An Arlington sheepshearing crew is in town, prepared to go to work as soon as a contract can be made. Not a great deal of shearing has been done here yet, owing to the unusually cold weather.

D. S. Healey, the Arlington tinner, was in town several days this week putting up water leads on a number of houses here. He also soldered up nearly all the old tubs, buckets, pans, etc. in town.

W. A. Cahoon, formerly of Olex, who has been attending the State Normal School at Monmouth for the last couple of years, last week bought one-half interest in W. J. Mulkey's grocery store at Monmouth.

Our public school will close on Friday of this week, after a nine months' very successful term. In the evening, commencing at 8 o'clock, the pupils of the school will give an interesting entertainment, to which all are invited.

There has been a potato famine at Condon for several weeks. Everybody appears to be "out" of spuds and are anxiously waiting for some to be brought to town. Whoever has any for sale can find ready sale for them here.

Hon. E. B. Dufur has made a slight change in his appointments and will speak at Lone Rock on May 20th at 1 o'clock, and at Arlington on 22d at 8 p. m. He is a good speaker and large crowds are expected out to hear him.

A grove of the Woodmen Circle, the ladies' branch of the order of Woodmen of the World will be organized at Condon this Thursday evening, by L. W. Darling as organizer. This is a very worthy order and is becoming very popular everywhere.

The Globe thankfully acknowledges receipt of a magnificent bouquet of flowers from Mrs. Helen Propst of Clem, which she sent up Tuesday by her husband. They were grown this spring in her flower garden, which is one of the finest in Eastern Oregon.

Wm. Keys & Son this week delivered at Arlington all of their cattle, 1300 head which they recently sold to Butler, a Montana buyer. Billy Keys expects to go along to Montana and work awhile for the firm—Bitter Creek Stock Co. at Hamilton, Mont.

The voters this year will not be required to scratch the name of the candidates they do not want to vote for. This is a change made by the last legislature. All that is necessary for him to do is to place an X immediately to the left of the candidate he desires to vote for.

A number of our citizens turned out Friday evening to hear Judge Mariner's remarks on the Portage railway, and all are unanimous in the opinion that such a project would be a grand thing for this whole Eastern Oregon country. A very large crowd was in town Saturday to attend the auction sale of Frank Belliard's horses. Only three of the six were sold at auction sale, the other three at private sale. They did not bring as good prices as Mr. Belliard expected, we understand. Ray Henson acted as auctioneer. The best horse was sold to Rev. Drake for \$42.50.

Mr. Parsons is enthusiastic over the prospects of his new town and has no hesitancy in saying it is bound to be the distributing center of the Inland Empire. He reports 8 new buildings under construction, and several more will be built during the coming summer.—Monitor.

Hon. E. B. Dufur, of The Dalles democratic candidate for joint senator, will address the people of Condon next Monday evening at 8 p. m. He will perhaps be accompanied by Hon. J. H. Cradlebaugh, nominee for district attorney. Mr. Dufur will speak at Fossil on Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock. He has concluded to speak at Lone Rock also, and will address the people of that place on Wednesday, May 20th at 1 p. m. He will not speak at Arlington until Friday evening, May 22d.

The supreme court in session at Pendleton has just decided that ladies are not eligible to the office of school superintendent. This decision will knock out 15 lady candidates for that office in this state, among them being Mrs. Lillian Stevens of this county, whose card of withdrawal appears in this issue. We understand an effort has been made to have the vacancy on the ticket filled by E. W. Daggett of Arlington. The way the matter stands now, Mr. Morey is the only candidate for that office.

The revival closed Sunday night, after three weeks duration. It was by far the most successful revival ever held in the town, and scores of our people will always hold Rev. Bryan in grateful remembrance for the good he has done here. He is now in the same good work at Fossil. Mr. Bryan has promised to deliver a lecture at Condon just after closing his meetings at Fossil, on "Patriotism," which will be a masterly effort, as our people all know that he has the ability to master any subject he chooses to speak upon. The date is not yet known, but it will perhaps be next week.

It is a universally admitted fact that that one of the principal burdens that the taxpayers of Oregon are now groaning under is that which arises from maintaining our local courts of justice. There are entirely too many men in the state who depend on the office of justice of the peace for a livelihood, hence their great cost to the taxpayers. The best way to remedy this evil is to select men for these positions who do not depend solely on their offices for a living. With such an officer the incentive to encourage litigation is not so great as it is with men who have nothing else to do and who have no other way to make a dollar.—East Oregonian.

Nearly 300 people were present at Condon Monday to hear the political speech of Judge Bennett, the democratic nominee for congress. He spoke for two hours and the large audience were almost unanimous in the opinion that it was the grandest and most forcible political speech they ever heard. It was a masterly and powerful effort and there is not the slightest doubt that he is possessed of the proper material for a first-class congressman—one who would be a credit to the state and nation. His argument was confined principally to the financial issues and the tariff and our people doubtless never heard these great questions explained so clearly as they were by him. He is in favor of free silver and his speech converted a great many people to his way of thinking. He also had a large audience at Fossil Tuesday.

Mr. E. W. Daggett and D. B. Thomas's team ran away while coming to Olex Sunday morning, throwing both out and turning the buggy over. The team ran from the top of the hill down Crum's grade, demolishing the buggy slightly. Mr. Daggett was gathering up his outfit all day Monday. Fortunately no one was hurt.

This precinct being the largest in the county we think some of the political aspirants should make some addresses here, if they want our votes. The people cannot quit their work and go 20 miles, but would come into Olex and we think a larger crowd would come together here to hear a good orator than at any other point in the county.
