THE OFFICIAL PAPER OF GILLIAM COUNTY, OREGON.

After failure to negotiate a peace China has philosophically made up her mind to accept the situation, and is now making vigorous preparation for a prolonged war. The refusal of Germany to join the proposed quadruple alliance to intervene for peace has practically destroyed all hope of European interference. Now that China is left to her own resources, without prospect of foreign assistance or hope of negotiating a treaty of peace with Japan, the war will begin in earnest. All the latent forces of the Celestial empire will be awakened and China will begin the life or death struggle. There is no longer doubt as to Japan's intentions. On her part it is to be a war of conquest and subjugation, and will be prosecuted with all the energy of this martial nation. China has the numerical strength to resist invasion from any power, but she is so woefully lacking in the spirit of patriotism and is so thoroughly weakened by internal dissensions that her final downfall is almost assured.

In his address at the recent meeting of the Oregon Press Association, President Campbell said that it seemed to him that "the laws of Oregon required fewer legal publications than those of any other state in the Union. Many of the most important notices to the people of the county and state are to be found in some out of the way, dirty bulletin board that is very seldom scanned by the intelligent public. The average citizen will at once recognize that this course largely defeats the purpose of legal publication. Where publicity is required in a legal proceeding it is to be found alone in the newspapers. Every other method of reaching the eye of the public is partial and incomplete."

It is being said in the press of the state that State Printer Frank Baker has a valuable farm near Salem, which he will run on retiring from office, and that Baker has made a fortune as state printer variously estimated up to \$50,000. Fortunes of this size are made from the people frequently by men whose ability would not otherwise entitle them to \$1000 a year. This is an abuse which should be corrected. Offices of the snap variety should be abolished, and the people would be greatly unburdened by it. The prosperity of the country is kept in check by just such profits, and the jails and pens are kept full of men bred like lice from such injustices and corruptions.—East Oregonian.

At its meeting in Portland last week the State Bar Association introduced and adopted the following resolution. "That the committee on legislation or statutory reform be instructed to prepare and have introduced in the next session of the legislative assembly a bill placing the district attorneys of the state on a salary and abolishing all fees, said law to take effect upon its passage." There was a fight as to when it should take effect. Some wanted it to take effect on the passage of the bill and others on the 1st of December, 1896. It was decided, finally, that it should take effect on the passage of the bill.

The state bar association will take steps to increase the supreme court. It would better take steps to decrease litigation and cut down court fees—especially those of district attorneys. Litigation is a good thing to economize these times. The supreme court is big enough to do all the business that ought to be brought before it.—Oregonian.

The credit man of a large wholesale house in Portland informs us that he always takes the newspapers of the towns where he has customers about whose standing there is any question. "When they advertise freely," said he "we feel that they are selling goods and making money. When they quit advertising we take measures to find out why."

Some persons near Dallas, with an eye out for the main chance, are talking of going into the raising of coyotes. Coyote scalps are worth \$6 apiece. Sheep are worth from \$1 to \$2.50, and one ewe will raise one and two lambs during a season, whereas a coyote will raise 5 to 7 pups.

Some of our exchanges do not think the next senator from Oregon is yet elected. We simply say that he is, and his name is J. N. Dolph. There will be no contest. It only remains a matter of form to announce the result.

The three heaviest men of whom any mention is made in history were Miles Darden of Tennessee, Lewis Cornelius of Pennsylvania and Daniel Lambert of England. Darden died in 1857. When in health, he was 7 feet 6 inches in height and weighed over 1,000 pounds. I have no record of the date of the death of Cornelius, which occurred in Pike county, Pa., but the account says that he was born in 1794. When in his prime, he measured 8 feet 2 inches around the waist, was 6 feet tall and weighed 745 pounds. Daniel Lambert was an English freak of the early part of the century and died in June, 1809. He was of average height, but weighed 739 pounds.—St. Louis Republic.

There is a prevailing superstition among hotel men that to close the register brings bad luck to the house. You will find it so in every hotel in the country. And every clerk feels like jumping over the desk and thumping the man who carelessly closes the book. We never close the book until it is filled to the last page. I always place my hand on the book until the man who registers has left the desk. Whenever a man closes the book, we have had luck somewhere in the house.—Hotel Guide.

Did you ever notice that when a man drops a piece of meat on the floor, no difference how clean the floor may be, he gives it a kick or picks it up and lays it aside? He will never eat it. But let him drop a plug of tobacco in the street, no difference how dusty the street may be, he picks it up, gives it a careless wipe on his coat sleeve, or on the bosom of his pants, and bites a big hunk out of it and wallops it around in his mouth with a keener relish than ever.

The laws of Kansas provide that murder in the first degree shall be punished by death, and that after the murderer is incarcerated in the state penitentiary for one year, he shall be hanged. None of the governors of the state have ever ordered the death sentence executed, and the result is that over 50 murderers who have been sentenced to hang are now serving life sentences.

Abraham Lincoln was undoubtedly the tallest president; he was six feet four inches in height. The shortest was probably Benjamin Harrison, although Van Buren and John Adams were very short men. The oldest president was William Henry Harrison, who was 68 years and 1 month old when inaugurated. The youngest was Grant, who was not quite 47 years old.

A cargo of selected girls has been sent from London to western Australia, where there is a great dearth of material for wives for farmers and mechanics. The consignment consists of fifty young women, sound morally and physically, and under 20 years of age.

A Burden to Small Counties.
The amount of fees collected by the sheriff of Douglas county turned over to the treasurer since July 1st up to the present time has been \$64.40. The sheriff's salary, under the new reform law abolishing fees of county officers and establishing fixed salaries, is \$2,500 a year, the first deputy's salary is \$1,000 a year and the second deputy's salary is \$800 a year, showing that while the office of sheriff has yielded the county \$64.40 during the last three months it has cost the taxpayers about \$1,000, or more than fifteen times as much as it has brought into the treasury. In nearly every county heard from the salaries of county officers are said to amount to more than the fees. The law was passed in obedience to a clamor based on vague rumors alleging that the fees amounted to fabulous sums, which were purely imaginary in every instance, except in Multnomah county, where the amounts were no doubt greatly magnified, and in extravagant fees were allowed and paid by the county court, far in excess to what ought to have been paid under a fair construction of the law and a careful auditing of the accounts. Under the new law they are interested in doing as little business as possible, the pay being the same when nothing is done as when there is a great amount of work, and hence the fees of constables are now ten times as much as they were under the old law. This no doubt accounts for the receipts of the sheriff's office of Douglas county being about \$20 a month, while the salaries of the sheriff and deputies amount to more than three hundred a month. The constables are collecting the fees that the sheriff formerly received and the sheriff is drawing a salary. Under the old law fees paid the bill, but under the new law it takes, in some instances, both fees and a salary. In nearly all the smaller counties the new law will be a burden on the taxpayers and an inconvenience to people who have business with county officers, and in many instances will cause business to be neglected or delayed that ought to be attended to promptly.—Roseburg Review.
