San Francisco, May 31.—Theodore Durrant was arraigned this morning in the superior court for the murder of Blanche Lamont and Minnie Williams, pleading not guilty in each case. The defense was given five days to demur the information. Both cases were set for trial July 22. The Blanche Lamont case is to be tried first. The attorneys for the defense gave notice that they would move for a change of venue, but said they were anxious for a speedy trial.

The Power and Wealth of the United States.

NOTED ENGLISHMAN'S OPINION

As Regards Physical, Mechanical and Intellectual Force of Nations, Nothing Compares With Us.

New York, May 31.—The English statistician, Michael G. Mulhall, publishes in the June number of the North American Review just issued an article on "The Power and Wealth of the United States." Mr. Mulhall's conclusion is that "if we take a survey of mankind in ancient or modern times as regards the physical, mechanical and intellectual force of nations, we find nothing to compare with the United States in this present year of 1895," and that the United States possesses by far the greatest productive power in the world. He asserts that the absolute effective force of the American people is now more than three times what it was in 1860, and that the United States possesses almost as much energy as Great Britain, Germany and France, collectively, and the ratio falling to each American is more than what two Englishmen or Germans have at their disposal.

He points out by careful comparison between the conditions in these different countries, that an ordinary farm hand in the United States raises as much grain as three in England, four in France, five in Germany and six in Austria. One man in America can produce as much flour as will feed 250, whereas, in Europe, one man feeds only 30 persons. Mr. Mulhall calls especial attention to the fact that the intellectual power of the great republic is in harmony with the industrial and mechanical, 87 per cent of the total population over eight years of age being able to read and write. He adds: "It may be fearfully asserted that in the history of the human race, no nation ever before possessed 41,000,000 instructed citizens."

The writer sets forth in regard to the growth of the wealth of the United States, that the increment in the period from 1821 to 1890 was 901 millions of dollars, which sum is one milliard over the total wealth of Great Britain. In classifying the whole wealth of the Union under the heads of urban and rural, he finds that rural agricultural wealth has only quadrupled in forty years, while urban wealth has multiplied sixteen fold. In an important series of figures it is shown that the "rise in wealth and the increase of wages came almost hand in hand." In dealing with the development of farm values Mr. Mulhall makes the following statement: "If the United States had no urban population or industries whatever, the advance of agricultural interest would be enough to claim the admiration of mankind, for it has no parallel in history."

Dinnerberger Lowered the Mile Record.
Louisville, May 31.—F. M. Dinnerberger won fresh laurels today. He lowered the mile record for flying start, paced, the time being 1:45 flat. The former record of 1:48 3-5 was held by Tyler, made at Waltham, October 27, 1894. The "quad" team that paced Dinnerberger was composed of O'Connor, Terrill, Coburn and Hamilton. Dinnerberger hung on to the "quad" until they reached the stretch, when they gradually pulled away from him, finishing first by about fifty feet. Dinnerberger finished good and strong, and the feat was accomplished with apparent ease.

MUST PAY INTEREST.

Several Obstacles in the Way of Mr. Egan's Receivership.

Omaha, May 31.—Mr. Egan cannot gain possession of the Oregon Short Line and Utah Northern lines until the American Loan & Trust Co. complies with Judge Sanborn's order, which must be extended by orders yet to be made by Judge Gilbert at Portland, at a hearing set for Monday next, and Judge Merritt, at Salt Lake, at a hearing not yet set.

Judge Sanborn's order, extended by the other jurisdictions, requires the American Loan & Trust Co. to immediately pay all defaulted first mortgage interest on the entire system. The interest in default is now \$1,000,000, including the interest of the Utah Northern consolidated 5s, amounting to \$46,000. This amount will be reduced by the application of \$550,000, which Judge Sanborn yesterday afternoon, upon further consideration, determined it would be safe to direct the present receivers to advance for that purpose. Efforts were made to secure an agreement from the representative of the American Loan & Trust Co. that the interest on the Utah Northern consolidated bonds will also be paid, but the efforts were fruitless. Judge Sanborn further requires that company to meet all future accruing first mortgage interest payments, the largest of which falls due in the next two or three months. While the present receivers will make no contest at Portland, the Oregon Short Line and Utah Northern railway Company and many of its bond holders will contest the right to make any order for raising money by receiver's certificates to pay off the interest which the American Loan & Trust Co. must pay, and any such order if made will be at once appealed from.

From a Union Pacific Standpoint.

