

Though there may be some discontent over the reduction of wages on the O. R. & N., it is only natural. Men do not like to work for less than they consider themselves worth, which is a world wide trait. Still, the company has not paid expenses during the past year. Receipts have always been smaller than expenditures. Bonds, or rather receiver's certificates, must be placed in order to meet past obligations and prepare for future ones. A road cannot continue borrowing forever. As a temporary measure, with bright prospects ahead, it will do, but a railway business is, though larger, similar to other business. If it does not pay and will not pay, it must stop. Business without money is like a man without blood—impossible. Likely, some of our long haired and longer tongued anarchists will screech out something about the grasping Rothschilds, choking to death the workmen of the West. Some people have peculiar methods for reaching conclusions without an investigation into facts. How would some of them like to see the trains stop suddenly or run once a week through a lack of funds? That is a predicament that does not occur to all of them. But any person who cares enough about the matter may learn that the O. R. & N. has not paid expenses for several years. However, Receiver McNeill is an able railway manager and with good times and no dictation he will make the road pay.

The congressional agony is over at last, congress having adjourned Tuesday last. Thus the first session of the fifty-third congress has passed into history, and a memorable chapter it will make in our national annals. Since this congress first assembled the nation has gone through experiences such as we have never had, and hope never to see again. Yet we cannot blame congress for being the originator of these troubles. Possibly their origin was beyond the control of congress, yet it must be admitted that this congress did not manifest its ability to help the country in a time of distress. It was the most incapable and the most inconsistent congress in the history of our government, and will chiefly be remembered for its incapacity when statesmanship and patriotism were most demanded. Its next session will be a short one, for which we are profoundly grateful.

The success of Japan in the war in the old East would mean a great advance in modern ideas and civilization—in the progress of the world. The success of China would mean rather a retrograde movement, a victory of the mossbacks of the Orient, who want to do things like they were done thousands of years ago. All enlightened nations, therefore, hope for the success of the progressive Mikado's forces.—Statesman. Our sympathy is with both sides. China and Japan cannot whip one another too much, too hard or too long to suit our friends with produce to sell.

Hereafter men with big incomes will be called on to pay something toward the government which "protects" them in their prosperity. The citizen who has a net income of upwards of \$5000 a year should be more than willing to pay a direct federal tax, and it is no more than fair to collect it from him. We venture the assertion that not one thousand people in Condon will be effected by this income tax.

A pointed illustration of the Korean war in an Eastern paper shows a figure representing Corea astride the middle of a large fire-cracker which is sizzling at both ends, one of which is marked China and the other Japan. Whichever wins Corea will be devastated, her people starved and murdered, with no recourse or ability to prevent her soil being made the battle-field of contending foreign nations.

It was Napoleon Bonaparte who said it would be a sad day for Europe when she taught the Chinese the art of war. She will learn something of the art, no doubt, in the present engagement.

The next session of congress will be a short one, only lasting from December until March, but it promises to be a lively one. The elections will be over and the members will be freer to act on individual judgment and conviction. Tariff legislation will be out of the way and congress will no longer have an excuse to defer action on the financial question. It is absolutely certain that there will be another fight over a free-coinage measure, and it is going to be a vigorous engagement. We notice that most of the Southern congressmen who are candidates for re-election promise their constituents that the silver question shall have right of way in the next session. If the money stringency keeps up, as it is most apt to do, until December, there will be an outside pressure on congress for financial relief. Nor will it be confined to any one section, although the pressure will be strongest from the South and West. But there has been a rapid growth of silver sentiment in New England and in the Middle states, and it is taking deep root. Unless the democrats get in and pass a free-coinage bill before the close of the fifty-third congress, the republicans will have a monopoly of that issue in the next presidential election, and will carry all the silver-producing states. It will be a curious transformation to see the republicans in the field two years hence as the champions of tariff reform and free coinage, but that is what we are liable to see. The republicans have a cute way of profiting by democratic mistakes.—Telegram.

Postmaster-General Bissell has issued an order modifying the postal laws and regulations so as to admit to the mails alive an insect known as the "Australian Lady Bird." The reason given for this action is that "this insect has been introduced into this country from Australia by fruitgrowers for the purpose of clearing scale insects from the fruit trees, and it is reported has proved a very effective remedy for that great scourge to fruit trees."

The man who lives in Oregon, where he is absolutely certain to reap whatever he plants, is exceedingly fortunate. The owner of any five acres in this country, if he put it in cultivation, is richer and surer of an income to support his home, than the owner of any 160 acres of land in the entire Mississippi valley.—D. H. Stearns in Evening Telegram.

The first thing the legislature should do next winter is to pass a bill increasing the salary of the assessor. The office is really the most important one in the county and the hardest to fill. Its duties are disagreeable, and its work difficult. The assessor should be paid as much or more than the clerk or sheriff.—Ex.
