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Officials Friendly to Americans.

Washington, August 22.—Advices have been received by officials of the state and navy departments from Minister Denby and Admiral Carpenter, which indicate that the situation resulting from the Ku Cheng riots are not very serious or alarming as far as American interests are concerned. It appears that the Chinese government and officials are very friendly toward the United States and American citizens, and regret the disturbance which tended to cause so much consternation. Advices are reassuring and not in accord with the cables from Consul-General Joinigan, at Shanghai, and the statements made by other American citizens indicating that further outrages were contemplated.

SEALING MEN EXCITED.
A Rumor That All Vessels Without Special Permits Are to Be Seized.
San Francisco, August 23.—The sealing men of this port are considerably worked up over the rumor that all sealing vessels which failed to provide themselves with special permits for seal fishing are to be seized as soon as they arrived at San Francisco. Not only is this rumor well founded, but the men who have killed seals in the prohibited district or during the close season are to be criminally prosecuted by the government. Two vessels, the Sophia Sutherland and the Bowhead, have already been seized, the latter being still in the custody of the United States marshal.

EXCESS FOR AUGUST

Expenditures Will Exceed Receipts by Five Millions.
NO TREASURY OFFICIALS FIGURE
This Is Based Upon the Showing Made for the First Two-Thirds of the Present Month.
Washington, August 24.—The expenditures of the government for the first two-thirds of the present month exceeded the receipts by \$1,009,293. Only \$1,250,000 remains to be paid on account of pensions, and the treasury officials estimate that the deficit will be reduced during the next ten days to about \$5,000,000. The excess of expenditures over receipts last month was \$8,478,366.

The recent payment of salaries at the agricultural department in silver dollars has called attention to the fact that on two previous occasions employees were paid in gold. The department books show that August 31, 1893, \$19,000 in gold was paid to employees and \$800 in gold was paid to certain employees August 15, 1894. In commenting on this statement, Secretary Morton said that while under the recent payment there had been strenuous objections on the part of those paid in silver coin, the previous disbursement of gold met with no protest whatever. He added that he would, if necessary, put into actual practice the proposition to pay two Mexican dollars for every United States dollar when the present value of 53 cents was lowered to make the plan consistent.

Officials of the state department were asked today if the declaration by Great Britain, that Hawaii's course toward British subjects in the last insurrection was proper, would affect in any way the claims of the United States made on behalf of certain citizens involved in the same affairs. They replied that, as the United States and Great Britain were not working in conjunction, the action of Great Britain could not bind the United States. The cases of persons claiming United States citizenship would stand or fall on the question whether or not each individual had a fair trial.

Unofficial information received at the navy department indicates that the Port Royal drydock is not yet all it should be, and, possibly, if an attempt were made to dock a big ship like the Indiana or other first-class battleships, there might be a great deal of trouble. The weak spot of the dock is at the entrance, and whether it is due to the soft condition of the soil around the entrance or some defect in the building of the dock will not be made plain until the official report of the board that was present at the time the trial was made.

No statement can be obtained as yet from the treasury department concerning the charges against Congressional Librarian Spofford, but it is stated there that even if the published statement of the irregularities in his accounts are found to be true, it is unlikely that he will be liable to any penalty, except dismissal from office, should that action be decided on by the president, to whom he is directly responsible. His accounts, it is held, merely render him liable to the charge of malfeasance in office, from which only dismissal could result.

Acting Secretary McAdoo today received a note from the Turkish minister to the United States, saying the Turkish government had informed him that a thorough investigation had been made of the alleged outrages on Americans at Tarsus. It was learned that a cook in the family of Professor Christie, of St. Paul's institute at Tarsus, had been assaulted by native Turks. No Americans were concerned in the matter or injured. The minister also stated that the Turkish officers would be tried and punished.

