

HILL FOR GOVERNOR.

David Bennett Hill has been nominated by the democracy of New York for the governorship. It had been expected that Mr. Whitney would be named for the place, and as a matter of fact he was, but he peremptorily declined. Hill did not seek the office, nor did he desire the nomination; but the convention being denied by Whitney went to him unanimously, and would not accept any refusal. Hill is forced into the fight, and it is safe to say that he will make the fight of his life. His future depends on the result of this battle, for if he wins it he will be the democratic candidate for president as sure as the sun rises. He has several times demonstrated his ability to carry the state, and should he again do so, the nomination for the presidency is his. This is the natural logic of events.

The result will be a battle royal. It will draw into it the entire strength of the national parties, and in New York will be concentrated the force of both parties. David Bennett Hill has never been downed, and if he is not whipped in New York now, with the country in arms against the Havemeyer bill and the income tax, then indeed is he invincible.—The Dallas Chronicle.

The Eugene Guard says: The republican candidate for governor of New York, Levi P. Morton, ex-vice president, was nominated on account of his money, and to prevent the nomination of a presidential possibility. Hill is a poor man. It will be a contest of brains against money.

The latest news from China is decidedly interesting. The Chinese troops at Wiju are said to have mutinied. The army is lacking in two things, one is patriotism and the other ammunition. At Wiju the troops mutinied and threw away their arms, because they had no ammunition. Peking is said to be in a state of panic, the mention of the Japanese being sufficient to make the whole city tremble. The Japs on the contrary are full of fight and enthusiasm, and that they will march on Peking is a certain fact. China is already whipped, her armies are demoralized and her people in a state of terror. The next month will show great things in the Chinese empire. Japanese occupation of China is now assured. But what will Japan do with the vanquished country after she gets it? Possibly the Japanese government has given this question but little consideration. Will Japan be satisfied with a war indemnity, or will she reduce the Chinese empire to a condition of colonial dependency? China will be hers by right of conquest, and she can dispose of it according to her own interests. It would be better for civilization if China should be forever subjected to Japanese authority, and we hope that it will result that way.

It is not easy for the outside world to understand that the position of China toward foreigners is one of philosophical condescension, and that nothing could be more genuine than the Chinese sense of mental superiority in dealing with human affairs, says the St. Louis Globe-Democrat. During one of the controversies between this country and China about immigration a Chinese editor put the case in this way: "We must remember that we are the oldest nation and that America is one of the youngest. We who have been so favored as to inherit a high civilization from our wise rulers of antiquity and have been blessed with the sublime teachings of our great sages, ought to be patient with the excited caprices of a nation in its unthinking childhood. If we maintain a calm attitude and do not allow ourselves to get angry over the pranks of a young country, why, in course of time America will change and grow wiser and abandon her present foolish conduct. Nations learn by experience, just as children do, and we ought to maintain our dignity and wait in patience while America advances to a state of maturity and learns to manage things in a proper and judicious way."

The new election law of California prohibits a candidate from "treating" in a saloon or furnishing any kind of refreshments or articles with the object of influencing votes. Such a statute should be enacted in every state, as it would do much to relieve a candidate from the observance of an expensive and useless custom, and one which is of no benefit to the morals of the people.—Ex.

In the present house the democrats control the delegations from 26 states, the republicans from 14 and the populists control three states and hold the balance of power in one—Nebraska. Now, the question that is bothering the politicians is what changes will be made in the state delegations by the coming congressional elections. The elections that have been held have not thrown much light upon the subject, for nobody really expected Alabama or Arkansas to go any other way than democratic, or Oregon, Vermont and Maine to go any other way than republican. To control a majority of the state delegations in the next house the republicans will have to hold the 14 they now have and to add 9. The democrats cannot lose more than three of the states they now have without dropping into the minority, and as the states they now control include New York, Illinois, Ohio, Wisconsin, Wyoming, Rhode Island, Connecticut, Delaware and New Jersey, the chances for losing are altogether too numerous to please members of that party.

The Astoria Budget says: One of the advantages of the new salary system for county officials is shown in the result of the findings of the grand jury. Up to Saturday night the grand jury had reported true bills or indictment against nine persons, six of whom on being arraigned pleaded "guilty," a thing never before heard of in the history of Clatsop county. Under the old law there was some object for the sheriff and the clerk to induce the prisoners to plead "not guilty," and stand trial in order that said officials might get the fees for issuing subpoenas and the mileage for serving them. But now it is different, the officials get no extra pay for serving these papers and have no motive for using their influence in that direction, but are at liberty to induce the accused, in cases where the evidence is so strong as to insure conviction, to plead guilty, and thus the county is saved thousands of dollars of unnecessary expense.

While the democratic and republican managers are fighting for a majority of members in the next house, either would gladly let the other side have a majority, if thereby they could retain for their own party the control of a majority of the state delegations in the house. The house may not be called upon to elect the next president, but then again it may—many think the indications point that way—and if it should the prize will belong to the party that can control the votes of 23 states in the house, as Arizona and New Mexico will not probably get representation in congress early enough to be considered in this business.

The income tax on personal incomes is a tax of 2 per cent on all amounts above \$4000. The tax is to be levied on and after January 1, 1895, and is to be payable on or before the first day of July, 1895. It is to be assessed on the income received "in the preceding calendar year," that is, for the first levy the calendar year of 1894. If the tax is not paid on or before July 1, a penalty of 5 per cent on the amount unpaid, with interest at 1 per cent a month, shall be levied in addition. Not many people in Gilliam county will be affected by the income tax.

The Eiffel tower is to be removed from Paris to Baltimore at a cost of \$500,000, and set up over the latter city as an ornament and speculative enterprise connected with the fair to be held there in 1897. It paid very well at the Paris exposition, of which it was one of the chief features, and it doubtless has a satisfactory financial future before it in the new location to which it is destined.

Late advices from Australia tell of the discovery of a nugget at Coolgardie, which weighs 1800 ounces and is worth \$30,000. It is said to have been taken from a reef, the whole face of which glitters with gold. The wonderful find has created intense excitement and attracted a tumultuous rush to the rich diggings.

A Minnesota farmer who soaks his wheat in water and then steams it before feeding, says that his hogs put on more meat of a better quality than they ever did on corn in the same length of time. Hogs have averaged about \$4 a hundred live weight there this fall, which will make the wheat fed to them net about \$1 per bushel.

The "Venus de Medici" was 5 feet 8 inches in height, and this is held by many artists and sculptors to be the most perfect statue for a woman.
