Rev. Curran will preach at Lone Rock next Sunday morning.

Congressman W. E. Ellis is expected to arrive in Heppner today from Washington.

Did you notice the total eclipse of the moon Sunday evening? It was a magnificent sight.

Our regular Arlington and Lone Rock letters arrived too late for this issue, but will appear next week.

We were visited by a cold snap Tuesday and Wednesday—the first cold weather here for a month.

The Journal is a week behind time again. That is how it comes to contain news of this week's happening.

S. B. Barker made a trip to Portland this week to purchase a stock of spring and summer goods for his store.

The appraisers—Alex Hardie, D. S. Brown and T. A. Renner appraised the property of J. A. Spaulding, deceased, at \$5,866.70.

Jay P. Lucas made a business trip to Lone Rock the first of the week. In consequence he is almost "laid up" with a bad cold.

Our school board met Monday evening and decided to close both departments of our public school for the present, this Friday evening.

Jay P. Lucas shipped his household effects to the Lucas farm in Polk county this week, Charley Baker taking them to Arlington Monday.

Jeddy Brown of Fossil has concluded not to apply to the county court for the appointment of county surveyor until the May term of court.

Dr. J. H. Hudson accompanied Rev. E. Curran to Heppner Saturday, returning home next day. The doctor is well pleased with Morrow's metropolis.

Miss Matilda Brown of Lone Rock was visiting friends in Condon Sunday. She expects to spend the summer with her aunt, Mrs. Mary Brown on Rock Creek.

The Smith-Cello portage-bill will go into effect May 28th, without the approval of Gov. Lord. The O. R. & N. Co. will contest the constitutionality of the act.

The GLOBE comes out a little earlier this week than usual, owing to the editor expecting to make a trip to Antelope to visit his brother, Ervin M. Shutt, of the Herald.

The Moro-Observer says that Arthur Brandenburg has just opened a barber shop in that town, for the present in the City Hotel building. His family left here this week to join him.

Budd Rinehart expects to leave here this week to spend the summer at Mountain Home, Idaho, where his brother Charley and family reside. He has another brother, William, at Boise.

It is reported that owing to the passage of the law creating a new judicial district no term of court can be held in Morrow county this spring. If this is the case it is the result of an oversight.

Seven persons were baptized in the placid waters of Rock Creek Sunday, near the Hendrix place, by Rev. Shearl, the Adventist minister, who has been holding a three-weeks' revival at that place.

We are sorry to announce that Mrs. M. O. Clarke has been dangerously sick for the last ten days with erysipelas. Myron had intended to begin assessing last week, but the sickness of his wife prevented it.

Mrs. C. A. Danneman and children, who spent the winter at Arlington for school purposes, returned home to Clem this week. In consequence Mr. Danneman is as happy again "as a nigger in a melon patch."

The Portland Sun copied a portion of the GLOBE's article last week in reference to the resignation of Jay P. Lucas, and adds: "The times are out of joint, surely, when a county clerk is willing to step down and out of office."

Senate bill, No. 321, passed by the legislature authorizes the governor to lease to any firm or persons convict labor not to exceed 10 years, at not less than 35 cents a day. The law was approved Feb. 23d, and is now in effect.

E. C. Warren, the wide-awake little traveling salesman for Eberg, Bachman & Co., and Portland Cracker Co., was in Condon Saturday, on his usual rounds. Mr. Canning, of the firm of Canning, Wallace & Co., is making the rounds with him.

C. G. Watzinger, a stockman of Bickleton, Wash., says hundreds of cattle have died in that section within the last four months from eating a weed-grass, a substance hitherto unknown to stockmen. The early rains of last fall caused a hasty growth of a grass that ripened. Usually it never ripens. He believes it has hitherto been eaten when green, and in that state was not injurious.

Revs. Curran and Zellers will begin a series of revival meetings at Condon next Sunday evening to continue a week or longer. Mr. Zellers will preach here next Sunday, morning and evening. A cordial invitation is extended to all.

John Madden of Lone Rock passed through town the first of the week with seven fine Clydesdale horses, en route to Hillsboro, where he had already found a buyer for them. John always raises good horses and has no trouble in getting good prices for them.