Omaha, May 31.—Senator Thurston said that while the receivers could not claim a complete victory, they were thoroughly satisfied with the equitable and just order made by Judge Sanborn in the Oregon Short Line case. He said the receiver of the property would take it with many burdens, and he gave forth the impression that the order was simply the opening gun in what promised to be the most exciting campaign in Western railroad annals. Mr. W. S. Pierce, representing the first mortgage interests, thought the value of receiver's certificates would be greatly abridged when all the facts became known. Looking at it from a business standpoint, he could not see how prospective purchasers of receiver's certificates could afford to invest money in so much uncertainty.

REBELLION IN FORMOSA.

The Viceroy Reported to Have Revolted Against China.

London, May 31.—A special dispatch to the Pall Mall Gazette from its correspondent at Shanghai says a renewal of hostilities is imminent. The viceroy of Formosa is said to have rebelled against the government at Peking. Japanese ships are reported cleared for action. French ships at Tamsui, Formosa, are also said to have prepared for action. In addition, rumors of Russian intervention are current at Shanghai, and steamers have been ordered to Tien Tsin with provisions, in view of the probability of Russian hostility.

Shanghai, May 31.—Lord Li Chang Fang, son of Li Hung Chang, with John W. Foster, will start for the Pescadores tomorrow to formally turn over the island of Formosa to the Japanese.

The Japanese have landed at Taipeh, a town of 70,000 inhabitants, eleven miles up the Tan Sui river, at the residence of the governor of Formosa, and have informed the authorities they intend to take possession of the island. Fighting is imminent.

THE LETTER OPENED

Winthrop's Epistle a Business Communication.

HER BENEFICIARY CERTIFICATE

He Was, However, Arraigned and Formally Charged With the Murder of Mrs. Matthews.

San Francisco, May 30.—O. W. Winthrop, superintendent of the Laurel Hill cemetery, was today arraigned for the murder of Mrs. Jennie Matthews. Captain Lees opened the letter found in Winthrop's pocket, addressed to Supreme Linn, of the Chosen Friends, Indianapolis. The detective was confident that this letter, which Winthrop was about to mail when arrested, contained important evidence. Instead, the letter read: "What is the course to pursue in filing a certificate of death in the case of Mrs. Jennie Matthews, who died under peculiar circumstances in this city? Please send place and date of her birth and such other information as will be necessary in making application to the court for the money due on beneficiary certificate in favor of her minor child." That was all—a simple business inquiry. Counsel for defense had refused Lees permission to open the letter, but the detective secured Linn's telegraphic consent. Winthrop's preliminary examination was set for June 7.

OSCAR WILDE IN PRISON.

How the Aesthete Looks and What Work He Will Do.

London, May 30.—Oscar Wilde, after he was sentenced Saturday, was taken to Holloway jail in the northern part of London. There all his money and valuables were taken away by the warden. He was stripped to his shirt, and the officers wrote down in the prison register a minute account of his appearance, color of his eyes, hair and complexion, and any peculiarities such as a broken finger, tattoo marks, moles, etc. Then Wilde was put in a hot bath, and his shirt, the last vestige of his days of freedom, was removed. Emerging from the water, he found a full suit of prison clothes ready for him, from underlinen to loose shoes and a hideous Scotch cap. His clothes are of a dirty drab canvas, plentifully adorned with drab arrows. Shortly afterward, Wilde ate his first prison meal, an allowance of thin porridge and a small brown loaf.

He was taken today to Bentonville, hard by Holborn viaduct, the prison for convicted criminals. He was examined physically with great care, since upon the medical officer's report will depend what labor he is to do. If passed sound and fit for first-class hard labor, he will take his first month's exercise on the tread wheel, walking six hours daily, making an ascent of 6,000 feet. He will walk for twenty minutes continuously and then rest the next five minutes. A government inspector will visit him once a month and hear any representation or complaint, and a visiting committee of London magistrates will call frequently at the prison for the same purpose. On his release, Wilde, if he has worked well, will have earned the magnificent sum of 10 shillings.

While Wilde's case has absorbed public attention recently, London reports show that persons accused of the offense for which he is committed come frequently before the magistrates. On the very day he was convicted John Goodchild, 28 years old, and said to have a good education, was sentenced to two years at hard labor for the identical crime. The judge remarked that no country could remain great while such persons were allowed to live free in it. He believed, indeed, that they should not be allowed to live at all.

NOT A FREE FIGHT.

The Corbett-Fitzsimmons Battle Ground to Be Named Before July.

