Sheep shearing has begun in full blast in this section. Sheep are in excellent condition and the yield will be unusually large.

W. J. Edwards and Henry Wilkins delivered at Arlington this week the cattle which they recently sold to F. M. Lacey, the former 58 head and the latter 168 head. Mr. Lacey will ship them to Omaha.

Main street is being improved this week, as per ordinance passed by the city council. It requires considerable filling in some places, and lots of work, but when completed it will be a great improvement to the town.

A number of her friends gave Miss Louella Maddock a delightful surprise party at her home Monday evening, in honor of her 18th birthday. An excellent supper was also enjoyed by the guests. Miss Louella was the recipient of some beautiful presents.

An error last week made the GLOBE say that E. W. Tobey was one of the two men from this county drawn to serve as jurors in the U. S. district court at Portland. It should have read E. O. Tobey, instead. The Journal made the same mistake—the result of its usual habit of stealing items from the GLOBE and not giving credit for same.

The Mid-Columbia Association of Congregational Churches and Ministers will meet at Condon next Tuesday and Wednesday, April 30th and May 1st. A great many ministers and other persons from a distance will be present as delegates, and the program which they will render will be highly instructive and interesting to all who hear it. Services will be conducted in the Armory hall.

Mr. and Mrs. Slater of Lost Valley went to The Dalles this week to get their little 4-year-old girl, which was brought to that place from Portland, where she has been under the treatment of Dr. Strong the last two years. This is the unfortunate little child that drank some icy water a couple of years ago and which lingered in the jaws of death so long. She is slowly recovering now.

The new road from Thirtymile to Condon is now almost completed, and some travel is already being done over it. We understand that, with few exceptions, the work is first-class throughout. The new road will not be open for travel until it is accepted by the county court, which meets week after next. It is such a good easy grade that it will prove a blessing to all tenantry south of Thirtymile, who have heretofore been obliged to travel the horse-killing "backbone."

Miss Nettie Schilling, who is teaching in the district just south of town, met with a serious accident Sunday last. While riding horseback on Snipion creek her horse scared and jumped suddenly, throwing her off backwards on her head among the rocks. She was unconscious for a short time, but when able to she walked to Jim Brown's place, where she is boarding, leading her horse, which she found on the way. It was a narrow escape, but Mr. Brown informs us that besides a few slight cuts and bruises Miss Schilling feels about as well again as usual.

ANOTHER KILLING.

Henry Grider Shot and Instantly Killed by Harry Clay.

Our town was thrown into the wildest excitement Sunday afternoon, when Claude Randall of Olex rode into town and announced that Harry Clay had shot and killed Henry Grider early Sunday morning at the former's home on Rock creek, two miles west of Olex, and that Clay had come in and given himself up to the justice of the peace at Olex, H. D. Randall. Young Randall's mission to Condon was to notify the dead man's relatives here of the tragedy.

Sheriff Wilcox being absent, his deputy, Tom Johnson, and J. W. Blake left at once for the scene, followed by Columbus Grider and Del Rice. Coroner Goodwin was absent also, but upon his return an hour or so later he left at once for Olex, accompanied by the Globe man. When they arrived there at 7 o'clock, Justice Randall had just finished holding the inquest over the body, which had been removed from Clay's place shortly after the killing to the school house at Olex. The jury, subpoenaed by Tom Johnson, consisted of L. O. Ralston, foreman; H. J. Nott, J. W. McKinney, J. A. Crum, Mat Chambers, L. C. Ashbaugh. The preliminary examination was set for the next day, and Dist. Atty. Jayne notified to appear for the state and J. M. Johns for the defendant.

The coroner not deeming it necessary to hold another inquest, the corpse was brought to Condon Sunday night and buried next day in the cemetery here by the side of his father's grave, Rev. Curran preaching the funeral sermon.

At the preliminary examination Monday, after examining two witnesses for state—John Butler, who witnessed the killing, and J. R. Ralston, who was one of the first on the ground—the defendant waived further examination, and Justice Randall bound him over to the grand jury in the sum of \$4000, the charge being murder in the second degree. The information was sworn out by J. W. Blake, L. O. Ralston, T. G. Woodland, Frank Stricklin, Tip Mobley and Henry Wilkins are his bondsmen, each justifying in the sum of \$1000.

The probabilities are that a long string of circumstances lead up to the killing, the particulars briefly being about as follows: Henry Grider was a single man about 28 years old, and had been in the employ of Clay for over a year, as a farm hand. Up to the time of Clay's return on April 5th from Chicago, where he had shipped about 4000 head of sheep, it appears they had always been the best of friends, and Clay had told several persons that he never had more trustworthy or better hand on his place than Henry Grider. The particulars that led up to the terrible tragedy we will not endeavor to give, but that will all be brought to the surface in the trial at the fall term of circuit court.

Sunday morning early, John Butler, a brother of Mrs. Clay, (who was also in the employ of his brother-in-law), and Grider arose and went to the barn to do the chores—milk the cows, etc. When they returned to the house about 20 minutes before 6 o'clock, Butler remained in the yard just in front of the porch and Grider took the wash-pail to the cook-stove and got some warm water to wash with. He was walking to the sink or washing place at the well a few feet from the porch, with the pan of water in his right hand, when Clay, according to his own statement and that of Butler, stepped out of the kitchen door onto the porch and said: "Henry, I want a settlement out of you this morning." According to the testimony, Grider never said a word, but pulled a 38-calibre pistol out of his front pants pocket and with his left hand fired at Clay, the bullet missing him and striking a cupboard by his side. Clay jumped inside of the door and took down a shotgun from just over the door and stepping out on the porch took aim and shot him, at a distance of about twelve feet, the entire charge hitting him just under the arm in the left side, making a hole nearly two inches across. All Grider said was, "oh, my God," and fell stone dead.

Clay then rode to Olex and gave himself up, as before stated. Those who went to get the body found it just where he fell, with one pistol in his pocket and another on the ground at his left hand. The only persons about the place at the time were Harry Clay and his wife and child, Harry's father, (from Portland), who was visiting them, and who also saw Grider fall from where he was sitting in the kitchen and John Butler and Henry Grider.

It is a very serious matter, but Clay claims that he killed him in self-defense, and the public will not know what led up to the unfortunate affair until the facts are presented in the trial, which doubtless will be the most important of its kind ever held in this county. The deceased was a brother of Mrs. J. W. Blake, Mrs. Del Rice, S. S. and C. C. Grider, of this place. His aged mother, who lives with her son Shed, is completely prostrated over the affair.
