Our county treasurer being away for a couple of weeks and his books being posted up to April 1st only, Supt. Kennedy can not ascertain the exact amount of school funds on hand. Therefore he will not apportion the school funds until about the middle of May. This will make it all the better for the various districts, as by that time the larger portion of the taxes will be paid in and there will of course be more to apportion. Taxes are rolling in pretty lively now.

Budd Enyart informs us that owing to his inability to raise over \$100 of his \$150 fine, he will perhaps board out \$50 worth of the fine in jail and at the end of 25 days he will pay the \$100 already raised and thus settle the matter. He can not be jailed for the costs, and that part of the fine will be paid by the state of Oregon.

The Odd Fellows will have a big blow-out at Condon next Friday, 26th, in the Armory hall. It will be the 70th anniversary of the order. In the afternoon Rev. Zellers of Fossil, a member of the order, will deliver a lecture on the merits of the order, to which all are invited. In the evening a lodge will be organized here.

Circuit court adjourned Saturday evening. As will be seen in the court proceedings, Judge Bradshaw granted a change of venue to Sherman county in the cases of the state vs. Clarence Zachary and state vs. Clarence Zachary and Elbel Clarno indicted for cattle stealing. These cases will be disposed of at Moro at the October term of court.

Mrs. Barnard, wife of the late Hon. Timothy Barnard, was taken to the asylum this week from her home near Fossil. The unfortunate old lady has lost her reason to such an extent that at times it is dangerous for her to be at liberty, hence her removal to the asylum. Sheriff Wilcox, assisted by J. P. Lucas, left Condon Wednesday with her, en route to Salem.

A new order called "Orientals" is being organized in nearly every town in the country. The main object and benefit of the order is for what fun there is in it—and they say there is lots of it. Ed Smith and Frank Sharte of Arlington assisted in organizing a lodge of that kind at Condon last week, which met here three nights last week. A great many joined and had doodles of fun.

Last week there was some suspicion that Bill Radzom skipped out and left his "huxie-duxie" (wife) but it isn't so. They are living together in Bill's dugout on 8-mile as happy as a pair of clams in a foot of mud. For a change, we learn that about every day Bill gives Geo. Wilkins a terrific thumping, because Geo. "gave him away" to the grand jury. Bill and his family intend to move to Arlington soon.

Mrs. Mary Connelly of Portland came up last week and has taken charge of the kitchen work for Mrs. Maddock at the hotel. Mrs. Maddock informs us that she is very well pleased with her hired help—Mrs. Davis and Mrs. Connelly. She secured both of them by applying to the employment agency at Portland called "Girls' Home," and recommends that place to any one who needs female help.

Those who claim to know whereof they speak say that in a year or so from now horses will bring the same prices that they did three years ago. As a reason for this prediction they claim that the breeding of horses has been almost entirely abandoned since the prices have dropped so low, and that this will consequently lessen the number and raise the price. There is abundance of room for improvement in this line.

We are pleased to note that several of our citizens are taking the Globe's advice and building brick flues in their buildings. Let the good work go on, as it may be the means of saving the town from being wiped out by fire—since our means for extinguishing fire is not the best in the world anyway. In this respect perhaps it would be well for our city council to imitate the Fossil city council and pass an ordinance compelling the owners to build brick flues in every house in town.

It will surprise our Eastern readers to learn that D. C. Henry, whose excellent farm lies four miles south of Condon, is cutting wheat this week with a reaper. Mr. Henry did not get through cutting last fall when the threshers quit work, so he just left it till this spring. The grain is in just as good condition now as it was last fall and will yield just as much to the acre. This speaks volumes for our mild climate and fertility of the soil. This is the choicest portion of the United States, and considering the large amount of vacant land yet in this county, the population of the county ought to be ten times as great as it is at present.

Messrs. E. J. Johnson and L. C. Edwards, two young men, the former of La Grande and the latter of Arlington, have established a drug store in this city to be known as the "Orange Front," and opened for business on the 12th inst. They occupy the store building formerly occupied by Mr. W. E. Grace. The young men come highly recommended, Mr. Johnson having been engaged in the drug business at La Grande for several years past, and Mr. Edwards is one of the directors of the Arlington bank, and also mayor of that town.—Baker City Blade.
