GLOBOSITIES.

Dr. Hogan made a professional visit to the Mayville country Tuesday. Miss Mabel Halstead began teaching the Lost Valley school Monday last. H. B. Hendricks made a trip to Antelope the first of the week on legal business.

Our regular weekly letters from Arlington and Lone Rock arrived too late for this issue. A. P. Lacy, who had been working for Allartman for the last year or so, left the week to try his luck in Arizona.

M. A. Darling left Monday for Salem, to represent the Condon I. O. O. F. lodge at the Grand Lodge, which met there Wednesday.

Chas. Fix is still making improvements. This week he is building a granary, on either side of which will be a large wagonshed.

Mrs. V. E. Houston returned home to Pendleton this week. Her daughter, Mrs. Frazer, and children accompanied her for a few weeks visit.

L. O'Connor, the old shoemaker, formerly of Condon, but for the last year of Heppner, is in this section again, and will probably open another shop here.

We learn that Bob Robinson of Arlington and Miss Sadie Dyer of Mayville were married last Sunday, but cannot vouch for the truthfulness of the rumor.

Miss E. D. Meek has taken charge of the Mayville school for about two weeks or so, as the regular teacher, Miss Bird Downing, is sick and not able to teach at present.

L. Parker, the stage man, expects to move with his family to Condon next week from Fossil. They will occupy the Frank Platter house, just south of the Globe office.

A very nice party was given at Maddock's hotel Friday evening, in honor of J. P. Lucas before his departure. Games, music and a fine supper was the order of the evening.

Dr. Hogan is having the lumber hauled for a new addition to his residence. He expects to have rustic put on the old part, and the whole building painted and improved generally.

Condon has decided to celebrate the glorious 4th. Arrangements to that end are being made and it is safe to predict that it will be, as usual, the best celebration in the county.

S. Bryan came over from the Sound this week with a view to settling in this section. He went over to Lost Valley today to look at the Tom Barton place, which is for sale by Charley White.

Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Halstead expect to make a trip to Portland next week where Mrs. Halstead will have an oculist remove from her eye a tumor, which has caused her considerable pain and trouble the last year or two.

Rev. E. Curran will preach in the school house next Sunday, morning and evening. The morning service will be preceded by the children's sermon and in the evening he will give a report of the Christian Endeavor convention.

A letter from Jas. Snipes of The Dalles informs us that wheat is selling there for 42c a bushel. He says wheat has not been selling at The Dalles at as low price as 37c since about April 20th. We are glad to note the steady rise in the price of this cereal.

Parties who are obliged to travel the Maddock grade on the north side of Thirty mile are justly complaining about a band of sheep that is being herded along the road, which is kept full of rocks thereby. It is a dangerous practice and should be discontinued.

A bicycle was sent out from Arlington last week to Ed Moore to raffle off at Condon. The numbers, ranging from 10c to \$1.50, are nearly all sold, and within a few days some one will be the owner of a bicycle at a small expense to himself. The bicycle craze has struck Condon broadside.

The new road out of 30-mile has been lined all week with teams hauling wheat to Arlington. They all say the county could not have expended a like amount of money to better advantage than in the opening of this new road. It will prove a blessing for all teamsters living south of Thirty mile.

Al Henshaw expects to leave tomorrow for Portland, to serve as a juror in the U. S. district court, which convenes next Tuesday. The term will probably last until July, but Mr. Henshaw will likely get excused after about a two weeks' siege, owing to his business here requiring his attention.

Nearly every mail brings us letters from different portions of the U. S. asking for information concerning this section. The people are rapidly learning that this is the most favored portion of the country, east or west, and we may expect a large immigration soon. Come right along; there is plenty of room for more.

School Supt. Kennedy this week made the April apportionment of school funds for Gilliam county. The whole number of districts in the county receiving funds is 43, of which three are joint districts. The apportionment is \$50 to each district and \$25 to each of the three joint districts. Mr. Kennedy informs us that the August apportionment will likely make up the usual amount.

