DON'T EAT FAST.

For the benefit of those who are ruining their health by fast eating, as did the late Mr. Gresham, I feel justified in describing his manner of eating, which I was once able to observe, says an eminent physician of New York. It was in Washington at a time when he had many complications on his hands. He felt that he could spare no time from his duties, and made the fatal mistake of trying to economize on the time which he should have devoted to his meals. He was living at a hotel and his wife was not in town. Day after day he would rush in at the luncheon. His waiter knew what was expected of him, and almost before the secretary had time to sit down his food was before him. To save time it was all cold. In three minutes he was gone. He had swallowed in that time a quantity of food to which he should have devoted at least half an hour. On top of a lot of cold beef, badly cooked and hastily eaten, he would pour down a great glass of cold milk. Milk cannot be drunk safely except very slowly. Food eaten too quickly will ruin any constitution. He is now dead as are many other men, because he indulged in the falsest kind of all economy—economy of time at the expense of his stomach. Every newspaper should impress upon its readers the importance of eating slowly and wisely. Better eat one-half or one quarter as much and eat slowly. Better postpone eating until there is an opportunity to devote proper time to it.

It is invariably the case that men who know the least about their own business and attend to it in the poorest manner, know better how to run the government, state, county and precinct affairs than the fellows in office. That is why such fellows are always found to be such complete failures—they waste all of their time loafing and explaining how much better they could run the office than the other fellow. Such loafers never have a dollar they can call their own, and never will have until they go to work and keep their noses out of other people's business.—Albany Democrat.

Salem Journal: It is a serious matter to think that the legislature voted \$60,000 to our militiamen. We cannot afford to keep up such a standing army as this. It is doubtful if we need such a force; but if we do, it should not exceed two full companies. Two full companies ought not to cost over \$10,000 a year. This the people might stand, but nothing more. The whole movement is kept up more to provide places for a lot of papsuckers than it is to defend or protect the people of Oregon.

"To discontinue an advertisement," says John Wanamaker, the largest advertiser in world, "is like taking down your sign. Standing advertisements when changed frequently, are better and cheaper than reading notices. They look more substantial and businesslike, and inspire confidence. I would as soon think of doing business without clerks as without advertising."
