Gilliam county is assured of over half a crop for the present season. It is again demonstrated that it pays to farm well, if at all. The grain that was sown on summer fallow will make a splendid yield, fall grain, of course, being the best. Spring sown grain, except on summer fallow, is pretty well burned up and much of it will not be worth cutting, but fortunately these conditions are proportionally small. The farmer who does not summer fallow and rest his land will soon be a thing of the past in Gilliam. The man who sows his grain on summer fallow, whether he farms on an extensive or small scale, will realize, on an average, five bushels more per acre than the one who sows his crop in a hap-hazard manner trusting to luck or providence to bring a good yield. Usually small farms pay best because they are well tilled, but a big farm will pay better if cultivated to the best advantage. One thing is certain, nothing but skillful farming will win here and the sooner the slipshod farmers are forced to the wall the better it will be for the development of the county. It will be impossible henceforth for indifferent farmers to compete with the man who cultivates his land to the best advantage. In all the older states it became necessary as the country settled up to make every acre of land count to the best advantage and Oregon will prove no exception. Already the great majority of farmers of this county have determined upon summer fallow as the surest rule for good crops and the others must follow suit or quit the business.

Statistics conclusively show that hard times have checked immigration as scarcely anything else could. Even the laws, unless faithfully carried out, could not accomplish so much. These are good signs, and one splendid effect of our passing business depression. The hordes of paupers, criminals and laborers have been crowding our shores for the last decade at a pace which has caused the thoughtful to pause and begin to calculate upon the limit of our national generosity and patience.

## Homestead Bill of 1893 is Declared Invalid.

The act passed by the legislature of 1893, intending to exempt homesteads not exceeding \$1500, or 160 acres of land, from any judicial sale for the satisfaction of any liability, has been deemed unconstitutional by Judge Hurley, who announces in his decision that it is void and of no effect.

E. H. Thompson sued E. H. Hyster on account. He levied upon 160 acres of land near Brower. On judgment and execution the sheriff sold the property. Hyster excepted to the sale on the ground that 160 acres was a homestead, and therefore exempt. The attorney for Thompson raised the point that the law was invalid because of a blunder in the make-up. When the bill was passed, it was without section or clause stating when it should go into effect. When the bill came to the senate it was considered well that the act should contain such a provision, and it was appended as section 8. The bill was improperly engrossed and, as it was presented to and signed by the president of the senate, speaker of the house, and governor, the amendment, section 8, was omitted, and the bill was signed as it was originally introduced, and contains but eleven sections.

On this ground the sale of the defendant's property was confirmed by the court, which decided that section 8 was omitted, the law was void. Such a law is in effect in several of the states of the Union.

A few attorneys, acting as referees in similar cases, have expressed the belief that the homestead law is invalid, and, it is said, Judge McBride recently passed upon the law unfavorably.
