FULL OF TRUTH.

The following from Wednesday's Oregonian is so full of truth that it is well worth reproducing:

The tragedy in Yakima county, as recited in our dispatches yesterday, wherein one man was instantly killed and another fatally wounded by a man whose slanderous tongue had provoked remonstrance upon the part of one of the victims, is one of those deplorable events that too frequently follow the train of evil speaking. A female gossip is bad enough, and is justly reprobated and shunned by reputable, orderly people; but a male gossip—a fellow whose vile tongue is an apt and ready agent of his viler thoughts, voicing his low estimate of character of the young women of his neighborhood as fact—is a traitor to decency and an enemy to society, execrated by all manly men and scorned by all womanly women. There is but one step from slander of this kind to a killing, and it is deplorable when, as in this case, the man who deserves to be shot is at the wrong end of the gun.

A county superintendent in a neighboring county recently asked every teacher at the county institute who took their local paper to hold up their hands, and out of about a hundred present, only six responded, at which he expressed great surprise and said: "You don't spend one dollar a year with these papers, yet you expect them to print, free of charge, notices of institutes, insert long programs of same, and full reports of what you do and say on these occasions, and thus expect them to advertise you and your abilities in your chosen profession, thus assisting you to climb the ladder to higher positions and better salaries without a cent's postage in return. Your condition in this matter would lead me, were I an editor of these papers, to throw in the waste basket any communications sent in by any society, the members of which are too proud or too stingy to take a paper, or if I inserted it, to demand full advertising rates for every line published. This same rule applies to politicians and all others who usually have a weakness to want boosted into lucrative positions by free advertising from the newspapers.—Ontario News.

The difference between the rustler and the slow goer is that the one goes out and hunts work and business or creates openings for them while the other fellow simply waits for something to turn up in his favor. Talk about the inequalities of fortune in the world. If there were tomorrow an equal division of everything in Gilliam county, within five years a minority of the people would again have the greater portion of it. Some people are too slow and sluggish to ever grasp and hold their share of the good things going. Who is to blame for it?

Justice Jackson's death reduces the number of Democratic members of the supreme court to three, as compared with five Republicans. Probably a Democrat will be appointed in his place, which will make the count four to five. However, the partisan complexion of the members of this tribunal makes little or no difference in their attitude towards the questions which are likely to come before them hereafter. Neither partisan nor sectional lines were revealed in the income tax decision.

The city and county debt of Portland is over \$5,500,000 of which probably at least one-third is represented by jobs, mismanagement and extravagance. Is there no chance for correct and straight business methods in the future in municipal affairs? If not, the men who own a moderate amount of property might as well abandon it and go somewhere else to live.—Welcome.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, 1895-1896.

THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oregon, offers free tuition to all students. Young men can obtain board, lodging, heat and light in the dormitory for \$2.50 per week. Roomers furnish their own linen. Young women are provided with board in private families at \$3.00 per week. Young women desiring board should address Prof. John Strano, Eugene, Oregon; or Secretary Young Women's Christian Association, Eugene. The University offers three baccalaureate degrees, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Letters with corresponding courses of study. The following shorter courses are also offered:—An English course leading in two years to a business diploma and in three years to the title graduate in English; An advanced course for graduates of normal schools leading to the degree master of pedagogy; A three years' course in civil engineering leading to the degree civil engineer; A course of two years for teachers of physical education leading to a diploma and the title director of physical education. The University charges an incidental fee of ten dollars which is payable in advance by all students. Students holding diplomas from public schools and those having teachers' certificates are admitted to the primary department without examination. Those desiring information regarding the preparatory department should address the Dean, N. L. Narregan, Eugene.


