The law of finding is not generally understood, but it was declared many years ago, and it is well to note the case and decision. A visitor to a store found a wallet containing a sum of money. He handed the wallet and contents to the merchant to be returned to the owner. After three years, the owner having failed to appear, the finder demanded the wallet and the money from the merchant. The latter refused to deliver them on the ground that they were found on his premises. The finder then sued the shopkeeper. It was decided that, against all the world but the owner, the title of the finder is perfect. The receiver of an article found is only a trustee, first of the owner then of the finder, if the owner does not appear. The receiver has no more right to keep an article against the finder than the finder has to keep it against the owner.

Speaking of the railroad question the Astoria Herald says: "If the mossbacks of Astoria would pay their taxes, take hold of local improvements; develop the resources of the country; build good county roads, improve the streets of the city; build decent public buildings, and show some degree of enterprise and life, a railroad will be built, but no company is going to build a railroad to a cemetery. The public buildings are the poorest in the state. The county jail was sired by a Campbellite preacher and damned by grand juries. The streets of the city are rotten and falling down and are a disgrace to the city. Astoria looks dirty and filthy, and its people appear lazy. Under such conditions, no enterprising people are coming here to blow horns to raise the dead."

Asst. Sec. Sims, of the U. S. land office at Washington informs us that the successful contestant of a timber land entry is entitled to a preferred right of entry under the act of May 14, 1880. The administrator of a deceased homesteader has no authority under the law to submit final proof for the benefit of the devisees. In the event of the homesteader's death, final proof may be submitted by any one of the devisees, and if such proof is found satisfactory, the certificate should issue in the name of the devisees of the said homesteader generally.

Albany Herald: The proposed work of the new Colonization Association in Portland is commendable. Oregon's big farms should be divided so as to make room for thousands of new families. To induce desirable immigrants to settle in this state to engage in diversified farming to add wealth and population, and to assist in a fuller development of the wide resources of this great state should receive encouragement.

Ten thousand claimants, with nearly eleven million dollars at stake, are interested in the Indian depredation cases now before the Court of Claims. Two-thirds of these claimants are residents of the Southwest. Since the adjournment of congress there have been numerous inquiries from these claimants and the 250 lawyers representing them as to the possibilities of liquidation.

THE TAX QUESTION.

That notes and personal property are not generally given in to the assessor, and consequently pay no taxes cannot be disputed. So far no scheme has been proposed to overcome this iniquity probably because our legislators overlook it or do not care to hurt the feelings of those who own them. The theory of American taxation is correct enough, but the practice has divided the people into two classes, the tax payers and the tax dodgers. The tax paying class, as a rule, is composed of people owning from a few hundred to thirty or forty thousand dollars. Above the latter sum the taxes amount to so much that the taxpayers can't just bear to pay it. Real estate is of course visible and cannot escape only so far as it can be done by giving it low values, but notes, accounts and property of that kind are easily hidden, and so do not pay their proportion of taxes. On this item alone a few years ago, Umatilla county returned more than two-thirds as much as Multnomah. The remedy is simple and should be applied. Let the legislature pass an act making such contracts non-collectable until they are stamped by the tax collector, showing that the taxes had been paid. A man should pay tax according to his ability to do so, but under the present system this is far from being the rule. The tax dodger should be brought up to the rack, and made to pay just the same as every body else. Such a law as we have suggested would go a long way towards accomplishing this result.—Dallas Chronicle.

DIVORCES ARE RARE.

Panama Women Marry and Separate by Their Own Laws.

"Divorces are rare in Panama, and everywhere else on the isthmus," said the old traveler, as he threw away his Mazatlan cigar and lighted a fresh one. "Why?" asked a New York Journal man.

"Because marriages are rare." "People live celibate lives there?" "By no means. Large families are the rule there. But the women have peculiar notions. They find that husbands to whom they are legally tied are apt to be cruel and tyrannical, so they decide not to marry. Instead, they simply take up their abode with the man of their choice, minister to his wants and rear his children, all without the aid of the priest.

"Immoral? Perhaps, but they don't mean it to be. They simply want to be in a condition to be free, if freedom becomes necessary. So long as the man is kind they remain with him, and the point I wish to make is that as a rule these irregular unions last during life. It is only when one party or the other is grossly unsatisfactory that a separation takes place. Such separations on the isthmus are comparatively rare—much rarer than legal divorces in our states.

"United States judges, you know, are appointed, for life or during good behavior. Among the masses on the isthmus husbands are chosen the same way."
