THE OFFICIAL PAPER OF GILLIAM COUNTY, OREGON.

Concerning the resolution recently passed by the State Bar Association, favoring putting district attorneys on a salary and doing away with the fee system, District Attorney Rand of Pendleton sensibly says: "I would be much pleased to see such a measure become a law, and would gladly relinquish the fee system for a salary regime. Further than that, I will say, there should be a radical change in this respect—the office of district attorney should be abolished and an office created for each county of county attorney. Such an official would be on the ground and be intimately acquainted with the facts connected with local happenings. He could then enter more intelligently into the prosecution of criminal business. He would also be available as counsel for the county officers whenever a disputed law point arose, and could give legal advice whenever the complications of county business required. The county attorney should be put on a salary and be paid enough so that he could afford to devote about all his time to the duties of his office. Such changes as I have indicated, I believe, would work for good in every particular and I am heartily in favor of amending the laws to make such provisions."

The wonderful success of the Japanese in their warfare against China may appear strange to some when the comparative size of the two nations is considered, but one great element of the success of the Japanese lies in their great patriotism which feature is lacking with the Chinese. Another feature is the modern method of warfare of the Japanese as compared with the antiquated method of the Chinese. The politics of China is rotten to the core, and the highest officials systematically plunder those under them until when it comes to the soldier who does the fighting his condition is pitiable in the extreme.

Since the new tariff went into effect dealers in playing cards have been studying how to effectually evade paying the tax on them, and have at last found a method. The law declares that the tax shall be paid on each pack containing "not more than fifty-four cards." The regular number of cards in a pack is 52, but most of those now manufactured contain an extra one, the joker. It will be an easy matter for the manufacturer to put three jokers in a pack instead of one, when the pack will contain 55 cards and be exempt from tax according to the plain provisions of the law.

There are rumors of trouble between Mexico and some of the Central American republics. If a strong hand should take hold of the matter of uniting all the Central American republics in one confederation would be a great advantage to those countries. The great drawback to their prosperity now is their individual weakness this being continually the tool of stronger powers. The natural resources of those countries is wonderful, and with a strong and stable government which could establish and maintain reforms, then progress would be very rapid towards material prosperity.

The Dalles Chronicle is an honest republican paper. In replying to a misleading tariff article in the Economist, republished in other republican papers, it says: "Every sensible man knows that the price of wheat is not affected a particle by our legislation; that the product of other countries has crowded our wheat out of the market and left us with a burdensome surplus. Such papers as the Economist are a disgrace to the party, as well as an injury. If we can find no better arguments than those offered by it, then is the republican party in hard lines indeed.—E. O."

Some of Portland's leading citizens have organized a stock company of \$100,000 capital for the purpose of systematically inducing persons to come to Oregon to locate. This is a movement which our citizens here should encourage more, and new-comers should receive a more hearty welcome—and not be made to feel that they are not wanted and that there is no room for them here.

In the adultery case of Sidney Horn at Eugene, Judge Fullerton instructed the grand jury to return a not true bill, holding that under the Oregon law a man cannot be prosecuted for adultery unless his wife is the complaining witness.

There is an opportunity for Oregon now to secure immigration and The Oregonian is doing a good work for the state in urging that something be done to attract it. There are some who object to more immigration because, they say, it consists of poorer people and the state is better off without them. They prefer large per capita wealth to great aggregate wealth. Such opinions usually come from older residents who came West when land was to be had for the taking and livelihood was obtained easily. A more familiar title is mossback. Every industrious family that comes to Oregon aids in the state's development and increases its wealth.—Forest Grove Times.

New York Sun: One effect of emigration to the West and hard times everywhere is the falling off in the value of farm lands. People in the central part of this state say that many holdings can now be had for half of what they were rated at five or six years ago. These farms are neither abandoned nor played out, nor has any marked decrease of population occurred, but the farmers have the Western fever and want more room, or they are anxious to get into town and work at trades.

Tacoma News: There is frequently a big difference between what lawyers value their services and what the court estimates them at. Thus the counsel who defended Dr. Meyer in New York put in a bill for \$7500, and the court allowed them each \$5.50 per diem. Quite a cut.

A Chinese soldier is paid one dollar a month and boards himself. No wonder he isn't tumbling hilariously to the front to be shot by the Japs, and that he bounds tumultuously to the rear when the racket begins.

To Abolish the Grand Jury.

A correspondent from Eugene, writing to the Oregonian, thinks the grand jury service should be abolished, and adds: "It has long been considered as an extravagance and a useless appendage to our courts, and the more liberal taxpayers in many communities are discussing the propriety of abolishing grand juries altogether, and so arrange by statute to dispense with them. Complaints against all persons who have committed crimes or have violated any laws, should be passed into the court for trial without so much delay or other service similar to the constitution and laws adopted by the State of Washington, which, we are informed, are satisfactory and work well. It is not strange, however, that several eminent attorneys, as well as members of the legislature, have heretofore supposed that the change suggested would require a change in the constitution of our state. I beg to quote from our constitution, article seven, judicial department, section eighteen: 'The legislative assembly shall so provide that the most competent of the permanent citizens of the county shall be chosen for jurors, and out of the whole number in attendance at court, seven shall be chosen by lot as grand jurors, five of whom must concur to find an indictment. But the legislative assembly may modify or abolish grand juries.'

I merely write to call attention to this subject by the judges of our courts, as well as attorneys and the members of the coming legislature, in the hope that the subject may be considered as one of many necessary to decrease the expenses of our courts and the taxes of the people."

DOCTOR'S FEES.

In the Case of Royal Patients They Are Sometimes Enormous.

(Dr. Shady in The Forum.)

Some of the fees paid by royalty have been eminently befitting the giver and taker. The late physician to the Prince of Wales received for four weeks' attendance at Sandringham, during the illness of his distinguished patient from typhoid fever, not only the usual title of baronet, but a fee of \$50,000. Sir Morell Mackenzie is reported to have received more than twice this amount for his treatment of the late Emperor Frederick of Germany. Dimsdale, a prominent practitioner of London, in 1762, was called thence to St. Petersburg to vaccinate the Empress Catherine II., for which he received not only the equivalent of \$50,000, but an extra \$10,000 for traveling expenses, the title of baron and a life pension of \$2,500 yearly. His Royal Highness the Nawab of Ranpur, India, recently paid an English army surgeon \$250,000 for a three-months' occasional attendance in an ordinary attack of rheumatism. The late Sir Andrew Clark, Gladstone's physician, often charged \$1000 for running down from London to Liverpool, and the late Sir William Gull commanded equally high rates for similar services. A Russian surgeon charged a wealthy notable of Odessa \$6,000 for opening an abscess of the hip, the time occupied being 10 minutes. And, better still, while on the same visit, he took a chance shot at another patient in the shape of a similarly simple operation, for which he received nearly \$1500 more, certainly enough extra to pay the fee of the railway porter on his homeward journey.

But in all this it is not so much the doing as the knowing how to do it. When the French peasant said that there were not 10 francs' worth of paint on Rosa Bonheur's "Horse Fair," he was incapable of valuing high art. "Five dollars for amputating the leg," said the surgeon, "and \$995 for knowing how"—and the victim was thankful accordingly.
