A very large and appreciative crowd enjoyed the entertainment given in the hall here Monday evening by the ladies and friends of the Congregational church. A delightful program was rendered, and \$17.50 was realized from the selling of the lunch baskets, which will go towards the rebuilding of the wrecked church.

Elsewhere in this issue is a letter from Prof. M. G. Royal, president of the State Normal School at Weston, to our school superintendent, giving him authority to name three persons for free scholarships in that excellent school. Those wishing to avail themselves of that opportunity should apply to Mr. Kennedy at once.

Hon. T. B. Hoover and wife and daughter Hattie came over from Fossil Friday and visited their friends, Sheriff Wilcox and family until next day, when T. B. and wife returned home. With the Pendleton scouring mill near by, sheepmen may have their wool sold direct to eastern mills and save many intermediate charges incident to handling wool in the grease as has been the custom, through a series of commission men. The experience of growers who sold in Pendleton last year show fully a cent a pound saving.

Mrs. Jas. S. Wheeler and children came over this week from their Weston home to their home on Pine creek. Her husband met them at Arlington with private conveyance, arriving home Wednesday. Jim expects to try his luck this summer prospecting on the John Day river for gold, which he believes can be found over there in abundance.

As advertised in the GLOBE, the J. M. Campbell place in Ferry Canyon was sold Saturday by T. G. Johnson, assignee. Quite a crowd of people were present, but not very many seemed to be "land hungry." The ranch, consisting of 160 acres of deeded land, on which is a pretty fair cabin, was knocked down to Snipston Bill Brown for \$100.

Polk county now has almost as many goats as sheep. William Savage and son and Allen Yocom have at least 600; John Stump, west of Monmouth, has in the neighborhood of 200, and many others have bands of from 20 to 75. Goats are just now extra good property, for they will shear from 3 to 5 pounds of mohair, which brings about 20 cents a pound.

Our town might have had a large fire Friday morning. The storm of the Monday before unjoined the stovepipe between the ceiling and roof of the law office of T. R. Lyons, and when he put on a fire Friday morning the sparks at once set fire to the roof around the flue. The flames were rapidly gaining headway when discovered, but a few buckets of water soon extinguished it, just in the nick of time to avert a terrible conflagration. Too much care can not be exercised in the inspection of flues. They should be examined every month or oftener. A better way still is to build brick flues.

J. H. Miller and Dunn Bros. have dissolved partnership and divided the old stock. Mr. Miller has moved his half of the stock into the building adjoining the store, in order to make room for a new stock of goods which will arrive next week for Dunn Bros. After Mr. Miller closes out his stock of goods he expects to make a trip to the Baker City country on the hunt for a new location. We venture the assertion that he is leaving a better place than he will find. Mr. Miller and family are good citizens and their many friends hope they will yet conclude to not leave Condon.

Mrs. Brock, an old widow lady who has been living alone on her homestead on Rock creek came to town Wednesday for the purpose of swearing out a search warrant to have the premises of "Wild Bill" Radzom and his family searched with a view to finding a lot of her personal property, which was stolen from her house during her absence a few weeks ago. Mrs. Brock claims to have sufficient evidence to warrant her in believing that the above parties are the burglars, and she is going to "put them through" for it by means of the strong arm of the law.

A writer in an exchange says: I discovered many years ago that wood could be made to last longer than iron in the ground, but thought the process so simple that it was not well to make a stir about it. I would as soon have poplar, basswood, or ash as any other kind of timber for fence posts. I have taken out basswood posts after having been set seven years that were as sound when taken out as when put in the ground. Time and weather seemed to have no effect upon them. The posts can be prepared for less than two cents apiece. This is the receipt: Take boiled linseed oil and stir in pulverized coal to the consistency of paint. Put a coat of this over the timber, and there is not a man who will live to see it rot.

A brilliant wedding took place here on Tuesday morning, the contracting parties being "Wild Bill" Radzom and Mrs. Nancy Wilkins. They were married in the clerk's office by Rev. E. Curran. This rather hasty marriage is the outcome of their being indicted Monday by the grand jury, on a charge of lewd cohabitation; and upon the advice of their attorney they "joined jiblets" and their two innocent little hearts now thump as one. As is usual in cases of this kind when the guilty parties marry, the case against them was dismissed on motion of the district attorney. Their marriage, however, may be a case of "jumping out of the skillet into the frying pan," as we are informed that the blushing bride has another living husband from whom she has never been divorced. The way of the transgressor is exceedingly tough.
