The Oregonian comes out strongly for Hon. C. W. Fulton for congressman in the second district to succeed Ellis. Judge M. L. Olmstead, a prominent candidate on the populist state ticket last year, is very anxious to run for congress in the second district on the republican ticket. He made his announcement through the Oregonian last week. We believe Mr. Ellis will have an easier victory in the coming contest than he had in the last. There is no occasion for a change so soon in that position. It generally takes a new man from two to four years to "learn the ropes" so as to be of any benefit to his constituents, and Mr. Ellis is certainly doing as well as any reasonable man could expect of him. In his case we believe it is a good idea to "let well enough alone."

Athena Press: A few days ago in talking with an Eastern man who had spent much time in Oregon, he mentioned as a peculiarity of Oregon people that they had no respect for rank. This is true, but we guess it is all right. The Oregon man understands the situation. He has mixed with congressmen, judges and other officials great and small and knows they are no better than he is and probably don't know any more. He has observed that a great many officials are financiers as long as they draw their salaries but when they are pitched out into the rough and tumble of every day life they have hard scratching to keep body and soul together. They understand that these men got into office largely on account of luck and not on account of superior ability.

The following twelve states held elections on the 5th inst: Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Maryland, Massachusetts, Mississippi, New York, New Jersey, Nebraska, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Virginia. The elections generally went republican but by greatly reduced majorities from two years ago. Last year New York gave 153,000 republican majority on the head of the ticket, and this year it is 80,000.

Russia has abolished all private drinking places throughout the whole empire, relegating the business entirely to government control. Two years and over will be allowed for the system to attain completeness. Eight provinces will be placed under the ban in July, 1896; seven other provinces in July, 1897 and the balance of the empire on January 1, 1898.

Iowa leads in the production of corn this year, but according to an exchange, has no prejudice against doing a little side farming as well. Among the State's little incidental crops this year was 200,000 bushels of oats, averaging 47 bushels to the acre.

Poor Grover Cleveland has had much to contend with of late, but to be threatened with legal proceedings in the event of a cheese bill amounting to \$3.40 if not paid forthwith, is the unkindest cut of all.

The Ocean's Depths.

The greatest known depth of the ocean is midway between the Island of Tristan d'Acunha and the mouth of the Rio de la Plata. The bottom was there reached at a depth of 40,236 feet, or eight and three-fourths miles, exceeding more than 17,000 feet the height of Mt. Everest, the loftiest mountain in the world. In North Atlantic ocean, south of Newfoundland, soundings have been made to depth of 4,580 fathoms, or 27,400 feet, while depths equaling 34,000 feet or six and one-half miles, are reported south of the Bermuda Islands. The average depth of the Pacific ocean between Japan and California is a little over 2,000 fathoms; between Chili and the Sandwich Islands 2,500 fathoms. The average depth of all the oceans is from 2,000 to 2,500 fathoms.

David Cantwell, of Lost Valley, Gilliam county, who has spent the past season mining on Vinson creek, arrived in town Monday on his return home. To an Eagle reporter he reported the dry washer which was invented by W. A. Darling, of Condon, a complete success. They encountered some disadvantages in putting it in operation, being compelled to use some water, but in no instance to exceed one-fifth the amount used for ground sluicing. Mr. Cantwell has some good claims upon Vinson creek, and in company with others from Gilliam county, will return in the spring and resume operations with their dry process machine.—Long Creek Eagle.
