CLCCECITIES.

Mr. D E Hall of Portland, claim agent of the O R & N was at Condon Wednesday on business before the circuit court.

L. W. Bailey of Salem, who owns a good ranch adjoining Condon on the north, came up this week on a brief visit to his old friends here.

The democrats and populists of this county each have an Edwards at the head of their respective tickets for representative—L. C. Edwards of Arlington on the former and W. J. Edwards of Mayville on the latter.

A very enjoyable surprise party was tendered Miss Belle Darling Monday evening at her home, in honor of her 15th birthday. Games, dancing and music was the order of the evening. A fine supper was also enjoyed by the guests.

Judge W. J. Mariner and Senator John A. Smith, of Gilliam County, Oregon, visited Goldendale, Wednesday. They are the promoters of Columbia Portage and Transportation Co., recently incorporated at Arlington, with a capital of \$250,000.—Sentinel.

Whitman county, Wash., is so infested with squirrels that the authorities propose letting a contract to Dr. D. C. McNabb to exterminate the pests for a consideration of \$10,000, to be paid when the work is completely finished, in about two years, by inoculation.

This was the shortest term of circuit court ever held in the county, lasting only until Wednesday about 3 o'clock. There were no jury trials; but the chances are that there will be at the next term, as we understand that the grand jury returned into court about six true bills.

Bert Case, traveling salesman for the famous Wrought Iron Range Co. of St. Louis, is in this section again and expects to remain in the county a month or so. He sold nearly a dozen on Rock creek last week and several in Condon already. These stoves are sold only from the wagon.

Mr. Fred Seekamp, father of the Seekamp boys, accompanied by his son-in-law, L. C. Johnson and John Schell, all Germans, arrived here Wednesday from Wisconsin. Their visit out here is in the interest of Ernest's estate and will remain several weeks. Mr. Schell came out to look at the country and will return in a week or so.

J. H. Cradlebaugh of The Dalles, one of the ablest lawyers and most brilliant orators in the state has been nominated by the democrats for prosecuting attorney for this district. He is also one of the most brilliant editorial writers on the coast, having followed the newspaper business a number of years in connection with his law practice.

Several of our friends (?) here, evidently for want of something else to do, are circulating a report that the editor of this paper is a member of the A. P. A. This is a false report and is prompted purely through malice, and therefore is not worthy of notice. We are not identified in any manner with the organization and do not intend to be.

Senator J. A. Smith of Blackfoot was in town nearly all week. He is plaintiff in a civil suit for damages against the O. R. & N., seven of his horses having been killed by the cars recently. Mr. Smith is an active promoter of the Columbia Portage and Transportation Co., and has been agitating the question with our business men during his stay here.

Mr. Frazer and wife left at once, expecting to reach the city this Thursday morning. Mrs. Lucas's many friends in this county will be pained to learn of her death.

Five lots, three with houses on them, the property of A. Kennedy, will be sold at sheriff's sale next Monday. The lots include the dwelling home occupied for many years by the Kennedy family, who have failed to pay a mortgage when it came due. Arthur Kennedy will try to redeem the house and lot where the old folks lived, if it happens to be bid in separately.—Dalles Chronicle.

District Attorney, 7th judicial district, democratic—John H. Cradlebaugh of The Dalles. Republican—A. A. Jayne of Arlington.

Joint senator for Wasco, Sherman and Gilliam counties, democratic—E. B. Dufur of The Dalles. Republican—W. H. Moore of Moro.

Joint senator for Wasco and Sherman counties, democratic—J. W. Armsworthy of Sherman county. Republican—John Mitchell of The Dalles.

Joint representative, Wasco and Sherman counties, democratic—S. A. Seibert and V. C. Lewis both of Sherman county. Republican—Fred Jones of Lake Oren and E. S. Huntington of The Dalles.

Hon. Charles Hilton of The Dalles was elected a delegate to the republican national convention and Dr. Oglesby of Lane county is one of the democratic presidential electors.

A gloom has been cast over the entire community, and the tragic ending of a busy life has been the all pervading theme of conversation.

The populists of Gilliam County held their convention at Condon Saturday.

Only 18 of the 31 delegates were present.

W J Edwards was elected chairman and F B Moore secretary of the convention.

The chairman appointed the following committees:

On platform: W J Edwards, Otho Ward, J R Clark.

On order of business: H Wilkins, L L Shelly, L A Miller.

The report of the committee on credentials adjudged the following persons entitled to seats in the convention:

Condon—A J Moore, J R Clark, J W Ebbert.

Lone Rock—Morgan Ward, L A Miller, Otho Ward.

Ferry Canyon—Ed Palmer Oscar Mailey.

Rock Creek—G W Marvel, H Wilkins, T A Brassfield.

Idea—J E Coleman, L P Davidson.

The following precincts were not represented: Arlington, Trailfork, Rowe Creek, Blackfoot, Matney, Crown Rock.

Report of committee on platform and resolutions read and adopted by sections.

Resolution that we favor the election of U. S. senators, president and vice-president by direct vote of the people, carried.

The committee on platform and resolutions submitted the following report, which was adopted:

1st. We reaffirm the fundamental principles of the Omaha platform.

2d. We pledge our candidate for the legislature to vote for the abolition of all useless commissions and boards, and the economical support of all state institutions and reduction of useless clerk hire.

3d. We demand the reduction of official salaries to correspond with the reduction in the wages of labor and the prices of the products of labor.

4th. We demand the re-enactment of the mortgage tax law, and that exemption from tax be allowed for indebtedness where a corresponding taxable credit can be shown.

5th. We favor amendment to our state constitution providing for the initiative and referendum.

6th. We pledge our candidate for county clerk to do all the work in the clerk's office that the statute requires, for the constitutional salary only (\$1500 a year).

7th. We also pledge our candidate for sheriff to perform all the duties of the sheriff's office as required by statute for the constitutional salary—\$2000 a year and furnish his own deputy.

8th. We demand the free and unlimited coinage of both gold and silver at the ratio of 16 to 1, without waiting for the consent of any other nation.

Respectfully submitted: J R Clark, Otho Ward, W J Edwards, committee.

The chairman appointed Otho Ward and Henry Wilkins tellers.

Most of the nominations were made by acclamation, with the result given above.

The delegates elected their central committeemen as follows: Condon, J R Clark; Mayville F B Moore; Lone Rock Otho Ward; Rock Creek H C Dodson; Idea J E Coleman; Matney Robt Poag; Ferry Canyon Wm. Meek; Butte Creek E A Putnam; Arlington Clayton Shane. J R Clark was elected chairman of the populist county central committee.

A cordial invitation is extended to the members of both the democrats and republicans to meet in joint discussion at any time or any place, and if satisfactory our candidates would stump the county with them. All communications on this subject should be addressed to J. R. Clark at Condon.