Mr. and Mrs. Sing, mother and step-father of Mrs. Mont Ward and John Knox, arrived here Saturday from Benton county, Arkansas, and will probably make this their future home. They are visiting at present at the home of their daughter, Mrs. Ward, just below town.

Mr. J. W. Pigg of Mayville, who had been very sick but rallied the last week or so, has suffered a relapse and is not expected to live but a very short time. His daughter, Mrs. C. H. Rinehart, who was visiting relatives here, was called over to Mayville Tuesday morning.

Albert Carnine, a young man who has been in the employ of W. L. Barker for several weeks, while chopping wood last week cut about an inch of his thumb off. Luckily for him he had the presence of mind to put it back and tie it on again while it was yet warm, and it seems determined to stay there.

The Australian ballot law in this state has been amended and provides that instead of erasing the names of candidates not desired, the voter simply makes an X before the name of the candidate desired. Instead of the names of the candidates of all parties appearing on the ballot in alphabetical order, as now, the candidates of each party hereafter will be set off separately, but must also appear in alphabetical order. It is a senseless law, but perhaps whoever framed the bill had nothing else to do.

At the regular school election held there a few days ago, Mrs. Mealy and Mrs. March were elected directors and Mrs. Froman clerk for that district. We understand there were some powerful speeches made at the meeting—but the men were "not in it." Wilson B. Smith is the 3d and hold-over director. This is the proper way for the women to make themselves heard on the suffrage question—by taking the matter in their own hands. Go in and win, is what the GLOBE holds.

Mrs. Charly Ramsey of Thirtymile was in town Monday with a load of very fine apples, which she sold at \$1.00 per bushel. She presented the GLOBE with a box of choice seedlings, and we know whereof we speak when we remark that they are good things to eat. The Ramsey ranch and orchard is among the best on the creek. The ranch being situated as it is—in the bowels of the earth—the cold and frost never penetrates it. They left their potatoes lying on top of the ground all winter, with only a few potato tops on for cover, and they did not freeze.

Geo. Jack, an industrious farmer, arrived here last week from the Palouse country with his family, and has filed on a homestead lying just south of Oliver Ward's place about three miles southeast of town. He says a number of families from that section intend to come to this section this spring to locate, but can not leave Palouse for several weeks yet, owing to the deep snow up there. They are all welcome and there is plenty of room here for more. This country needs more citizens with industry and enterprise—and fewer loafers, deadbeats, chronic growlers and moss-backs. After the ceremony the happy young couple and a number of guests repaired to the bride's home, where a grand supper was enjoyed. They were the recipients of a great many beautiful and useful wedding presents. The contracting parties are among the best and most popular people of the country, and a host of friends join the GLOBE in wishing them a happy voyage over the sea of matrimony. Sheriff Wilcox and family of this place were among the guests.

That notorious horse-thief and fugitive, Hugh Medlock, has "bobbed up" again. Friday evening of last week he came to the home of Del Rice, three miles north of town, where his wife has been stopping for a month or more. Medlock wanted her to go with him but she refused, and he then tried to catch her horse that was in the pasture, but failed in that also. Word was quickly sent to Sheriff Wilcox who, armed with a warrant and accompanied by Tom Johnson and Jay P. Lucas, started out to bag the game. Medlock got wind of what was going on, and lit out across the country in the direction of Rock creek, via Six Mile, his horse (trained for the purpose) jumping the barbed wire fences with the agility of a deer. By the time the sheriff and his deputies got out there he had over an hour's start of them. They could not follow him through the fields and were obliged to keep in the roads, which afforded the fugitive an excellent chance to escape, which he did, crossing Rock creek one mile above the French place. A short time ago Medlock was so hard pressed by the Pendleton officers that he was forced to abandon the horse (which he stole from Billy Brown of Lone Rock) and Mr. Brown went over to Pendleton last week and recovered his property.

Struggle to keep them open and fixed upon an object either real or imaginary, and before you are aware of it the struggle will have ended and sleep will be victorious.
