Ed Cruikshank went over to Idaho this week to gather up his horses to ship them east.

J. W. Blake, agent, is having the Joe Thomas land lying northeast of town fenced this week.

Fred Tobey and wife of Arlington visited Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Dunlap at Condon several days last week.

The new postal card system is now in force, whereby a common card can be mailed by putting a one-cent stamp thereon.

The democratic county convention will be held at Condon next Saturday. The populists will hold their primaries on the same day.

The Dalles Chronicle says that E. M. Shutt, editor of the Antelope Herald, will probably receive the republican nomination for joint representative for Wasco and Sherman counties.

Shearers are removing the fleeces from the sheep of a thousands hills, and as soon as the roads are passable Gilliam county will send about two million pounds of wool out to clothe the world.

Hon. W. W. Steiwer, of Fossil, was in The Dalles Monday en route to Portland to attend the republican state convention. Senator Steiwer is prominently mentioned as a candidate for re-nomination for joint senator on the republican ticket.—Times-Mountaineer.

The W. C. T. U. of Prineville is waging war against the saloon men. Four were recently arrested for keeping their doors open on Sunday, resulting in two trials before a jury in the justice's court, a hung jury in each case and a pugilistic encounter between opposing attorneys. Verily, Prineville is getting back some of its former notoriety.—Prineville Review.

The populist state convention met at Salem last week and nominated a ticket. Their platform adopted declares for free coinage; favors direct legislation, demands protection of American labor, the reduction of official salaries to correspond with the reduction of wages of labor, the abolition of fish traps and wheels, and the re-enactment of mortgage tax law, and favors the establishment of the initiative and referendum.

The republican nominee for justice, H. D. Randall and constable, W. T. Sylvester, were endorsed, so they will doubtless be elected.

The republicans of Gilliam county held their convention at Condon last Saturday. In all, 48 delegates were entitled to seats in the convention, all being present except two, who were represented by proxy.

The convention was called to order at 11 a. m. and organized by electing J. M. Johns chairman and John Lyons secretary; F. W. Royal assistant secretary. Committees were appointed and the convention adjourned until 1 o'clock. The following committees were appointed:

Chairman Johns appointed as tellers, C. A. Danneman and R. R. Hankins. All nominations were made by informal ballot and started off first with representative. Two nominations were made—J. E. David, the present incumbent, and E. W. Daggett, resulting in David receiving 25, Daggett 13 and J. M. Johns 1 vote. Mr. David was declared the nominee.

Three candidates were in the field for clerk—H. N. Frazer, A. B. Lamb and Z. T. Dodson. Only one ballot was taken, resulting in Frazer receiving 24, Lamb 13 and Dodson 6. Mr. Frazer having a majority of all votes cast was declared the nominee.

The caucuses held the evening before cut down the number of candidates for sheriff to an alarming extent, only three being nominated—Geo. Duke, C. A. Danneman and E. E. Smith. The ballot resulted as follows: Duke 24, Danneman 14, Smith 3, McKenzie 2. Mr. Duke was declared the nominee.

There were three aspirants for county commissioner—E. O. Tobey, F. M. Pliter and A. L. Duthie. On the first ballot Tobey received 19, Pliter 17 and Duthie 7 votes. The second ballot decided it in favor of Pliter, who received 24 and Tobey 18 votes.

S. B. Barker, the present incumbent, received the nomination for county treasurer by acclamation.

The names of M. O. Clarke and Geo. Tatom were presented for assessor and resulted in Mr. Clarke receiving the nomination, the vote standing, Clarke 34, Tatom 9.

Mrs. F. B. Stevens of Trailfork was nominated by acclamation for school Supt. Mr. Kennedy declined the nomination, giving as a reason that he expects to leave this state before long. Jeddy Brown of Fossil received the nomination for county surveyor by acclamation.

Nearly a dozen nominations for coroner were made but all declined the honor. Finally when Geo. Tatom wasn't listening, the convention unanimously nominated him for the position.

W. W. Steiwer, S. G. Hawson and Geo. Duke were elected delegates to the state convention, which meets at Portland on April 8th and 9th.
