr. Howells will probably not be seen here again, and his sphere of usefulness in the pulpit has suddenly become very much circumscribed. Since the woman he has so deeply wronged can find words of palliation for his conduct, the Glacier refrains from expressing an opinion, which would certainly not be flattering to the subject of this article."

The Times-Mountaineer, commenting upon the above, says: "The innocent victims of this man's villainy are to be pitied, and should receive the sympathy of all fair-minded people; but the perpetrator of the wrong should receive the severest condemnation."