The dispatches bring news of a fierce norther on Lake Michigan, snow seven inches deep all through Northern Michigan and Wisconsin, killing frosts in Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia, New York and Illinois. In Oregon we are enjoying fine weather, and crops are making headway with prospects of a large yield.

A. Smythe and W. E. Fowler of Arlington were in this section this week buying sheep. They have already purchased about 1900 yearlings, paying therefor \$1 per head, from the following parties: Fred Monroe, 700 head; T. A. Renner, 600 head; and Howard Tobey, 600 head. Sheep over one year old are selling at about \$1.50 per head.

The well known Portland drummers, T. F. Canning and E. C. Warren, were in Condon several days this week on business. Mr. Canning informed us that Ed Copner has lost his position as traveling salesman, owing to a prolonged spree which he has not yet recovered from. Ed's friends in this county are sorry to learn of his misfortune.

Rev. E. Curran returned Monday last from Salem where he has been attending a large and enthusiastic Christian Endeavor convention. About 500 delegates were present and much good work was reported along endeavor lines during the past year. Rev. F. E. Clark, D. D. of Boston, the famous founder of endeavorism, was present during most of the session and delivered some very fine addresses.

Mrs. Mary Connelly who has been assisting Mrs. Maddock with her work in the hotel for the last month, expects to leave today for her home in Portland. Her husband, who is a traveling salesman, has just returned from an extended trip to the Sandwich Islands, where he was sent in the interest of the houses he represents. Miss Louella Maddock will accompany Mrs. Connelly and visit in the city a month or so.

Four of the five applicants examined last week at Condon were successful in securing certificates. Although her standing was very good in most branches, Mrs. S. I. Stratton failed to secure a certificate. H. J. Nott received a 1st grade, with 92 per cent; Mrs. Phania Angell a 1st grade with 90 per cent; Mrs. Edelman a 3d grade, with 75 per cent. Miss Mabel Halstead took the examination for a state diploma, and her papers have been forwarded to the state board of examiners at Salem.

John G. Maddock, the Goldendale banker and lawyer, and a nephew of John Maddock of Condon, had published in the Oregonian of May 6th, the following letter: "There appears in the Oregonian of April 30 a query from Mr. J. C. Jameson, of Zena, Or., relative to Mr. William Cooper's invention. The inventor is Harben M. Cooper, a native of Gallatin county, Kentucky, who came to the mines of California in the year 1849, and settled in the Polk county hills of Oregon, near the late Colonel J. W. Nesmith, in the year 1853. William is a son. It is generally believed that Mr. Cooper has invented a machine that will work perfectly to cut and thresh wheat right in the field. It will be drawn by eight horses, and will get over 25 acres per day. There will be but two men on the machine, one the driver and the other to sack and drop the sacks, four in a place. Mr. Cooper is now building a machine in Goldendale."

G. W. Humphrey of Portland, U. S. Deputy Marshal, arrived here Friday with a warrant for the arrest of Harry Halstead, indicted by the federal grand jury at Portland on a charge of cutting timber for sale on government land. Special Deputy Sheriff Ray Henson went over to Lost Valley and brought Harry to town and next day he left for Portland, in company with Mr. Humphrey. There Harry learned that D. Cantwell of Lost Valley, whom Harry says "has had it in for him" for several years (for fancied grievances arising out of competition in the sawmill business) had gone to Portland last week and presented the matter before the federal officers, from which information the indictment was found. Harry returned home Wednesday, being allowed to go on his own recognizance. He informed us that he was given ten days in which to plead, and will plead not guilty, and stand trial. He feels confident that it is simply a case of spitework on the part of the prosecuting witness, and that he will have no trouble in establishing his innocence.

The long-looked-for Examiner prize drawing has come off at last, and, as usual, thousands of people are disappointed again because they did not win the \$10,000 farm. It was won this time by Mrs. Sarah Winterbotham of Portland, and all the other large prizes were won by Californians.