The Last of "Wild Bill."
Spokane, August 24.—"Wild Bill," or W. J. Walters, well known in Spokane, committed suicide in Colfax jail last night. He was arrested about four months ago in Spokane for selling whisky to Indians, and has been kept in confinement at Colfax. Last night he complained of toothache, and was allowed with three old men the privilege of the outer or large room. Some time during the night he arose, and, while the others were asleep, procured a cord and hanged himself in the jail.

Walters obtained the title of "Wild Bill" from being a wild and reckless fellow, daring and making gun plays, and getting into all kinds of scrapes and fights, both with white men and Indians. He was a great horseman, riding all kinds of animals without the slightest fear. He generally went heavily armed, and for these reasons was given the appropriate name of "Wild Bill."

The Liberal Leaders to Meet.
London, August 24.—The political committee of the national liberal club is summoning a national conference of liberals for October 29 and 30, in order to consider the result of the general election and to discuss the political situation in general.

Astronomer Swift's New Comet.
Los Angeles, August 23.—A special dispatch to the Evening Express from the Echo mountain observatory is as follows: "Last night at 2 o'clock I discovered a new comet in the constellation Pegasus. Its place was in the right ascension 2 hours, 27 minutes, 40 seconds, declination 5 degrees 30 minutes. It is very faint and has no tail. It is moving slowly northeast, parallel with the ecliptic periodic. Nothing is known as to what comet it is or whether it has been seen before."

The Americans in Turkey.
Constantinople, August 23.—The United States consul at Breyrou, Thomas R. Gibson, has been instructed to proceed to Tarsus in order to open an inquiry into the attack recently made on the American college there. At the instance of United States Minister Terrell, the Veli of Erzeroum will furnish an adequate escort to William A. Sachtleben, of New York, who is searching for the remains of Frank G. Lenz, the Pittsburgh bicyclist, murdered on his way through Armenia.

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RECEIVERS' ANSWER

Filed in the Suit to Oust the N. P. Officials.
RECORD OF THEIR PROCEEDINGS
The Attack to Be Made Against Them Is on the Ground of Non-Jurisdiction of Judge Jenkins.

Seattle, August 22.—The petition of Braxton Ives, through General Counsel Silas W. Pettit, to oust the receivers of the Northern Pacific railroad and appoint others in their stead, will be heard by Judge Hanford and Judge Gilbert Thursday, and today there was filed in the United States circuit court the receivers' answer. Yesterday was the day set on which the last papers should be filed, but ex-Senator Spooner and Counsel C. W. Bunn secured an extension. The hearing will be held in the rooms of the criminal department of the superior court, in order to afford accommodation for the crowd that is sure to attend.

In their answer the receivers recite the history of the litigation leading up to and following their appointment, and they have filed as exhibits and as a part of the answer the record of all the proceedings from August 15, 1893, to the present time.

The attack to be made against them is on the ground of the non-jurisdiction of Judge Jenkins, in the United States court, for the eastern district of Wisconsin, the question of collusion having been reserved for a future hearing in case the court holds with the receivers. They deny that at the time of their appointment, no part of the railroad or land grant of the Northern Pacific, or the property covered by the mortgages, was within the district. Then comes a statement of the relations of the road with the Wisconsin Central Railroad Company, under the ninety-nine year leases by which the receivers have been operating these lines; and of the litigation resulting from the default in rental under the leases, whereby the Farmers' Loan & Trust Company brought foreclosure proceedings, and secured a reappointment of the receivers, together with a consolidation of the causes.

A paragraph is devoted to the lease of the Chicago & Northern Pacific Railway Company, assigned by the Wisconsin Central Railroad Company to the Northern Pacific Railroad Company, and the proceedings resulting from the default.

Great space is devoted to an attempt to show that at the time of the appointment of the receivers, the Northern Pacific had valuable property in the jurisdiction of Judge Jenkins' court. From the time of their original appointment, they say, they have held possession of the property and have operated it, and neither their authority nor the authority or jurisdiction of any of the courts has ever been disputed. They have done various acts and various proceedings have been taken, at which the railroad company has appeared and to which it has consented.

