Miss Birdie Downing is expected home from The Dalles today (Friday) and will begin teaching at Mayville next Monday.

April came in like a sore-tailed lion but we hope it won't go out that way.

The weather has been very rough and blustery this week.

Miss Bessie Fitzwater has secured the Gooseberry school for the spring term, commencing March 24th. She taught in the same district a year or so ago.

Mr. and Mrs. Tom Stricklin, former residents of Condon, are now running a hotel at Dufur. They had been in the hotel business at Barlow for several years.

Our citizens have concluded to begin at once the work of rebuilding the church, which was wrecked by the storm Monday. About 3/4 of the old lumber can be used for the new church.

Lewiston Teller: Lester and Arthur Coffin, wholesale and retail merchants of North Yakima, have decided to locate a branch house in this city. They have concluded to erect a large tent in the business district of the city and carry on an extensive general merchandise business, dealing principally in a number of Indian goods.

Tuesday night a drunken man was arrested and put in the city jail at Prineville. Next morning at an early hour, the jail was discovered to be on fire, but when the discovery was made the fire had made such progress that the building could not be approached. It is presumed that the prisoner in some manner set fire to the building which proved to be his funeral pyre.

Tom Dawson met with a serious accident at Fossil Sunday last. He and Light Morris were shooting squirrels with a 22-calibre rifle and while Morris was in the act of extricating a bullet which became fast in the gun it "went off," the bullet going clean through Dawson's leg below the knee. As no bones were fractured Tom will be all right again in a few days.

There will be an entertainment and basket social, given by the ladies and friends of the Congregational church in the Armory hall on Monday evening. A short program will be rendered before the social and selling of the baskets. The proceeds of the evening will be devoted to rebuilding the recently-wrecked Congregational church. Everyone is welcome. No charge for admission.

A \$300-span of horses belonging to Mr. C. B. Durbin of Antelope met death Tuesday in a very singular manner. Charley and George Dodd were up on a plateau cutting down juniper trees, hauling them to the edge of the steep bank and dumping them over, so that the wood could be procured from the canyon beneath. In handling a large tree up to the dumping place, the team got a little too close to the edge, and down went horses, tree and all, over a precipice nearly 300 feet high. When the tree started to roll, the horses struggled frantically to free themselves from the death trap, but it was of no use. When they reached the edge of the steep precipice they both reared high in the air and fell over backwards, falling about 150 feet before striking the rocks beneath, and then rolled about 150 feet further into the canyon. The scene was an awful one to the two men who witnessed it, and when they reached the canyon they found the poor brutes with hardly an unbroken bone in their bodies. It was Mr. Durbin's best team, and he would not have taken \$300 in cash for it.—Herald.

A Terrific Storm.

The worst wind storm ever experienced in this county struck Condon Monday evening about three o'clock. Dangerous heavy black clouds were seen approaching from the southwest about 3 o'clock and almost in less time than it takes to bat an eye, a fearful tornado struck the town with all the fury of a million demons. To add to its terror it carried with it such a mixture of real estate, clouds, chips and boards that nothing else could be seen, and for about three minutes our people must have thought the judgment day had arrived at last. Buildings swayed and cracked like rifle reports and for a few seconds it looked as if the town would be swept from the face of the earth.

But within five minutes from the time it began the worst of it was over, and then the work of destruction could be seen. Our beautiful new Congregational church was completely wrecked, being tilted over on one side, and can never be used again until it is torn down and rebuilt. The new organ in it was also ruined. None of the dwelling houses in town were destroyed, but the roof of L. W. Darling's barn was blown off; the woodhouse of W. L. Barker was blown over and rolled several rods, as was also W. A. Goodwin's smokehouse and the Globe's woodshed; the brick flue in Bill Dunlap's house was blown off, also the stovepipes of several other houses, besides a number of those small "business houses," in size about 4x5 feet, took a decided tumble to themselves. The large sign on the livery stable of Johnson & Wilcox was also blown down. For awhile the Globe factory seemed to want to take wings and fly away, but perhaps it was the paper's powerful influence that held it down.

Anyway it didn't go, we are pleased to state. Some fellow jokingly remarked that a good way to insure it against being blown away would be to put a heavy mortgage on it to hold it down—a luxury which it doesn't enjoy at present. (But perhaps right here is a good place to remark that unless some of our delinquents "pungle up" pretty soon we may be obliged to put on a coat of that kind of stuff.)

The only damage we have heard of in the country is that Dan Rinehart's new house on his homestead three miles east of town was blown over, also the new school house on Wm. Campbell's place, where J. A. McMorris was teaching at the time. Luckily no one was in either of the buildings at the time. The course of the storm does not seem to have covered a score of country over ten or fifteen miles wide, but was considerably longer than that, as it hit The Dalles, Heppner and Walla Walla a wide-swipe on its mad journey. A good deal of damage was done at the latter place.
