They claim this is being done at the earnest solicitation of the taxpayers, who are groaning under the enormous burden of taxation.

Death of Geo. H. Thompson.

Dalles Times-Mountain.

News was received here today (14th) of the death of Hon. George H. Thompson, which occurred at Spokane, Wash., on Monday, Jan. 13th. The remains are expected here tonight and the funeral will take place tomorrow at 2 p. m., either from the residence of Hon. J. B. Condon or from the Cong. church.

Mr. Thompson was for many years one of the most highly respected citizens of The Dalles, and served Wasco county in the capacity of county clerk for six years, from 1882 to 1888. He was born in California about 40 years ago, and during his entire life has so conducted himself as to merit the esteem and respect of his fellow men. On December 27, 1881, Mr. Thompson was married to Miss Emma Condon of The Dalles, and the result of this marriage was one son, who is now 12 years of age. Mr. Thompson had been an invalid for some time, and his death, though not unexpected, is mourned by a large circle of intimate friends, not only in this city, but throughout the county.

The deceased was a brother of W. S. Thompson of Fossil and was well known at Fossil, where he formerly conducted a mercantile store, at the location now owned by Steiwer, Carpenter & Co.]