September 1, 1893, they were authorized to issue \$5,000,000 of certificates; September 22, 1894, they were allowed to renew and extend the certificates for three years. These certificates are now alleged to be outstanding, in the hands of innocent purchasers. The receivers have expended money to keep down the interest on the first principal on other paramount liens. They have appointed a land commissioner, have sold land along the whole line of railroad, and have paid contracts and conveyances to purchasers. They have paid debts of the company running into millions; they have made traffic agreements and have executed contracts of all kinds, on the faith of which vast amounts of money have been invested, not only by the receivers, but by the public.

From the beginning to the end of the proceedings, continues the answer, the railroad company has expressly consented, through its counsel and executive officers, to the jurisdiction of the circuit court for the eastern district of Wisconsin, and has never directly or indirectly suggested in that court or in any other court that there was any lack of jurisdiction in the premises until the present motion was made.

An Indian Girl's Rights.
Tacoma, August 22.—Mary A. Henry, a pretty Indian maiden, has brought suit to recover land on which the village of Lillawap Falls, Hood canal, is located. Evidence today brought out the fact that her father, a white man, married her squaw mother according to the Indian customs, by purchase, giving a shotgun for her. The defense sets up illegality of marriage, claiming the daughter to be illegitimate, and has no right to the property.

The Erie Reorganization.
New York, August 23.—The decree for foreclosure of the Erie railway was signed today. The reorganization plan is to be issued next week.

Cholera in Japan.
Yokohama, August 24.—Since the outbreak of cholera in Japan there have been 35,000 cases of that disease and 16,000 deaths. Viscount Miura has been gazetted Japanese minister to Korea. General Takassima has been gazetted vice-governor of Formosa and commander of the Japanese army there.

Fit to Be an Aristocrat.
San Francisco, August 24.—After making an exhaustive examination of the antecedents of his California daughter-in-law, the Marquis of Queensberry has pronounced Lady Sholto Douglas fit to take her place in the ranks of English aristocracy. At the special request of the marquis, J. R. Wharton, an Englishman who resides in Oakland, spent some time in looking up the family history of the Mooneys. He says he has made his report to Queensberry, who has approved it and expressed his willingness to accept his son's wife as a member of the family.

Large Sleeves Said to Be Forbidden by Holy Writ.
New York, August 24.—"And thus saith the Lord God, Wee to the women that sew pillows to all armholes." (Ezekiel xlii:18). Armed with this text Justice J. Catlin aroused the prayer meeting at the Grace Methodist Episcopal church in Marion by warning them that this applied to the prevailing fashion of big sleeves. "What are the enormous puffs that women wear but pillows? And what can more efficaciously arouse righteous wrath than the abnormal and extreme fashions of today?"

Mr. Catlin went on to say that upon entering a car not long ago he was shocked to see what large sleeves women wore, thereby taking up the space that belonged to other passengers, and then he quoted the bible verses, much to the dismay of the women present, who had smiled incredulously when he announced that he had scriptural authority for his condemnation of the fashion.

"If those women I saw in the street car had read their bibles," he concluded, "they would not be seen in public places in such attire."

The women members had a lively discussion of the subject after the meeting, and those who adhered to the fashion agreed that Brother Catlin had no business to bring up such a matter in such a place.

The Fires in Idaho.
Wallace, Idaho, August 24.—Word has been brought in that the forest fires burning up Placer creek for the past few days had advanced within a mile and a half of this city, threatening flames that furnish power for the electric light works and the city's main supply of water. The flames were on fire in several places, but the fire was put out with only slight damage. Passengers from the East over the Wallace branch, who were obliged to walk over the mountain from Saltese on account of the burning of two bridges beyond Mullan, report that the fires are still burning. Flatcars loaded with cord wood were burned, but, aside from the loss of two large trestles, the damage of railroad property will be slight. Bridge carpenters from Spokane will commence work on the bridges burned nine miles east of Mullan. It will require six weeks, at least, to complete them.
