Judge Mariner and Commissioners Ralston and Clymer are in town this week holding the regular session of county court.

County Commissioner E. M. Clymer expects to make a business trip to Portland just after the expiration of this term of county court.

Marshal Thurnagle has ordered a number of our citizens to work out their road tax on the street and bridge in the lower end of town today and tomorrow.

Last week's Globe made it say that R. E. Wilson's public sale comes off on May 10th, which is a mistake. The sale takes place on May 21st at Arlington.

Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Palmer of Ajax stopped in town Wednesday night and next day proceeded to Schuttler Flat to visit their daughter, Mrs. Dan Cameron.

Mrs. Chas. Ripshart, who had been visiting her relatives here and at Mayville for a couple of months, left Tuesday for her home at Mountain Home, Idaho.

W. A. Goodwin, assisted by J. R. Clark, is tearing down the wrecked church this week, having secured the job for \$30. The work of rebuilding will begin soon.

The several heavy rain showers of the last week will be worth many thousands of dollars to this section, as rain was badly needed. The prospect for a large harvest of grain is very flattering.

Gene Smith went over to Mountain Home, Idaho, this week on the hunt for a new location. We doubt very much if he will ever find a better location for a harness shop than he now has at Condon.

Died, at the home of her sister on Eightmile on May 5th, Mrs. Kate Short, an old widow lady, who formerly resided on her ranch between Clem and Olex. The burial took place at Olex on Monday at 2 o'clock.

Choice wheat at the Diamond mills is quoted at 40 cents a bushel. This is the highest price paid for over a year, and higher than has been offered at any point east of the Cascade mountains during that period.—Times-Mountaineer.

"Little Phil" Heppner informs us that he is now paying 30c for first-class wheat, and that he sold the first three clips of wool at Arlington, paying therefor 8c a pound for one clip and 7 1/2 for the other two. "Little Phil" is a rustler from "way back."

We learn from the Journal that two "female" bicycles have made their appearance in that town. We always knew that Fossil is a very prolific place; but if they have got to raising bicycles over there it evidently is entitled to the whole bakery.

A very fine skiff about 15 feet in length was brought out from the railroad last week for Charley Sears and Billy Keys to use in the John Day river. If it is as hard to break as a new bicycle, there will be several duckings down there before long.

J. S. McKinney was over to the city Wednesday from his sawmill. He informs us that his mill is running full blast and turning out the best lumber to be had in Eastern Oregon. He says he is prepared to fill any and all orders for lumber that may come in.

A special train of 15 cars, loaded with yearling calves for Gilman & French, came up the line Sunday and were unloaded at Heppner. There were 800 head in the 15 cars, and they will be driven over the mountains to the Grant county range of Gilman & French.

James Tatom, a pioneer of 1852, dropped dead at Monmouth, Oregon, Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, while talking with a neighbor. He was 63 years of age, and the eldest brother of Geo. Tatom of Condon. The deceased was a well-known democratic politician.

J. H. Miller of Condon, Gilliam county, Oregon, will open up a large stock of goods furnishing goods in the Idaho Saddlery company's building, corner Main and Kimball streets, in Caldwell. Mr. Miller expects to be ready for business in a very short time.—Caldwell (Idaho) Argus.

Mont Downing arrived home last week from Baker county. He has concluded to establish a small merchandise store at Cracker City, a small mining town 35 miles west of Baker City. He went to Portland this week to purchase a stock of goods and will be ready for business in a short time.

S. B. Barker arrived home Tuesday from Chicago. He had good luck shipping his 2400 head of sheep, but the price having fallen by the time he got there, he did not realize any more for them at Chicago than he was offered for his sheep at Arlington before shipping. Joe Wilson has also returned.

The ministers and others who attended the Congregational conference at Condon last week are loud in their praise for the kind and hospitable treatment accorded them by the good people of Condon. At noon on Wednesday a very fine dinner was served in the hall, which was greatly enjoyed by all present.

School Supt. Kennedy, assisted by Miss Beattie Fitzwater and Mrs. F. B. Stevens, is conducting the regular quarterly examination at Condon this week. Five applicants are being examined, viz: Mrs. L. G. Edelman of Mayville, Mrs. Phania Angell of Fossil, Mrs. S. I. Stratton of Lone Rock, Miss Mabel Halstead of Condon, and Mr. Henry J. Nott of Olex.

H. N. Frazer took charge of the clerk's office Wednesday, the county court having approved his bonds. Mr. Lucas leaves tomorrow for his future home in Polk county. He will ride horseback to The Dalles and ship his three head of horses by boat from that point. There is probably not a man in Gilliam county so well and favorably known to everybody in the county as is Jay P. Lucas, and he leaves a host of friends in this county who regret to see him go, but all wish him and his wife well in their new home.

Mr. Francis Clarno arrived from Portland Thursday. Mr. Clarno is the owner of The Surprise and Ornament mines at Greenhorn mountain, silver properties, and he will leave today via the S. V. R. R. for the mines, says the Baker City Democrat.

Since early last fall Mr. Clarno has had a force of men doing development work on these properties and if the reports he has received from his foreman are true he has the greatest mine in the west. He gives the statement as received by him that his men are now working in a seven-foot ledge, assays from which have given a return of 1000 ounces to the ton.

If Mr. Clarno finds his mine as good as reported or anything like it he will at once commence the shipping of ore to the smelter.
