The fire at the Mure tunnel on the
Northern Pacific is still smoldering. It
will take months to repair the damage
done by the fire.

The manager of the Katy mine is re-
ported to have disposed of one-third
interest to Springfield, Mass., capital-
ists, who will build a 500-ton mill and
probably a smelter during the coming
year.

A syndicate of Helena capitalists
which has purchased the right to man-
ufacture acetylene, the new illumina-
nt, in Montana, is said to be con-
templating the establishment of an acety-
lene manufacturing plant in Living-
stone, the requisites of a great water
power, lime and coal, being at hand.

The new state penitentiary build-
ing has just been completed at Deer Lodge.
It was built almost exclusively by
convict labor. The new buildings
only cost the state \$1,000. The founda-
tion walls are granite and red brick
was used for superstructure. The re-
cent report of the penitentiary shows
the expense of the prison in the last
year to be \$46,736.20.

The establishment of a school in the
penitentiary at Deer Lodge is a com-
mendable movement originated by Gov-
ernor Rickard. The prison officials
have been instructed to collect and
provide a library for the special bene-
fit of the inmates. There are now a
number of exceptionally fine educated
persons in the prison and they have
volunteered their services as teachers.

The recent storm on Puget sound was
the most severe that has taken place for
many years. The Port Townsend and
Victoria shipping experienced consider-

ADVANCE OF JAMIESON

British Commissioner Has
Reached Johannesburg.

CONFLICT EXPECTED SOON

All Responsibility for Hostilities, It Is
Said, Will Rest With the Char-
tered South Africa Company.

London, Jan. 3.—The Globe this
evening says a rumor has reached Lon-
don that Dr. Jamieson has arrived at
Johannesburg. It is also stated that
President Kruger has telegraphed to
Colonial Secretary Chamberlain pledg-
ing his government that the Boers
shall temporarily adopt a passive atti-
tude toward Dr. Jamieson's force on
its arrival outside of Johannesburg.
An important feature of the arrange-
ment between Mr. Chamberlain and
President Kruger is that all responsi-
bility for hostilities will rest with the
chartered South Africa Company.

Berlin, Jan. 3.—A cable dispatch re-
ceived here from Pretoria says a rising
has occurred at Johannesburg. It is
added that 300 more armed men be-
longing to the British chartered com-
pany have crossed the frontier, and
that President Kruger is determined to
defeat the invaders by force of arms.
A conflict between the Boers and En-
glish is expected tomorrow.

FATE OF THE ELWOOD.

The News of Her Wreck in Alaska
Waters Received.

Seattle, Jan. 3.—The schooner El-
wood, Captain E. E. Wyman, is a total
wreck in Alaska. It is the worst
story of shipwreck to reach Seattle for
a year. One sailor was drowned and
the remainder of the crew only reached
shore after one of the bravest fights
against the elements that has been re-
corded in the annals of the Northwest
coast.

The steamship Topeka, arriving this
forenoon from the North, brought the
first news of the disaster. Captain
Wyman and four sailors came down
on the Topeka, while the others re-
mained in Alaska.

The Elwood left Seattle September
11 for Kodiak and Cook's inlet. The
vessel struck at Gardiner's point dur-
ing a gale at 9 o'clock in the morning,
two months after leaving Seattle, and
began breaking up immediately. The
crew made a desperate effort to reach
shore, avoiding the reefs, jutting rocks
and wild breakers.

The first boat let down was smashed,
and the second boat was worked away
and swamped. Adrian F. Gorton, a
Swedish sailor, was washed away and
drowned. One seaman started to swim
ashore and was about to give up when
he seized a piece of wreckage and
reached shore. The captain and rest
of the crew finally reached shore by
clinging to the wreckage. The story
of hardship and peril is a heartrending
one.

A COMMISSION OF FIVE.

The Gentlemen Who Will Investigate
the Venezuela Dispute.

Washington, Jan. 3.—President
Cleveland today announced the ap-
pointment of the Venezuela boundary
commission as follows:

David J. Brewer, of Kansas, asso-
ciate justice of the United States su-
preme court; Richard H. Alvey, of
Maryland, chief justice of the court of
appeals of the District of Columbia;
Andrew D. White, of New York;
Frederic R. Coudert, of New York,
and Daniel C. Gilman, of Maryland.

The commission is regarded here,
among those who had an opportunity
to see the list of names after they were
made public, as a very satisfactory
one, whose opinions and conclusions
will be received by the American pub-
lic with that confidence which the
members of the commission in the pub-
lic eye inspire.