New York, May 30.—There was not a free fight at the Coleman house last night, as many of the sports who happened about there when Corbett and Fitzsimmons met in one of the parlors, expected. The champion was aggressive in his manner, but Fitzsimmons was very quiet, his lawyer, L. M. Friend, doing all the talking. The proceedings resulted in an agreement that Vendig should name the date and place for a meeting by July 1. Then Fitzsimmons will put up his \$5,000 forfeit. At one time it looked as if there would be a fight. This was when Corbett leaned over toward Fitzsimmons and remarked that he had made bluffs which he had failed to stand by.

"You can't go around the country saying things about me," shouted Corbett. "You've got into this thing now, and you will have to fight." "Never you fear," retorted Fitzsimmons very deliberately. "I'm not a bluffer, and never was a bluffer. Furthermore, I have yet to see the human being that I'm afraid of. I want to say to all these gentlemen here that I am ready to fight at any time or place." Mutual friends stepped between the men and they calmed down. It is probable that the representatives of the Dallas Club will be on in a few days to talk to Vendig and the fighters.

All About the World's Fair.

Chicago, May 31.—George R. Davis, director-general of the world's fair, will complete his report in about a week. It will consist of from seventeen to twenty volumes, each volume containing about 500 typewritten pages. It is in duplicate, one copy to be furnished to the national commission and one to the board of directors. It will contain about 31,000 illustrations in the shape of unmounted photographs. Whether the work is published in printed form will depend upon congress. Mr. Davis has been engaged since January, 1894. His principal assistant was Professor Peabody, chief of the department of liberal arts. Reports from all the heads of departments are embodied in the text, which treats of the great enterprise from inception to end.

Rather Costly Kissing.

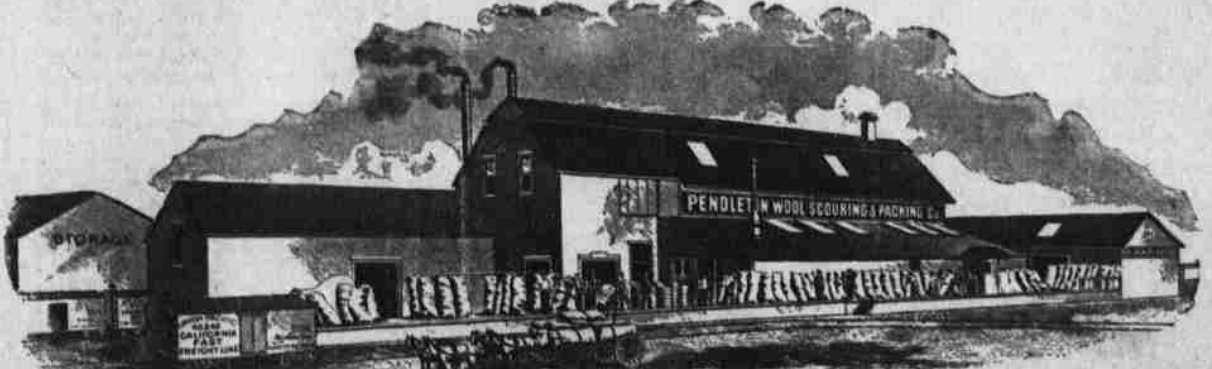
Oakland, Cal., May 30.—The trial of the suit brought by Mrs. Stephen Barron to recover \$5,000 damages from Patrick O'Connor, whom she accuses of having stolen kisses from her, has begun. On August 11, 1894, according to Mrs. Barron's story, she was lying on a sofa, when Mr. O'Connor came up stealthily and kissed her. On another occasion, the 3rd of September, while she was arranging clothes in the back yard, O'Connor, unobserved by her, she says, came behind her, put his arms about her and kissed her. For these two kisses she asks \$5,000, or \$2,500 each. O'Connor and wife say that the suit is brought for the purpose of extorting money from them.

Devastating Hop Fields.

Ukiah, Cal., May 30.—The hop-growers of this valley are greatly concerned over the appearance of a worm which is devastating the fields. The pest is similar in appearance to the army worm, being about an inch long and an eighth in diameter. It was discovered by Robert Clark, a hopraiser who resides four miles from this city. The worm works at night only, cleaning off the leaves and every vestige of green from the vine. It also works systematically destroying a row at a time.

Gomez, the Rebellion Leader, Dead.

New York, May 31.—A special to the Herald from Santiago de Cuba says: It is unofficially announced here that General Gomez, the leader of the Cuban revolutionists, died on Friday on the Quirch plantation near Baire. His death is said to be the result of wounds in the right cheek received in the battle of Dos Rios. Senor Marcano, who was a colonel under Gomez in the last war, brought the news to this city.

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
