STAY WITH THE QUESTION.

CONDON, Feb. 25th.

EDITOR GLOBE:—If you will allow me space to say a few words I would like to call attention to the weak argument offered by the Journal in behalf of those interested in having our county court appoint a deputy clerk.

It seems to me that the very few who think a deputy clerk is needed are evading the question under discussion entirely. As I understand it, the question is, "is there sufficient county work in the clerk's office to justify the county in hiring a deputy?"

I believe myself that there is considerable work done in the clerk's office, but I also believe that it is the private business—such as land business, notary business, law business, municipal office business—and what not—that takes up a great deal of the time of the clerk and deputy.

Surely this county is not in such a prosperous condition that it can afford to appoint deputies to do the private work of its officers—or for any one else. Our taxpayers are already groaning under the enormous burden of taxation, and to further burden them with such unnecessary expense, is little short of an outrage.

Even admitting that a deputy is needed a month each time circuit court meets, there are scores of people in this county who would be glad to do the work—which is nothing but copy and amanuensis work—at \$30 or \$35 a month.

In order to try to bulldoze the county court into making it appear that there is too much work for one man to do, I have very good reason to believe that the county's work is allowed to accumulate, more or less, until county court weeks, so as to make it appear to the court that less than two men could not do the work.

The Dalles Chronicle: The bill creating two more judicial districts in Eastern Oregon passed both houses without a skip. This new arrangement will compel the appointment of one judge and two district attorneys, and will cost the people \$7500 a year.

Oregon may expect another just such a deadlock, as the one just broken, in the legislature two years hence, when Senator Mitchell comes up for re-election.

The Prineville Review doesn't want a railroad in that country. No wonder. Prineville would be 20 miles from the road and another town would be built up that would be the metropolis of the country.—Eugene Guard.

Senator Dolph seems to bear up very well under his late defeat. He is about town much as usual, and he always talks and acts as if nothing unusual had happened. He was seen yesterday, and asked if he were going back to Washington. He said: "No, I am not. There is no business to call me there. I am a citizen of Oregon, and am going to remain in the state and practice law."

Don Carlos Boyd, who had been in the employ of the Patterson Publishing Company for the past six weeks, forged three checks on the company last week for a total amount of \$55. Two of the checks were cashed at the bank. The other one, for \$25 was cashed by Robert Krick, a saloon-keeper at Heppner, and refused at the bank. Boyd then skipped out, but was arrested at Walla Walla Saturday and brought back to Heppner, where he will have to answer to the charges of forgery, embezzlement and larceny. He waived examination before Justice Freeland and was bound over to the grand jury under \$700 bonds, in default of which he languisheth in jail.