Brewer and White are Republicans,
and Alvey and Coudert Democrats,
while Gilman has never figured promi-
nently in politics. At the White
House it is stated that he has no poli-
tics, but his proclivities are understood
to be Republican. Thus both parties,
it will be seen, are equally represented
on the commission, with the fifth mem-
ber having no outspoken policy. All
will accept the places to which they
have been appointed.

The Outlook in San Francisco.

San Francisco, Jan. 3.—The Exam-
iner today prints interviews with near-
ly every prominent business man in
that city on the business transacted
last year, and the outlook for 1896. All
agree that 1895 was a great improve-
ment over 1894. Merchants are look-
ing forward to better times this year
than they have experienced since the
panic of 1893.

Another Chinaman Beheaded.

Berlin, Jan. 3.—A dispatch from
Swatow, province of Quanghai, China,
says the ringleader of the mob which
plundered the German mission at
Mofin has been beheaded.

Says England Must Not Yield.

London, Jan. 2.—The Duke of Somer-
set writes to the Post this morning
protesting against Lord Salisbury do-
ing anything to assist the Venezuela
commission, which the duke says ought
to be ignored. He added:

"If England yields in the slightest
to America, it will be as serious to our
prestige as when Mr. Gladstone allowed
our flag to be trodden by the Boers."

The New York correspondent of the
Times argues that the fact that Senator
Sherman allies himself with the presi-
dent on the Venezuela question augurs
ill for the cessation of the controversy.
Mr. Sherman sides with President
Cleveland against all the great lawyers
and all the best authorities on this
question, both American and En-
glish, and against Monroe himself,
says the correspondent. He thinks
Senator Sherman's attitude indicates
that the Republicans are not entirely
separated from President Cleveland.
He sees danger in Senator Sherman's
assumption that the quieter state of
affairs grows out of the belief among
the people of the United States that
Lord Salisbury is ready to acquiesce
in arbitration.

A Melbourne dispatch to the Times
says: "A banquet was held at Ade-
laide to celebrate foundation day, and
many patriotic speeches were made.
Sir James Henry Young, the minister
of works for New South Wales, who is
American-born, ridicules the idea of
war. Mark Twain was also present,
and echoed the statement that talk of
war between blood relations was
absurd."

The Chronicle, in the course of a
complimentary editorial, sends a New
Year's greeting to America and to
President Cleveland.

TO RECOMPENSE AMERICANS.

Indemnity Demanded for Losses Sus-
tained at Kharpout.

Washington, Jan. 2.—Secretary
Olney has directed Minister Terrell, at
Constantinople, to demand an indem-
nity of \$100,000 from Turkey for the
benefit of the Armenian missionaries
who suffered loss of property in the
Kharpout outbreaks in November. Min-
ister Terrell has also been instructed to
inform the sultan's ministers that an
additional indemnity will be demanded
for the benefit of Americans who suffered
loss of property at Marash a few
weeks later. This second demand will
be formally made as soon as the exact
loss sustained by Americans at Marash
can be officially determined. It is not
expected that the sum of indemnity
will be less than \$100,000, and it may
be more.

Secretary Olney in his letter to the
president on December 19, for the in-
formation of congress, said the Turkish
government would be held responsible
for all losses to Americans at Kharpout.
He has now begun the fulfillment of
that promise. He also stated that a
like demand would be made for the
losses at Marash.

THE CONTRACT SIGNED.

Bond Syndicate Is Now Ready to Take
the Government Loan.

New York, Jan. 3.—The contract
has been signed by all the members of
the new bond syndicate, subject to the
formal acceptance of the government.
The syndicate agrees to furnish 11,500,000
ounces of gold, amounting to about
\$200,000,000 in gold, the govern-
ment to take half of this sum first, and
to have the option of taking the other
half and deliver 4 per cent 30-year
coin bonds at about the same price as
paid for the last issue of bonds. The
managers of the syndicate are to re-
ceive a commission of 1 per cent. The
price at which the last bonds were
taken was 104.49, at which they yielded
3 3/4 per cent interest.

On the Asiatic Station.

Washington, Dec. 31.—An order has
been sent to the admiral commanding
the Asiatic station detaching the Petrel
from his squadron and directing that
she proceed to San Francisco. Arriv-
ing there she will be put out of com-
mission for an overhauling. Her re-
lief, the Boston, is now at Mare island
navy yard. She has been put in first
class condition, and will start on her
long voyage across the Pacific, in a day
or two. The Petrel will not await her
arrival, but will start for home as soon
as she can be prepared for the trip. It
is the evident policy of the administra-
tion to maintain a strong fleet on the
Asiatic station until the disappearance
of all signs of further trouble among
the countries of the Orient.

