A writer, who is living among the Armenians in Turkey, says that now will commence there one of the most terrible slaughters of people ever known in the world's history. It is not proposed that the Kurds and the Turkish soldiers shall murder any more Armenians outright, but their property is to be destroyed, their means of making a living taken away and they will simply starve. Christian nations will be powerless to prevent, unless they shall take forcible possession of the country, and now this relief could not come until too late. The starving process is going on now in some districts and the Christians (Armenians) are to be annihilated.

When the tall 26 story office buildings were erected in New York and Chicago, the public was astounded and the general thought was that the limit of height had been reached, but it seems that it has not, for now comes a firm of New York architects who have drawn the plans for a building 200 stories high to be erected on the block surrounded by 23rd and 24th streets and 3d and 6th avenues, in the city of New York. The building will be built of steel encased in stone walls 16 feet thick at the base and tapering to the summit, nearly 3000 feet above the pavements.

A talented government timber inspector has discovered that Canadians have been invading northern Montana and cutting timber belonging to the United States. The amount taken by these Canadians is said to be worth several million dollars. The exact amount should be quickly ascertained and used as a set off against the British claim for depredations in the seal fisheries award.—Exchange.
