WHAT WAR MEANS.

Word comes from Tokio that Japan wants 400,000,000 yen (about \$250,000,000) and cession of the territory she now occupies. This is Corea and the Port Arthur peninsula, occupation and fortification of which would make her mistress of all the seas of North China and absolute dictator of the government at Peking. Nevertheless, the demand is not unreasonable, upon the principle that a nation in a state of war is entitled to all it can take and hold. The intimation that these demands will increase as the war goes on indicates that Japan means to keep all she can take, and to be paid for the cost and labor of taking it besides. This is what war means. Nations unwilling to face it must not provoke war.

This is similar to the terms that Germany enacted not so very long ago of France. After enjoying a triumphal march through the streets of Paris, old Kaiser William, many of whose advisers and subjects were satisfied with having whipped their enemy and were willing to call it square, calmly suggested that he would be satisfied with the provinces of Alsace and Lorraine, and a cash contribution of four thousand million francs. The territory was given up with sorrow and shame, but the wonderful French people furnished and paid the money, to the perpetual admiration if not astonishment of the civilized world.

There is no good reason why Japan should agree to a compromise until she has China thoroughly whipped. No European nation, under similar circumstances, would stop in the middle of a successful campaign to dicker over a money indemnity. The Japanese hate the Chinese because the latter have never missed an opportunity to revile and ridicule them. This war has given the long desired chance for revenge and no one can blame the Japanese for gratifying it. To stop the victorious advance of the Japs after Ping Yang and Port Arthur would be as absurd as to have asked the Germans to hold their hands after Metz and Gravelotte. The Germans broke the back of French resistance at Sedan but they marched on Paris and captured the capital. In the same way the Japanese will probably capture Weihaiwei and the Taku forts, which will leave Peking at their mercy. They will not burn or loot the Chinese imperial city, but they want the satisfaction of entering it and there dictating terms of peace. And, from present appearances, it looks as though they would follow out this programme to the letter.

Diversified farming is attracting the attention of farmers everywhere now, and especially in Eastern Oregon. Never again will any considerable number of our farmers be wholly dependent upon wheat or any other product. We do not desire to be understood as claiming to know all about farming, but experience has taught us that the successful farmer is he who in the first place raises, as nearly as possible, everything that he requires for his own use. With a few cows, chickens, and pigs, a garden and a small orchard, a farmer can live in a very comfortable manner with a very little money. And this method of farming would leave him the greater portion of his farm on which to raise something to sell. The farmer who has been buying his meat, butter, and a portion of his vegetables, is the one who is distressed today. There are lots of farmers around here who are prosperous and some even have considerable money loaned, but they have used their brains as well as their muscles.

It takes forty-five cents to carry by express from Portland to Pendleton a thirty-six ounce package. Such a package from Boston to Pendleton would be carried for the same money or less. Here is a chance for some Eastern Oregon member of the legislature to distinguish himself by securing cheaper express rates, on small packages at least, between points in Oregon. It can be done and should be done, and the merchants of Eastern Oregon, and particularly those of Portland, should deeply interest themselves in this matter.—E. O.

A high Japanese officer declares that Japan will have an indemnity from China, even if she is obliged to fight England to obtain it, and he intimates that in that case Russia might take a hand. That would be a war worth talking about.

INDEPENDENT VOTERS.

The recent elections verify the assertion that there are several hundred thousand voters in the East who do not know whether they are democrats or republicans until the time comes to vote.—Roseburg Review.

And that is the way it ought to be. We ought to be thankful for the independent vote. We ought to be thankful that these are men honest and patriotic enough to leave their party, and vote for another, when they find it rotten, incapable or steeped to the eyes in iniquity. Rock-rooted republicans or rock-rooted democrats—men who will stand by their party if that party swamped the nation—are the enemies of progress and reform. It is just such men as these "several thousand voters" who strike fear into the souls of the nation's representatives. If every man could be counted on to stand by his party "through evil as well as good report," our representatives would snap their fingers at the demands of the people for reforms, and tell them to go to the devil. But they know that there is an element that can neither be bought nor sold—an element which says I will punish any man or any party that puts a bad law on the statute books or that barters away the rights of the people—and that very knowledge forces them to do better than they otherwise would. Let us be thankful for the independent voter.

France is the largest foreign creditor of Russia, holding \$1,500,000,000 of her securities, a fact which ought to promote amicable relations between the countries, particularly as the new czar may find it desirable to borrow some more money one of these days. There seems no end of the reserve fund of the French people, who are everybody's creditor, owe nobody and possess in their economy and thrift and inexhaustible mine of prosperity and abundance. They pay off enormous war indemnities with no strain or trouble whatever, finding the resources thereof in the woolen stockings of their peasantry and on occasion can drop such a trifle as \$400,000,000 into a blind ditch like that at Panama without winking. The lesson of frugality which the nation inculcates is of inestimable value to the world at large, and might be studied by our own workers with considerable advantage.

Congress is again in session. It is one of the people's biggest burdens, and one which gives the least benefit to the people. If congress did not meet in regular sessions more than once in five years it would be better for the people. If there was anything of moment for it to act on the body could be called together in special session by the president. Such an arrangement would save millions of money, now wasted, to the people and eliminate from its proceedings much of the partisanship and corruption of the present day.

If there were no laws for the collection of debts people who secure fortunes out of debts would not be able to work their arts so profitably, while those who now grow poor working and producing would secure the fruits of their labor. Debts are the causes of the few being millionaires and the many being poor and in need. Slavery and debts were born from the same womb, and what one did for the black people the other will do for the white race.

There is just one thing that will bring about diversified farming through Eastern Oregon, and that is cheap wheat. Until very recently wheat has been a very profitable crop, and as long as it was so there were no inducement and no attempt to try anything else. Now that there has ceased to be profit in wheat growing, effort will be directed in other lines, and it may prove to the general advantage of the whole country.

Some people seem to believe that the wheat crop of Argentina is to be a failure. The prosperity there has been a thorn to the flesh of our agriculturists, and is likely to fester again in about 90 days, as that republic harvests next month, and is raising more wheat this winter than ever before.

Hon. Binger Hermann is reported as saying that he is not a candidate for the senate unless there should be need of a "compromise candidate." Thus Mr. Hermann does not antagonize the would-be bosses, yet has his eye on quite a big chance. Mr. Hermann is no fool.
