This being the first masonic services conducted here, our people were very much impressed with the beauty and solemnity of the services. The deceased made a will, appointing J. W. Blake and S. S. Grider executors of his estate, and willed all of his property as follows: To little Walter Grider, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. S. Grider, \$500; to the Masonic lodge at Condon, \$100; and the balance, after all debts are paid, to little Jay Blake, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Blake.

Woodmen Camp Organized.

Mr. M. D. Roche of Portland, deputy state organizer of the Woodmen of the World, arrived here the first of the week and on Thursday evening, in the K. of P. hall, successfully instituted a camp with a charter membership of about 30 names. This is a very worthy lodge and the best and cheapest life insurance in the world. The order is only about fourteen years old, but has become very powerful and will doubtless soon be the strongest order in existence. The order is similar to the A. O. U. W., except risks and rates are much less, and is a great improvement over that order. Only men between the ages of 21 and 45 years are eligible to membership.

OBITUARY.

Death of John A. Spaulding.

[Communicated.]

On Friday, Feb. 15, 1895, John A. Spaulding died at his home near Condon. He was born in Clinton county, Mich., May 22, 1848, and lost his parents while quite young, and lived for some years with relatives. When but 16 years of age, at the call of his country, he enlisted and fought to uphold its honor. He came to Oregon about 18 years ago and has spent most of those years at and near his last home. He has been in delicate health for a number of years and suffered with heroic patience. He was an unusually intelligent and well informed man, was of a modest and unassuming disposition. No better, truer man ever lived in our midst than John A. Spaulding. It is a common remark that, "no man was ever heard to say a word against him." He seldom mentioned himself or his earlier life, so that comparatively little is known of his early history, and he left no relatives in Oregon. He was made a master mason in December, 1893, and was greatly beloved by all the members of his lodge.

The body was placed in the lodge room on Saturday evening, when a meeting of the lodge was held, and on Sunday services were held in the lodge room, after which the brethren bore the body to the church, where a host of friends had assembled to pay their respects to his memory. After appropriate services, the funeral procession marched to the masonic cemetery, where the body was consigned to Mother Earth, with impressive masonic ceremonies.

"The will of God has been accomplished."
