Sure Cure for Consumption.

The world is used to hearing of new cures for consumption and the announcement that a never failing remedy for that dread disease has been discovered is always accepted with a large measure of doubt. We all hope though that the researches of scientific men may yet triumph over the stubborn disease, and we turn with interest to the announcement that in the Chicago Pasteur Institute, Dr. Paul Paquin's tuberculosis serum is about to be introduced in the treatment of consumptive patients by Dr. Lagorio, director of the institution. The method of preparation of Dr. Paquin's serum is as follows: Disease germs, called bacilli, from the sputum of a consumptive, are placed in a soup made of beef or veal, where they multiply with extreme rapidity. The product is a concentrated fluid, highly poisonous in its character. This fluid is injected into the blood of a perfectly healthy horse. It immediately throws the animal into a fever, and the injection is repeated until the fever abates and they no longer have any effect. This process requires from one to three months time, after which blood is drawn from the horse's neck, placed in a bottle and kept at a temperature of forty degrees in a refrigerator. In the course of a month the constituents of the blood separate so that the serum can be drawn off.

The treatment is the hypodermic injection daily of a few drops of the serum into the muscles of the patient's back. The testimony of consumptives who have been treated with the serum is that their fever disappeared, that their night sweats ceased; where there was hemorrhage it stopped at once, the appetite returned, and, more remarkable than all, there was a rapid increase in weight in every patient. One case was remarkable. A consumptive had been treated with the serum for a month. At the end of that time he felt so well, though urged to do so he declined to continue the treatment. One lung was sound, the other had a cavity that consumption had eaten away. Subsequently pneumonia seized the sound lung and the patient died. A postmortem examination showed that the cavity had shriveled and healed up, or in other words the serum had practically effected a cure of consumption.

This new alleged cure, like each of the old ones will be watched with interest. For the sake of humanity we all hope that it may turn out to be a certain specific.
