THE EVILS OF QUACKERY.

Another serious obstacle to legitimate income is the quack medicine trade. Quackery is medical practice commercialized, and therefore prostituted. It thrives because the victims are in the majority and are easily reached by lying advertisements. "What is the proportion of sensible people in this crowd?" asked a patent medicine man of a physician. "About one in ten," was the answer. "I take the nine and leave one to you," said the quack. This represents the majority which help to make the quack rich. The nostrums cost almost nothing, but the capital is used in advertising; in making pictures of the idiots and feeble-minded who imagine themselves cured; in placarding fences; in defacing scenery; in publishing manufactured certificates; in ridiculing scientific medicine; in alarming the credulous; in claiming false discoveries; and in vaunting impossible results. But these are the men who make the money. Medicine to them is the nickel-in-the-slot machine. The diagnosis is ready-made to suit every need, and even otherwise sensible people are being educated into quackery, and into the belief that every man can be his own doctor and not have a fool for a patient.—Dr. Geo. F. Shady, in the September Forum.

There is much sound sense in the following, which we clip from the Northwestern Printer, published at St. Paul, Minn.: "The publishers of North Dakota have taken a decidedly sensible action in refusing to boom political candidates for the sake of their 'hope of the hereafter.' With them the candidates must pay for what they get, or not get it. Similar action should be taken by the publishers in every state in the Union. There is no sense, and less business in a newspaper publisher spending his time and money in booming every Tom, Dick or Harry who may want an office."

The newspaper proprietor labors at a disadvantage in a time of money stringency as compared with a manufacturer. The latter can shut down his mill, but the newspaper publisher never finds a time when he can shut down his plant and lay off his employees until he has to do so for good. The newspaper must be turned out regularly and the expenses continue right on just the same in dull times as when business is booming. Any retrenchment of the reading matter will immediately bring a protest from the subscribers, yet many of these subscribers fail to think of paying their bills.

The situation has changed wonderfully in the last twenty years. Then the United States army was located in the West to keep down the wild and woolly savages. Now the army is ordered East, to keep down the savages of the East. By a recent order the main body of troops will be located at New York, Chicago and other large cities. The Indian has passed away but the anarchist fills his place to overflowing.

In placing the records in the vault in the clerk's office many old documents are brought to light, some bearing date as early as 1854. The Salary Law.

The Albany Herald says: Messrs. Kelly and Curl, attorneys for Horace Farwell of this city, have brought suit which will be a test case to try the legality of the salary law of county officials. The suit is brought against County Clerk Needham to compel him to file the complaint and necessary papers in a civil suit without exacting of the plaintiff the fees in advance as required by the new law. It is claimed the new law can be shown to be null and the action is brought to bring the matter to trial. Judge Burnett has issued an order for an alternative mandamus, and the case will be heard at the October term of court. The case will probably go to the supreme court for final determination. If the new law is declared null and void and the old law is restored, the clerks and sheriffs in the various counties under the old fee system would receive more than under the new law.

The Klamath Falls Express says: County Clerk Leavitt is going to test the salary law enacted by the last legislature, and the result will be of interest to every county in the state. He collected \$57.75 for fees during July and August and declined to pay the same over to the treasurer, claiming he was entitled to the fees, whereupon the court refused to allow him his salary. The matter will be carried to the supreme court.

A Reform.

As this seems to be an age of reforms, a physician suggests a reform in the laws governing that profession, which he thinks will be beneficial to both patient and physician. It is proposed to reduce the doctor's charges just one-half. At present the charges are \$1.00 per mile for visits to country patients; this will be reduced to 50 cents per mile, with no charges for return. Other charges are to be reduced in like proportion. City visits from \$2.50 to \$1.50; prescriptions from \$2.00 to \$1.00; midwifery from \$20 to \$10. This amount if paid in every instance would be fully as much, if not more than what the physician actually receives under the present system. In this connection it is proposed to compel the physician to respond to all calls whenever possible, no excuse being accepted other than sickness or professional business demanding his presence elsewhere. This would give the poor the same advantages of medical aid as the rich enjoy.

But, of course, under such a reduction as this some provisions would have to be made for the collection of the bill. The plan for this is as follows: The patient is responsible for the payment of the bill inside of 90 days from the time the medical service is rendered, but if the patient is unable to pay, let him go before an officer and make affidavit to the fact, and present the same to the county court. Upon receipt of this affidavit the county pays the bill and holds the affidavit as a judgment for a certain number of years. If during that time the patient does not get able to pay the bill, it shall outlaw.
