The explanation of the complete failure of China to cope with Japan, or even to maintain successfully at any point the attitude of vigorous, determined self-defense, is a simple one. The Chinese people do not know how to fight; and if they knew how they have nothing, or next to nothing, with which to carry on modern warfare. While the Chinese nation has been content to plod along in ruts worn by the customs of the ages, Japan has, to some extent, recognized and adopted the suggestions of progress that came to it with the commerce of the world. As a result the flower of the Chinese army is huddling, terror-stricken, around the imperial city, within the three-fold walls of which the emperor sits near his mother and shudders over a state of affairs which he can neither understand nor control, suing for peace like a coward schoolboy before a sturdy belligerent menacing him with fists. When the solid self-conceit that has barred the progress of the Chinese nation for ages has been whipped out of its people, the door of possible progress will be opened to it. It will then be well for the powers to whom it now appeals for intervention to call little Japan off and stop the one-sided fight.

Strange as it may seem, California has elected a democratic governor. The result was not due, as has been asserted, to the republican money plank, but almost solely to the suspicion in the minds of the voters that Estee, the republican candidate, would be too much under the control of the Southern Pacific Railroad Company, against which corporation the people of California have a deep and bitter grudge. This is shown by the vote for Sutro, an independent candidate, and a proven foe of the railroad, for mayor of San Francisco. The two old parties took practically the same position on the money question, and on the railroad question as well, but the democratic railroad plank, built later, was more explicit and sweeping, and the democratic candidate was not under the same cloud of suspicion that overshadowed Estee. Besides this, Budd is a marvelous campaigner, a man of great force, and popular. These are the reasons that elected about the only democrat to a prominent position—save here and there a stray congressman—in the North.

The democratic party as organized at present lacked force of conviction for its principles; lacked that earnestness and enthusiasm which accompanies sincerity; lacked determination in the face of predictions of ruin, to repeal bad laws, to throw aside the plutocratic, protection-loving, self-hunting element in its ranks. Hence the verdict of Tuesday's elections; and we believe it to be a just verdict, rendered in such a form as to have permanent effect and to bring about in the last years of this century, such democratic reforms as will give justice to the mass of the people and deny it not to the least important among them.—Pendleton East Oregonian.

If the state is to train convicts to trades by which they may become self-supporting when returned to freedom, those should be chosen requiring little capital for their operation; for when a convict puts off his striped clothes he has not much money with which to initiate expensive factories. If he can possess a hammer, or an awl, he is fortunate. The policy should be to give them a hand training that will enable the convict to earn wages without the intervention of expensive machinery.—Hillsboro Independent.

Even wealth has its burdens. It is said that Rockefeller is expected to pay an income tax to the general government of \$152,225, assessed on \$125,000,000 worth of property. The Jay Gould estate is not expected to pay more than \$80,000; Russell Sage, \$90,000; Cornelius Vanderbilt \$81,000; William K. Vanderbilt, \$75,960; John Jacob Astor, \$50,000. The government evidently thinks it worth something to be rich.

From the latest figures obtainable it is discovered that the average freight rate in the United States is less than in other countries. The average per ton per mile in Europe is 2.02 cents, while in the United States it is but 1.22 cents. Switzerland presents the highest rate, 3.36, followed by Norway, with a rate of 3 cents.

Jacksonville Times: The young, active democrats of Oregon, those who do the fighting and do not look to and are not dependent upon the fleshpots of office, are now and were in 1892 in favor of David B. Hill for president. They know that he would give them a truly democratic administration, free from mugwumpery—one that they could rely upon that would be sustained by the people at the polls when it came up for endorsement.

The Hartford Times says that out of 170,000 women in that state, who might have voted at the late town elections, only 3,000 availed themselves of the privilege—less than 2 per cent—and thinks that the majority of those that went to the polls did it through curiosity and would never go again. The demand for woman's suffrage does not seem to be so great as the agitators would persuade us.

David Bennett Hill is a much larger man in the democratic party today than Grover Cleveland. Democrats recognize the fact that the race for governor was forced upon Hill, he carrying the banner of forlorn hope. Hill is defeated but great in his defeat. Cleveland has satisfied his envy and malice and has earned the contempt of every honest democrat.—Dallas Chronicle

The lack of statesmanship made manifest in the last congress, in dilly-dallying with the new tariff bill for nine long months, while the whole country was bleeding at every pore, so disgusted the whole country that they took the first opportunity of manifesting their disapproval of such childish and blundering proceedings, hence the result of the late election.

The country is to be congratulated that the elections are over. True, congress meets again in December, which is unfortunate; but it can't do very much harm. The country needs more industry and business, and less talk and politics.

One of the mysteries of the elections is how those two Pennsylvania democratic congressmen got in—a state having 250,000 republican majority. One republican congressman was elected in Texas, which is democratic by 150,000.

The Eugene Guard says that the late elections prove that the populist party is almost wiped out of existence. Nevada is about the only state in the Union where the populists made any showing at all.

Death of Mrs. Rohrer.

Bliss at the old homestead in Illinois, all of whom deeply mourn the great loss of their loving mother.
