Henry Van Pelt, a New York capitalist, now in Portland, says that within the past 30 days money has become uncommonly plentiful in Eastern financial centers. Much of it is going begging at 5 per cent net. He says: "I do not remember a time since the middle of 1892 when such large volumes of money were offered, with no takers. While I am handling money and stocks all the time, and have been for more than twenty years, yet this sudden opening of money bags is a circumstance for which I can assign no reasons, unless the holders are tired of letting their wealth lie idle. Business is looking up somewhat, and the prospects are brighter than they have been the past year, still I can see no conditions justifying these liberal offers at such low rates."

Americans who are thinking to try their fortune in the new Eldorado of western Australia should consider some of the conditions of life in the new gold fields before starting on a fool's errand, says a correspondent. Recent letters are full of doleful tales of hardship. Not more than five men in a hundred are lucky enough to strike it rich, and the region is already vastly overpopulated. The lack of water is the greatest drawback. Water commands 25 cents a gallon at Coolgardie, 37 cents at Hannans and 50 cents elsewhere. In the gold district many horses have died of thirst by the roadside. Five hundred men at Coolgardie are anxious to get work at any wages.

The legislative committee of the Oregon Press Association, which met at Pendleton last week recommended and the same was adopted that laws be enacted by the legislature providing for the publication in the official papers of the county as follows:

1. Election notices.
2. Notice of sale under foreclosure of chattel mortgage.
3. Road petitions.
4. County financial exhibit.
5. County and probate court proceedings, county clerk to furnish copy.
6. Publication of laws after the manner of New York.
7. Publication of city ordinances.

The territorial area of Japan is about one-twenty-fourth that of the United States, not counting Canada, which is likely some time to come in, and it supports 40,000,000 people. At this rate it is computed that the North American continent would sustain a population of 1,000,000,000. How soon that limit is to be reached may be remitted the prophets and the statisticians, but it will come some time without doubt, requiring an increasing wise type of statesman and politician on the way if we are to hold together and carry out the destinies which seem appointed to us.—New York Tribune.

D. A. Hendricks did not remove his "Inland Republican" to Weston, as he once intended, having found a better opening. He has shipped the plant to Thompson Falls, Montana, a place of 800 or 900 people without a newspaper, whose business men have promised him a bonus. Mr. Hendricks' friends in these parts hope that that heaven-born specimen of the genus homo, the cash subscriber, may be found in unusual numbers in his new field, and make him joyful visits.—East Oregonian. A special session of the county court was held last Monday. The principal business considered was the matter of deputies' salaries. A petition was presented asking for the allowance of same, representing about one-fourth of the taxable property of the county. It was rejected.—Heppner Record.

Asst. Sec. Sims, of the U. S. land department at Washington says: "The good faith of a settler's claim is not impeached by absence from the land to earn money for support of settler's family and to purchase the land." This decision will be of interest to many settlers in this vicinity.

The wife of J. Frank Pierce, of Rock Spring, Wyoming, claims to be the daughter of Jay Gould by his first wife from whom Gould was never legally separated. The lady claims the estate of Gould and will make a fight for it.

There is an enormous area of public lands still subject to entry in the United States. Of the 600,000,000 acres at least 200,000,000 are incapable of producing crops without irrigation.

Chas. Slater Got His Money.

Chas. Slater of Lost Valley went to Pendleton two weeks ago with a warrant for the arrest of W. H. Daughtrey, the well-known cattle dealer of that city. When he made affidavit on which the warrant was issued by the J. P. at Condon, on Sept. 26, 1894, he did not know Mr. Daughtrey's name; therefore, the warrant called for the arrest of John Doe or Gid Wells "for obtaining property by fraudulent transaction, by giving a bogus or illegal check to Chas. Slater of Lost Valley, Or., on or about June 1, 1894, in consideration for four head of steers, purchased for Nate Cecil." Before making the arrest, Mr. Slater, who was deputized as a special constable, was to fill in the name of W. H. Daughtrey.

Slater says that the check in question, which was for \$53, was given him for his cattle by L. S. Kyd signing the name of Nate Cecil to the check, which was drawn on Arlington National Bank. Cecil was at the time buying cattle for Daughtrey, and Kyd and others were receiving them. Neither Cecil nor Daughtrey were present when the check was filled out and given to Slater.

Slater forwarded the check to the Arlington National, and found that Cecil had no money there. The check was, of course, protested, costing Slater \$3. After the cattle had left Gilliam county and were on the road to Wallula last June, Slater and Cecil telephoned and telegraphed to Pendleton asking Mr. Daughtrey for about \$100, Mr. Cecil saying that a number of bills for feed, board, etc., had been left unpaid by Daughtrey. Someone telegraphed back that Mr. Daughtrey would make the matter all right when he arrived in Pendleton, but after waiting almost four months without hearing from him, Mr. Slater lost patience, and swore out a warrant for Daughtrey's arrest as stated.

He arrived in Pendleton by horseback on Oct. 1st, and interviewed Mr. Daughtrey just a few hours before that gentleman was married to a young lady of that place. Mr. Daughtrey claimed that he gave Cecil the money to pay for the cattle, but to avoid trouble at such a time, when everything was prepared for his wedding, he would on the following morning settle the whole bill including costs. The following morning he wanted until evening, as all his money was out looking for cattle, and in the evening, about 6 o'clock, he paid to Mr. Slater \$53 and \$13 besides—\$2 for warrant and \$11 for Mr. Slater's trip and expenses.

Mr. Daughtrey has a good reputation up there, and he stoutly maintains that he has paid for the cattle twice. Mr. Slater returned home the latter part of last week.
