THE MAN AND THE PARTY.

New York Sun.

A little more than ten years ago the Sun printed its honest opinion of Grover Cleveland, who then aspired to the democratic nomination for president and to the leadership of the national democracy: "He has labored against the democratic party, not for it. He is engaged in a personal policy which does not include the building up and strengthening of the democratic party, but the building up and strengthening of Cleveland. He may be strong with those who are not democrats. With democrats he is weak. The attempt to nominate Mr. Cleveland at Chicago looks toward using the democracy for the benefit of a man who desires to be strong not through his party, but in spite of it. That is the reason these bolting republicans like him so much. He is their man. He is not the man of the democracy. If every democrat elected to office should go on as Cleveland has done the democratic party would speedily die out Mr. Cleveland's attempt may succeed. The world loves to be deceived, but the democratic cause cannot gain much by going through the process."

That was 10 years ago. To be exact, the foregoing estimate of the man in his relation to the democracy was published on July 4, 1884. At that date Mr. Cleveland was not well known outside of New York, where he had been elected as governor two years earlier, by an overwhelming majority, due to political circumstances which were accidental, and in no way connected with his own record or achievements.

Was the Sun's judgment correct? Was our estimate true of the man? Was the warning needed? It was not heeded, but was it needed, we ask?

The final answer to these questions came on Tuesday, November 6, 1894; and it is now written large and black upon the annals of the democracy.

In one county of Nebraska (the census comprising 9 of its 13 townships) crops have been so damaged by frosts and drought that only 110 bushels of corn, 3020 bushels of wheat and 607 bushels of oats and rye have been raised by 256 families consisting of 1425 persons, which is less than half a bushel of corn, not 12 bushels of wheat, and about two bushels of rye and one of potatoes per family. The judge of the county court in reporting the above as a result of the investigations of supervisors, says, "the county as a county is a howling waste, and that this desolation follows on the heels of the drought of 1893; unless help comes starvation is right before hundreds of our people." Why starve to death in the drouth-stricken and blizzard-ridden East when millions of acres of the best land in the world lies vacant yet in Eastern Oregon awaiting settlement? Nowhere on earth can a living be made so easy and with as little effort as in this portion of Eastern Oregon, where crops never fail.

If republicans are wise they will give up hope of controlling the next senate. It is fruitless to speculate upon admission of new states. This will not help the republicans, and cannot hurt them. Without admission of new states they are in a minority of one. Neither the present nor the next senate, nor the president, if the senate were willing, would consent to admission of new states unless the democrats were sure to gain by it. The republicans cannot hope to gain the senate before 1897. Then they will gain so many seats all through the North that half a dozen new senators will not interfere with their control, even if they are all democrats. This is just as well. The republicans have no use for the senate until they get the president.—Oregonian.

A paper published in sun-burnt Kansas makes the horrible announcement that the sun is drying up all the cows. Some time ago the farmers in that section had to soak their pigs in water to make them hold swill.

AMERICA WON.

According to a dispatch published a few days ago, it appears that America can beat the world now in several lines of manufactured products. It is stated that a syndicate of Chicago firms had secured two large contracts in Japan. One was for canned corned beef, to be supplied to the Japanese army, and will be furnished by the Armour Company, of Chicago. This might have been expected, but the other is of greater significance. It is for iron pipe to the amount of \$370,000, to be used in extending the Tokio water-works, and was awarded to manufacturers in Alabama. This contract came into spirited competition with English, French and German bidders. Yet, in spite of this fact, the large quantity of iron pipe will be carried from the interior of the South to the Pacific coast by rail, and thence shipped to Tokio.

The main advantage is due to natural deposits of iron. Labor in the South is somewhat cheaper than skilled labor of the same class in the North, but is yet above the wages paid foreigners, if the tables published are correct. So it would seem that under a moderate duty, there should be no fear of foreign competition in our own country. With American finances unshackled, it would not only have no rival at home, but would soon capture the best foreign markets.

A paper published at The Dalles reprints an item to the effect that it is estimated that by 1965 the wealth of the Rothschilds will be \$60,000,000,000; and in its editorial columns of the same issue it declares in substance that conditions are the result of inflexible laws that legislation cannot change. Are the thousands of millions of people going to allow the Rothschilds to own the world in another half or three-quarters of a century? And is there no way of preventing it?

The principal thing about the present school book discussion is "the change"—yes, about \$300,000 of the taxpayers' "change" that the proposed change proposes changing by the change from the pockets of the people to the purse of the book publishers.

Bill and Jim Cook, leaders of the notorious gang of desperadoes and robbers in the Indian Territory, are carrying off everything they can get their hands on. The officers appear to be powerless in their effort to bring them to justice.

Mrs. Lease will start a paper in Wichita or Topeka, to be called the Kansas Agitator. Mrs. Lease has been a good deal of a Kansas agitator herself and the wicked Atchison Globe suggests that she call her paper the Hell Raiser.

A postal reform bill will be introduced in the next congress, urging the passage of a law to reduce letter rates from two cents to one cent, and on merchandise from sixteen cents to eight cents per pound.

A Skull as Big as a Bushel Basket.

One of the most remarkable finds of gigantic human remains of which we have any record was that made at Palermo, Sicily, in the year of 1516, when an entire skeleton of unheard of proportions was unearthed by some marble quarrymen. These mammoth remains measured exactly 34 feet from head to foot, and 9 feet 7 inches from point to point of the shoulders. A stone as buried with this old time giant may still be seen at Palermo in section "Z" of the St. Isoret museum. It is made of a bluish looking, fine grained boulder, and appears to be about 2 feet 8 inches long by 1 foot broad and 9 inches through in the thickest place. A rusty, rusty looking tag attached to the relic informs the visitor that it weighs 52 pounds, but the general verdict is that it could not weigh over 30 or 35 pounds.

The skeleton was burned by a mob in the year 1862 during the prevalence of the black death at Palermo, the ignorant, superstitious people believing that it was connected in some mysterious way with the death dealing distemper. The skull of this giant, according to Abbe Ferregus, "was largely excessive of the baskets said to hold the bushel, being fitted above and below with teeth to the number of sixty-four, the each of which would have weighed two ounces." Cavalier Scroy claimed to have found a skull on Tenerife that had 60 teeth.—St. Louis Republic.
