James Lotan has been refused a third trial, and a yawning jail beckons him to "Enter in." If there were doubt of the fallen statesman's guilt, the public would be regretful. Since, however, it is easier to clear than to convict, and a thousand-fold easier for a jury to disagree than to arrive at a unanimous verdict, it is impossible that Lotan is innocent, and a judicial martyr. If in the trial there had appeared strong doubt of his guilt, the court would have ordered the jury to return a verdict of not guilty; if there had been any doubt at all of his guilt, the jury itself would have disagreed or cleared him. To argue now that he is innocent does not speak very well for the intelligence of the judge and jury that convicted him.

This is to be said about our British brother: We endure in silence and with such patience as we can command, his coarse brutality, his boorish self-assertion, his insular arrogance, his obtrusive assumption of superiority, his monstrous national egotism, and his rasping personal aggressiveness, when he comes among us in our own country with or without invitation. We do not undertake to teach manners to our guests, however obvious the need. But when Americans unhappily find themselves in England in a semi-public capacity, we expect the common, decent civilities of every-day life in their reception and entertainment. When these are denied—as they often are by the general British public, if not by the special entertainers of the Americans—there is apt to be plain speaking in this country.—Oregonian.

Portland Sun has gone into total eclipse. After a mournful struggle with the rays and hunger of poverty, it failed to appear Thursday morning, after an existence of 8 months.

The story is told that the republican national committee owes a debt of \$75,000, and that the national convention in 1896 will go to the city that will make up the deficit.

The supreme court has decided in favor of the railroad commissioners, and Sec. Kincaid will have to pay them their salaries—much to his dislike.

The entire town of Sprague, Wash., a city of 3000 inhabitants, was wiped out by fire Saturday. The loss is nearly \$2,000,000, with only about \$72,000 insurance. The Northern Pacific Ry. Co. is the heaviest loser, its loss being about \$750,000.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, 1895-1896.

The University of Oregon, Eugene, Oregon, offers free tuition to all students. Young men can obtain board, lodging, heat and light in the dormitory for \$2.50 per week. Roomers furnish their own linen. Young women are provided with board in private families at \$3.00 per week. Young women desiring board should address Prof. John Strano, Eugene, Oregon, or Secretary Young Women's Christian Association, Eugene. The University offers three baccalaureate degrees, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Letters with corresponding courses of study. The following shorter courses are also offered:—An English course leading in two years to a business diploma and in three years to the title graduate in English; An advanced course for graduates of normal schools leading to the degree master of pedagogy; A three years' course in civil engineering leading to the degree civil engineer; A course of two years for teachers of physical education leading to a diploma and the title director of physical education. The University charges an incidental fee of ten dollars which is payable in advance by all students. Students holding diplomas from public schools and those having teachers' certificates are admitted to the primary department without examination. Those desiring information regarding the preparatory department should address the Dean, N. L. Narrogon, Eugene.

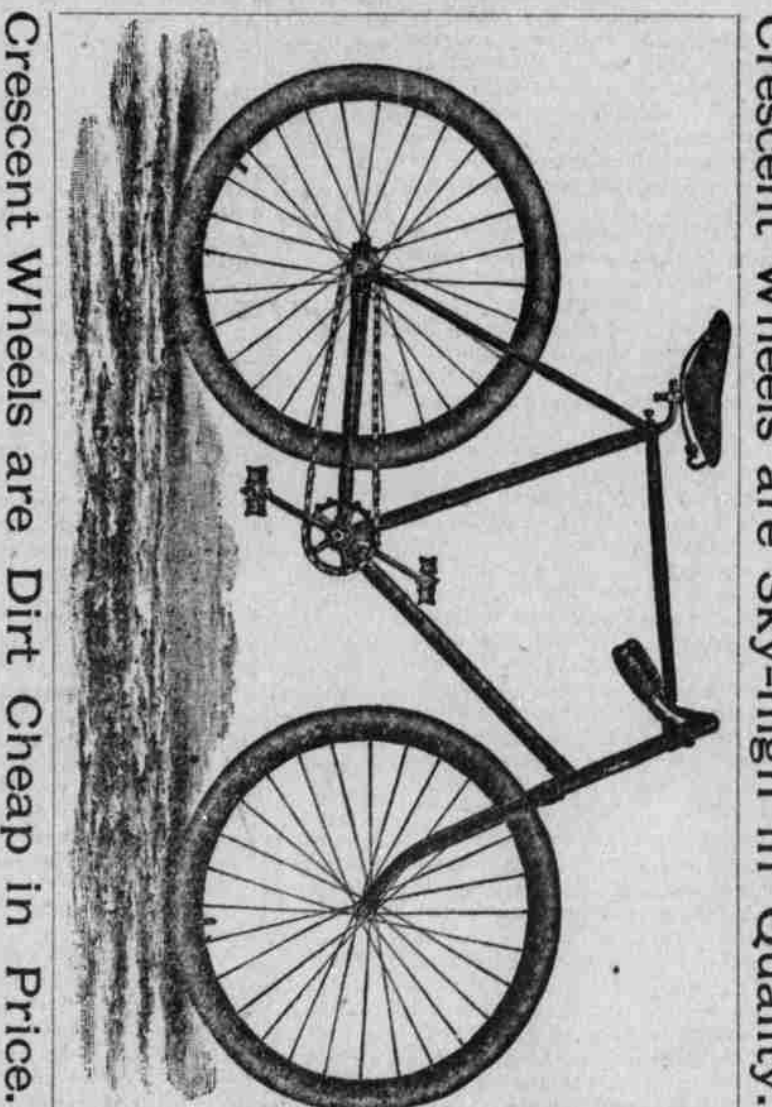

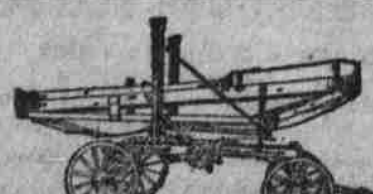
