Circuit court is in session at Condon this week, and the towns full of people. A great many have come in to hear the lawyers "spout" in the criminal cases, which is always interesting—and sometimes proves very interesting to the defendants.

Owing to circuit court being in session, only one Dem. delegate to the state convention can get away—H. Clay Myers, the other three—W. L. Wilcox, S. P. Shutt and J. H. Downing, sending their proxies by Mr. Myers, who will leave Sunday for Astoria.

The entertainment and basket social Monday night was a decided success, socially and financially. Twenty-nine baskets were sold at 50c each, and one cake, baked by Mrs. W. S. Myers, sold for \$5.50. Over \$21 was realized, which will go to the church.

Some public speaking was done in the hall Tuesday evening on the political issues of the day, which was listened to by a large audience. Atty. F. Clarno of Portland made a brilliant speech, which was followed by a few remarks by H. C. Myers, B. K. Searcy and I. A. Henderson.

DEMOCRATS CONVENE

And Nominate the Following Ticket:

For Representative—H. Clay Myers, of Blalock. For County Judge—Geo. W. Rinehart, of Condon. For County Clerk—Mont R. Downing, of Condon. For Sheriff—W. L. Wilcox, of Condon. For Treasurer—Clarence A. Shurte, of Arlington. For Commissioner—Wm. J. Dyer, of Mayville. For Assessor—Henry J. Nott, of Olex. For School Supt.—Chas. Royle, of Idea. For Surveyor—No Nomination. For Coroner—D. S. Brown, of Condon.

The democratic county convention was held at Condon Saturday, 37 delegates being entitled to seats in the convention. All were present except four or five who sent their proxies.

Most of the delegates came to town on Friday afternoon, and in the evening they held a caucus meeting in the hall. As all the delegates were not present it was decided to meet again in caucus at 10 o'clock next morning, which lasted until noon. After the usual preliminaries and button-holing, the convention was called to order at about 2 o'clock, by Hon. T. B. Hoover, chairman of the Dem. Co. Cen. Com., who was elected temporary chairman, and Charley Shurte secretary. The chairman at once appointed committees as follows:

On credentials: A Greiner, H J Nott and Alex Crawford.

On order of business: Val Wheeler, H C Myers and Geo Schott.

Upon report of these committees, permanent organization was had by electing H Clay Myers chairman and S P Shutt secretary, assistant secretary, Ira B Carter.

The report of the committee on credentials adjudged the following persons entitled to seats in the convention: Condon—D S Brown, S P Shutt, Val Wheeler, John Maddock.

Mayville—A Greiner, C L Lillie, I B Carter, Wm Taylor.

Fossil—T B Hoover, Thompson Seogin, Jas Seogin, A C Herndon, M Scott. Rock Creek—Josephus Martin, H J Nott, Geo S Smith.

Arlington—L C Edwards, Chas Shurte, J H Wood, J W Redford.

Blalock—H C Myers, C M Walker. Ferry Canyon—Bert Cason, Thos Young, Geo Schott.

Trail Fork—J F Coney, Jno Gross. Matney—G Schilling, P Parton.

Lone Rock—D C Andrews, Alex Crawford.

Contention—J H Parsons, Ed F Horn. Idea—W M Pierce, Chas Royle.

Crown Rock—G J Caven, Geo Bowley. Chairman Myers appointed as tellers, Val Wheeler and Chas. Royle.

The convention then proceeded to nominate a ticket, beginning with representative. H. Clay Myers being the unanimous choice of the convention for this important office, he received the nomination by acclamation, with much enthusiasm.

The next order of business was the nomination by acclamation of Geo. W. Rinehart for county judge.

The nomination for county clerk was next in order. L. W. Darling was placed in nomination, and in less time than it takes to tell it, he was declared the nominee by acclamation. Mr. Darling's business interests being such that he could not attend to the duties of clerk if elected, in a neat little speech, declined to accept the honor. The central committee subsequently induced Mont Downing to fill the vacant place on the ticket.

Next in order was the nomination for sheriff, W. L. Wilcox receiving this by acclamation, amid the wildest enthusiasm.

Clarence A. Shurte of Arlington received the nomination for county treasurer by acclamation.

The names of Wm. F. Dyer and D. B. Trimble were placed in nomination for commissioner. The ballot resulted in Dyer receiving 24 and Trimble 12 votes. Mr. Dyer was declared the nominee.

The next order of business was the nomination of Henry J Nott for assessor, by acclamation.

The names of J. A. McMorris and Chas. Royle were placed in nomination for school Supt. Mr. McMorris, in a fitting speech, withdrew from the race and it was given to Mr. Royle by acclamation.

There being no candidates for the office of surveyor, it was decided to let this part of the ticket remain vacant for the present.

D. S. Brown was the unanimous choice of the convention for coroner. In response, Mr. Brown made a very brilliant speech, saying that there are only two offices he would accept—those of president and coroner—and as the former is already occupied, he would accept the coronership.

W. L. Wilcox, S P Shutt, J H Downing and H Clay Myers were elected delegates to the state convention, which meets at Astoria next Tuesday, 17th.

The next order of business was the naming of precinct nominees by each respective delegation, as follows: Condon—S P Shutt for J. P.; D. M. Rinehart for constable.

Mayville—No nominations. Fossil—No nominations. Rock Creek—J L Garlinger for J. P.; E D Huber for constable.

Arlington—No nominations. Blalock—No nominations. Trail Fork—No nominations. Matney—No nominations.

Lone Rock—Morgan Ward for J. P.; Andy Sprowles for constable. Idea—W M Pierce for J. P.; J W Serviner for constable.

Crown Rock—No nominations. On motion the choice of central committee was ratified by the convention, and after electing A. Greiner chairman of Dem. Co. Cen. Com. the convention adjourned.

The Populist Convention.

The populists of Gilliam county held their first convention last Saturday in Pix's hall at Condon. In all, 35 delegates were entitled to seats in the convention, nearly all being present.

The convention was called to order at 10 o'clock by J E Coleman, chairman. F B Moore was elected secretary, and the convention proceeded to nominate a full ticket, resulting as follows, B K Searcy and Morgan Ward acting as tellers:

For representative—I A Henderson, of Mayville, by acclamation. For county judge—G W Marvel, of Olex, by acclamation.

For county clerk—F B Moore, of Mayville, by acclamation. For sheriff—Jos T Anthony, of Fossil, by acclamation.

For treasurer—J R Clark, of Condon, by acclamation. For Commissioner—Morgan Ward, of Lone Rock, by acclamation.

For school Supt—Miss Bessie Fitzwater, of Condon, by acclamation. For assessor—Henry Wilkins, of Olex. J M Curl's name was also placed in nomination, but he withdrew from the race, and it was given to Mr. Wilkins by acclamation.

For surveyor—Chas. Fix, of Condon, by acclamation. For coroner—Geo. Washington Crawford, of Lone Rock, by acclamation.

All grain growing upon low ground is ruined. We learn that the settlers further down the river have been damaged even more than the people of this section, J. E. David and Joe Sanders being among the heaviest losers.

This is the season of spring and already in this glorious climate the fruit trees are laden with blossoms whose scented perfumes are wafted with every gentle breeze. No northern blast subdues this promised land, perennial spring reigns supreme and it is here the fatted calf rambles in contentment.
