DIVERSIFIED FARMING.

It is pretty generally conceded that the low prices for grain are caused by the cheapening of the cost of production by the use of improved labor-saving machines. And the day when a crop must be cultivated because it requires less labor than some others has passed. The crops which pay best are those that cost the most to produce, because they are grown less abundantly than the cheaper kinds. Corn, wheat and oats are grown at one-fourth the cost of former times and the old prices will never return unless the misfortune of a famine should occur. There are crops grown in this country which do not supply the home market, and one of them is onions, and this is due to the fact that they require more labor than wheat or oats. Many kinds of fruit and vegetables are below the amount required by the home market. It is not supposed that farmers will suddenly revolutionize their methods, but it will be an advantage for them to study markets and statistics and endeavor to learn what may be required. Labor should, of course, be considered in growing a crop, but it is labor that makes the value, and while it is well to cheapen the labor, yet the amount of labor required should never deter one from growing a crop. A crop that pays well one year may not be profitable the next. The farmer should keep himself well informed and be always prepared to avail himself of the advantages offered by growing a variety of crops in order to satisfy the demands of all classes.

Politics are being made very rapidly these days, and from the way the silver question is being forced to the front, it is bound to be the leading issue in the next presidential campaign. As both old parties are divided on the subject, it is highly probable there will be a re-arranging of party lines, and politicians who have heretofore been mortal enemies will be found fighting under the same banner. Politics truly makes strange bedfellows, and when democratic and republican shins get under the same blanket, the resultant kicking will be immense.—Chronicle.

Cook county, Minnesota, is one of the most thinly populated counties in the Union. It had, by the census of 1890, only 98 inhabitants, a gain of but 63 in 10 years. Bowman county, North Dakota, had 6 inhabitants, and Sheridan county had but 5; Choteau county had only 8 inhabitants, and Martin county 7. Most of these sparsely settled counties of the new states have doubtless gained considerable since 1890, but the sparsely settled counties of Texas are probably little changed in this regard. Lamb county had 4 inhabitants; Palmer, 7; Yoakum, 4, and Loving, 3.

Alley's bill fixing the age of consent passed by the legislature takes effect May 24th. It is as follows: If any person shall carnally know any female child under the age of 18 years, or shall forcibly ravish any woman of the age of 16 years or upwards, such person shall be deemed guilty of rape, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by imprisonment in the penitentiary for not less than three nor more than twenty years.

Under the new law enacted for that purpose, all pensioners receiving less than \$6 a month will be raised to that rating as soon as the necessary clerical work for that purpose can be accomplished. Not less than 4000 pensioners will be affected by the law, and the estimated increase in pay is about \$1,700,000. This law comes to the relief of a large class of pensioners who are entitled to consideration.

The long deadlock in the Idaho legislature was broken Thursday of last week by the re-election of Geo. L. Shoup to succeed himself in the U. S. senate. Mr. Shoup was born June 6, 1836, in Kittanning, Armstrong county, Pa., where he was educated and where he remained until 1858. Kittanning is ten miles from the home of the editor of this paper, and where we learned the printers' trade.

The Oklahoma legislature has just passed a law prohibiting the manufacture, sale or giving away of cigarettes or cigarette paper under a penalty of \$500 fine, one-half of which is to go to the informant. A similar law should have been passed by the Oregon legislature.

Our legislature adjourned without electing a board of railroad commissioners, and it is not likely that Governor Lord will appoint a new board. Attorney-General Idleman has filed his opinion with the governor that such appointment was not a prerogative of the chief executive, as no vacancies exist in the board. It is supposed that the attorney-general was requested to give an opinion, and, finding that the members of the present board held over until their successors were duly elected and qualified, the matter will now be at rest. The only remedy now is to have an extra session of the legislature in order to elect a new lot of state officials, which will hardly be called.

The legislature of Massachusetts by a vote of 127 to 87, has refused to give woman the ballot. This can hardly be considered a set-back to woman in general, for in the case of the Massachusetts legislature, it must be taken into consideration that the women members thereof had in mind, were the literary curios of "Boston." That they should be denied the franchise is perfectly proper, for there must be something left by which the sexes may be distinguished. Whatever is done, the "difference" existing between the sexes should not be removed.—Ex.

Some one has estimated that we have spent nearly \$470,000,000 in building churches in this land and \$500,000,000 in building jails; and that it costs \$50,000,000 a year to run the churches and \$400,000,000 to run the jails.

The editor of this paper rests easier and sleeps better now, since a question has arisen as to the illegality of collecting the income tax under the existing law.

Umatilla county has more miles of railway than any other county in Oregon—over 200. The total of the taxes paid by these companies is \$20,018.26.

Wm. Snell and family visited their relatives, M. O. Clarke and family at Condon Saturday and Sunday. Mrs. Snell is a sister of Mrs. Clarke, who has been very sick the last ten days with erysipelas.

The Douglas Co-operative Association met at Douglas on March 1st, and already has about 30 members, with a prospect to double that number by the next meeting, which will be held on March 23d.

"Wild Bill" Radzom has sold all of his cattle, about 35 head, to Tom Rhea and expects to move to The Dalles this week to reside. We are all sorry to lose Bill, especially the ladies, with whom he is very popular.

A new school house 20x40, with a hall overhead will be built here this spring. Already about \$400 is subscribed. More energy is manifested here than in lots of towns that are putting on more "dog" than this. "Keep your eye on Olex."

Mr. Fairchild, who was formerly traveling salesman for Murphy, Grant & Co., San Francisco, has established a hog ranch (or hogger) at Olex and the prospect for success is very flattering. His manager is Andy Osborn of The Dalles.

Our brand-new church is going up rapidly, the raising taking place Wednesday. Mr. France of Arlington is the carpenter, and he expects to have it ready for services on March 24th, when Rev. Greene of Arlington is billed to preach here.

Geo. Wright left Monday with about 5000 head of sheep for Chicago. We are informed that Lon Ralston, Harry Clay and Ross Beardsley accompanied him. Mr. Wright bought a number of sheep from John Harrison and Jos. Whyte of Matney Flat.

J. A. Ward is running two 14-inch gangs with 12 horses and is plowing about 13 acres per day. Joe is one of the most extensive farmers in this county, as well as one of its best citizens. He says its a "little rocky" to have to back at noons, but when he does get through he'll be in excellent trim to enjoy the 1/2 of July. He expects to plow about 1000 acres this spring.
