Wheat is on the rise again, we are pleased to announce. The price of the cereal at Arlington now is 27 and 28c a bushel. At The Dalles it is 33c. Why such difference, and only 50 miles apart?

Dr. B. F. Nott, the dentist, arrived in town Tuesday and has his office in rear of Hendricks' law office. He will take calves at \$5 a head and wheat at 30c a bushel on account, to be delivered at Fossil.

Wm. Darling's wife and two children arrived at Condon Wednesday from Tacoma, her husband meeting them at Arlington with private conveyance. They will reside in the Thurnagle building this winter.

Dr. J. H. Hudson left yesterday for a three weeks' visit to his old home in Toronto, Canada. Madam Rumor informs us that maybe a Mrs. Hudson will come along when he returns, but we can not vouch for it.

King South, the young man who had been sick so long with la grippe and pneumonia, died Tuesday morning at his home in the Buckhorn country west of Mayville. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. South and was about 28 years of age. He was an industrious, honest young man and his untimely death is a severe blow to his relatives. His brother, Wm. South, arrived here Wednesday from his home near Seio, Linn county, but too late to attend the burial, which took place at the Mayville cemetery at 2 o'clock.

John Maddock this week sold 3610 head of his sheep to Ernest Seekamp, receiving therefor \$1.25 per head for 2333 old ones, \$900 per head for 1257 lambs, and \$6 per head for 20 bucks. We have not learned whether Mr. Maddock intends to retire from the sheep business or not. He has about 225 head left yet.

James Pentecost, the 17-year-old son of H. W. Pentecost of Mayville, died Thursday of last week at the home of Walter Smith, near Lone, Morrow county. He had been sick several weeks from the effects of a sprain he received while loading wheat. He had been at work over there for several months and was a hard-working young man. It is a sad blow to his father and other relatives.

John Madden stopped in town Saturday on his way home from The Dalles, to which place he took several extra good horses and sold them at about six times the prices usually received for scrub horses in this section. Mr. Madden raises only first-class, heavy horses and never finds any trouble in selling them at big prices. This system ought to be practiced more by all our horse and cattle men.

We acknowledge a pleasant call from Mr. Alasco Moore, principal of the Lone Rock schools, who is attending the examination here this week. Although Mr. Moore is not yet 21 years of age he has taught six terms of school and is a graduate of one of the best schools in Iowa. He is already a first-class instructor and is sure to improve with experience. His wife is also a first-class teacher and a most estimable little lady.

H. H. Hendricks and Chas. McKenzie, proprietors of the Butte Creek saw mill, were in town the first of this week, putting in a bid to Shed Grider for the furnishing of the lumber to be used in building the bridges and culverts for the new Thirtymile road. Herbert Halstead also bid on the contract and his being the lowest, he was awarded the contract for furnishing all the bridge and culvert lumber, 42,000 feet in all. We have not learned the amount of his bid.

One of the most fearful and exciting races of the year is soon to take place over the New York Central track. Engine 909, which has a record of 112 miles an hour, is to try her speed with an English engine for the championship of the rail. The swiftness of about two miles a minute, which makes telegraph poles seem to the engineer no larger than hoe handles, is the utmost that human nerves rocked by eight-foot drive wheels can endure, and beyond the desire to gamble on the result, the object of the contest can be of no great importance.

J. H. Bowen has already begun work on his three sections of the new Thirtymile road. He will camp on the ground while the work is in progress, and has his tent pitched in what we believe is the finest natural camping place west of the Rockies. About one mile from the creek is a great cavern or rock house, perhaps 100 yards long by 50 feet deep—that is, the huge mountain projects out about 50 feet, the rock bottom being on a level with the road. A large spring of excellent water is within this enormous amphitheater, and it will soon become famous as an ideal camping place for teamsters. They can afford to travel five or ten miles further in order to reach it.

Teachers' quarterly examination is in progress at Condon this week by Supt. Kennedy and his assistants, Misses Birdie Downing and Bessie Fitzwater. Four applicants are being examined—Mr. and Mrs. Alasco Moore of Lone Rock, Miss Maggie Wilson of Mayville, and Miss Susan Dunn of Condon. Mr. and Mrs. Moore are recent arrivals from Iowa and were married at Heppner about six weeks ago. Mr. Moore is a nephew of John M. Brown of Lone Rock, and he and his wife have charge of the Lone Rock school this winter. Miss Maggie Wilson returned to Mayville last week from an extended visit with her old friend, Mrs. T. M. Lane at Reedley, Fresno county, Cal.

The legislature of 1893 passed an act concerning the branding of stock that seems to be not generally known. The act provides that "all brands shall be recorded in the county where the owner resides, and in such other county where such animals usually range and no evidence of ownership by brand shall be permitted in courts of this state, on or after November 1, 1894, unless such brand shall be recorded as in this act provided." The act further provides that the brand shall be burned in a piece of leather and filed with the clerk, with a certificate as to where the brand is to be placed. Burn your brand on the leather and take or send it to the county clerk, and he will do the rest.

Some very interesting horse races were run at Haystack on the 8th, 9th and 10th inst. Al Moore was in attendance and informs us that Henry Hawk carried off all the persimmons and laurels. Henry had two racers on the track and won the three main races, also about \$500 on the result. Charley Pinkham rode one of Hawk's horses, "Black Bess," and easily beat "Bony," belonging to Orsen Martin. Hawk rode his other horse, "Domino," himself, and Al Moore says he (Hawk) "rode just like he was dead broke and never expected to have a chance to make another dollar." Henry says the race was so close it made his nose turn pale—the first time for many years that the bright red color deserted that portion of his anatomy. Henry's friends here are glad to learn of his success, any way.

All Gave Bonds.

The above heading does not infer that they gave bonds to appear before the grand jury—but that the contractors for the new Thirtymile road have all given bonds to have the road completed by April 1, 1895, and work on the same will begin at once.

To show the difference in opinions in regard to such work we publish the bids of all who bid on the work. All the sections are one mile in length each, except the 5th and last section, which is 1½ miles long.

J. H. Bowen's bid for the grading of the entire road, five sections (5½ miles in all) was \$1450; for the first 3 sections, \$1048.

E. A. Crawford & Son bid on the first three sections, beginning at the bridge on Thirtymile, as follows: First section, \$650; 2d section, \$750; 3d section, \$500; total for the three, \$1900.

Jas. M. Caldwell bid on the 3d, 4th and 5th sections, as follows: Third section, \$375; 4th section, \$230; 5th section, \$205.

F. M. Shannon bid on the 4th and 5th sections as follows: Fourth section, \$230; 5th section, \$328.75.

Jas. A. Kiser bid on the 4th and 5th sections as follows: Fourth section, \$197; 5th section, \$363.80.

J. R. Clark's bid on the bridges and culverts, 13 in all, was \$1375; bid of S. S. Grider for the same work was \$976.