Water Tunnel Through Pike's Peak.

Colorado Springs, Colo., Dec. 31.—
The city council of Colorado Springs
tonight awarded a contract for the
Strickler tunnel to Wilson N. Jackson,
of Chicago. The tunnel will be one
and one-half miles in length, through
Pike's Peak, at an altitude of 11,580
feet, and will form an important ad-
junct to the Colorado City water sys-
tem. The cut will be made through
solid granite.

Morton's Candidacy Announced.

New York, Jan. 3.—Ex-Senator
Miller said to-night that Governor
Morton has authorized his friends to
state that he has consented to become a
candidate for president of the United
States.

NO DOUBT OF AN ISSUE

A Contract With a Bond Syn-
dicate Agreed Upon.

PREPARED FOR ANY EMERGENCY

The Amount Fixed at One Hundred
Millions and the Terms More Fa-
vorable to the Government.

Washington, Jan. 3.—There is now
no reasonable doubt that a bond issue
has been agreed upon, and that the de-
tails of a contract with a syndicate of
which J. Pierpont Morgan is the head
have been arranged; also that nothing
remains to be done to carry it into
effect except for the secretary to sign
his name thereto. Thus the president
is prepared for any emergency and
there is no doubt that should heavy
withdrawals of gold for export set in
again another issue would be an-
nounced. The fact that there have
been no withdrawals for export within
the last several days although sterling
exchange has ruled at or above the
shipping point, gives credence to an
opinion held in treasury circles that
the market has already begun to feel
the syndicate's influence against ex-
ports. The amount of the next issue
it is almost certain has been fixed at
\$100,000,000, and it is believed the
terms of the contract are rather more
favorable to the government than those
under which the last issue was made.
In this connection it is recalled that
between August 31, 1895, the date upon
which the national debt reached its
highest point, and March 1, 1896, the
amount of the government's outstand-
ing obligations was reduced \$1,881,-
865,873. To accomplish this reduction
bonds were purchased to the amount
of \$770,809,750. Of this amount
\$324,850,800 were purchased prior to
1879, and \$446,458,450 since that date.

Not Popular in England.

New York, Jan. 2.—The Evening
Post's London cablegram says:

"As regards the placing of a United
States loan, I understand that one
London bank and several small institu-
tions have agreed to participate in any
issue which may be made, and that
certain firms on the Continent have
expressed their willingness to join in
it. But those who are naturally looked
to for support still decline to step for-
ward, and so the negotiations are not
likely to make much headway at pres-
ent."

Money Being Hoarded in Boston.

New York, Jan. 2.—A special from
Boston to the Evening Post says:

"It is impossible to borrow money
here today. The banks would not ac-
cept Pullman stock as collateral at 8
per cent. Several banks have applied
to the clearing house for certificates.
There is a suspicion that money is be-
ing hoarded to buy the expected new
government bonds."

To Prevent the Issue of Bonds.

Washington, Jan. 2.—Allen, at the
request of Thurston, introduced a bill
in the senate today, prohibiting the
issue of bonds by the United States un-
less congress shall by resolution declare
the necessity for them.

Amendment to the Bond Bill.

Washington, Jan. 2.—Senator Jones,
of Arkansas, today presented an amend-
ment which he proposes to offer to the
house bond bill. It provides that any
holder of silver bullion, who is a citi-
zen of the United States, may tender
the same to the secretary of the treas-
ury and have it coined into silver dol-
lars, the seigniorage to be the differ-
ence between the original value and
the market price of the bullion in New
York; for the cancellation of all bank
notes of less than \$10; directing the
secretary of the treasury to coin the
silver bullion in the treasury into silver
dollars, to be used in redeeming the
treasury notes issued for the purpose of
purchasing silver bullion under the
Sherman act; and the redemption of
the greenbacks in either gold or silver,
and for their reissue according to the
provisions of the act of 1875.

Has Reached an Acute Stage.

Johannesburg, South Africa, Jan. 2.—
The political crisis here, brought
about by the efforts of the foreign
population to obtain equal political
rights with the Boers, has reached an
acute stage. The exodus of women
and children is increasing. All trains
leaving are crowded, and the price of
food stuffs has raised greatly. All
kinds of bellicose rumors are current,
and the government has notified burgh-
ers to be ready for active service in
case of emergency.
