James Scrivner of Hardman, father of Wm. P. Scrivner of Heppner, was found dead in his bed last Sunday. The cause of his death is supposed to have been heart failure. He was an old resident of Oregon, having resided in Morrow county for several years. He was engaged in farming and stock-raising, and was highly respected by all who knew him.

A very pleasant surprise party in honor of his birthday was tendered Rev. E. Curran Thursday evening at his home in the Wiley Miller residence. A large number of his friends were present and a most delightful evening was spent. The guests presented him with a beautiful gold watch chain, which he highly appreciates and of which he is very proud.

A robber or robbers effected an entrance into the Pacific express office at The Dalles Saturday night about 12 o'clock and stole \$15,000, of which about \$12,500 was gold and the balance silver. The thieves have not yet been apprehended. It is a very mysterious affair, and it would not surprise us to hear that it was committed by parties living in The Dalles.

T. E. Cruikshank, a former liveryman of this place who left here last spring with a band of horses for his old home at Columbus, Ohio, arrived at Condon this week. He disposed of his horses at fairly good prices and says he enjoyed his visit immensely. He informs us that as soon as he disposes of the balance of his horses here—about 20 head—he thinks of trying his luck in the famous gold regions of Africa.

Mrs. R. E. Lindsay died in the Women's hospital at Portland last Wednesday evening, Oct. 10th, and the body was laid to rest next day in the Lone Fir cemetery in that city. Her husband was with her at the time of her death, and after the burial he returned to his home near Mayville, arriving here Sunday. Mr. and Mrs. Lindsay were childless, and of the family, only the husband remains to mourn her untimely death. Mrs. Lindsay was about middle-aged and up to a year ago enjoyed the best of health. The sympathy of the entire community is extended to Mr. Lindsay in his sad affliction.

Hogs and Wheat.

In conversation with a farmer today in reference to feeding hogs on grain he expressed some sensible and practical ideas on the subject. He says if one has hogs given him, and counts the cost of pasture, cutting, threshing and harvesting the wheat they will not bring him 30 cents a bushel for his grain. The question was asked him if they would pay better than the market price for wheat if they were turned into the field and allowed to feed on the uncut grain. His answer was in the affirmative, and by this means pasture would be saved and the cost of harvesting, which amounts to nearly 20 cents a bushel. This is the only way for hog-feeding to be made profitable, and the land will really be improved in richness. To follow his advice the band of hogs should be driven into the grain field, and a portion enclosed by a cheap panel fence. As the grain is devoured this panel fence should be removed to another part of the field, and this proceeding should be kept up until the grain has been all eaten. This is the way to make hogs pay, and by which farmers would make more than by cutting and making grain and hauling it to market at any price less than 50 cents.—Times-Mountaineer.
