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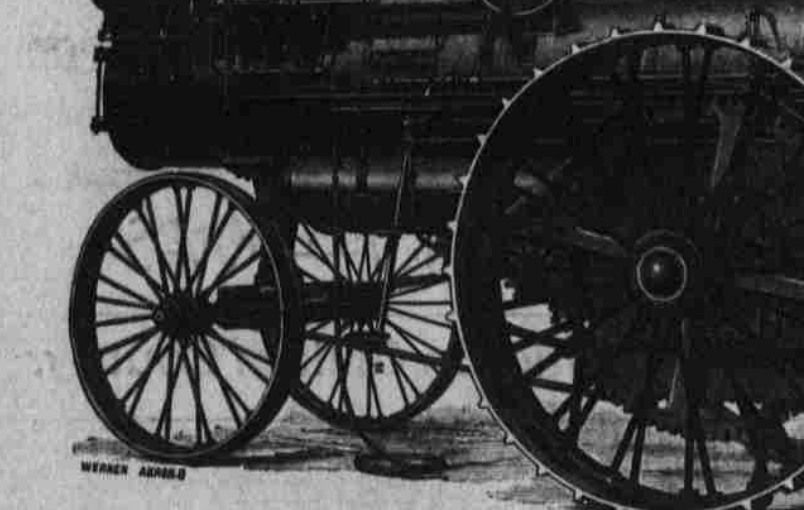

A DIGEST FROM ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD.
Comprehensive Review of the Important Happenings of the Past Week Culled From the Telegraph Columns—At Home and Abroad.

New York has the first daily paper devoted to wheeling published in the English language. It is called the Daily American wheelman.
The General Trans-Atlantic Company has advanced freight rates on specie one-eighth per cent on lots of \$500,000 or over, either gold or silver.
The North German Gazette says. The government is desirous of the total abolition of the sugar import bounties, provided the other states enter an agreement to take similar action.
A cloudburst occurred near Perry, O. T., eight to twelve inches of rain falling. Residences and business buildings on high, level ground were flooded, while houses along Cow creek were washed away.

Lieutenant Luther B. Baker, who, as an officer in the government detective service, had charge of the party which captured J. Wilkes Booth, the assassin of President Lincoln, died in Lansing, Mich., aged 66 years.
The boiler in Davidson Bros.' saw-mill, near Marietta, Ind., exploded with terrific force, fatally injuring Eunice Davidson, Thomas Davidson and Frank Battan. Six others were more or less injured.
John Taggart, of Big Stone Gap, Ky., was killed, and twelve others dangerously wounded in a gas explosion in the mines near Big Stone Gap. Part of the mine caved in. It is believed six of the injured will die.
Near Atlantic, Ia., the combination train on the Griswold branch of the Rock Island was ditched by striking a mule. All the cars and engine went into the ditch, but the coach crowded with passengers, remained on the track. Several were injured, but none seriously.

Henry Walker, residing near Broken Bow, Neb., murdered his wife, his excuse being that she had attempted to poison him, and he killed her as a matter of self protection. He purchased a revolver and deliberately arranged all the details. The murderer is a wealthy farmer, prominent and well known.
The coal product of the United States, for the calendar year 1895, shows the output of the Northwest states to be: Oregon, 73,685 short tons product, valued at \$247,901; Washington, 1,191,410 short tons, with a valuation of \$2,577,958; Montana, 1,489,198 short tons, valued at \$2,815,908.
A dispatch from Base Terre, Island of Guadalupe, West Indies, says: Japanese immigrants are again in rebellion. The uprising has become so formidable as to cause planters grave anxiety. The colonial government is adopting drastic measures to suppress the insurrection, notwithstanding the stipulations of the treaty.

Personal payment of pensions has been revoked by congress, and hereafter, pension checks must be transmitted by mail direct to the address of the pensioner. The authority of pension agents and their clerks to administer oaths in the execution of pension vouchers has also been revoked. This duty may be performed by justices of the peace, notaries public, fourth-class postmasters or any officer having authority to administer oaths for general purposes. No federal officers are permitted to charge fees for the execution of pension purposes, except fourth-class postmasters, who may receive 25 cents for the service.
Petitions are being sent from all the towns of South Africa to the government of the South African republic in favor of leniency to the reform prisoners.
Mrs. Mark Frost, the wife of a prominent farmer, residing at Cleveland, Mo., drowned her two children and herself last evening. No cause is known.
A dispatch to the London Times from Athens says the Greek cabinet has decided not to send warships to the island of Crete unless it becomes absolutely necessary. It is added that twenty-five Christians have been killed in the massacre in Crete.
James Ellington was hanged in Boise, Idaho, for the murder of Charles Briggs December 30, 1894. Ellington shot Briggs in front of the latter's home in Boise. Ellington met his victim, passed and then turned and shot him in the back.
At Denver, Colo., A. B. Hughes rode a mile unspaced in 2:04 1-5, making a new world's amateur bicycle record. The greatest previous record was 2:05 1-5, by Clark, of Denver.
Owing to the fact that congress has decided to transform the battlefield of Shiloh into a national park, the officers of the Shiloh Battlefield Association have tendered their resignations for the purpose of discontinuing their association.
A Valparaiso dispatch says: The supervisors of accounts have discovered that the telegraph of the government has been defrauded of more than 100,000 pesos, and it is thought that a closer investigation will bring more rogues to light.
The event of the Queen's birthday celebration at Roseland, B. C., was a miner's drilling contest for a purse of \$150. Five teams were entered. Goggin and Reilly, of the War Eagle, drilled a hole 31 1/2 inches in 15 minutes, winning thereby.
Senator Mitchell, of Oregon, has reported favorably from the committee on postoffices and postroads the bill to increase the pay of letter-carriers throughout the United States. The bill is similar to the one already favorably reported in the house.
Captain John Wilson, the hero of Lookout mountain, who has been suffering from a cancer on his face, died at his home at Station camp, Kentucky, aged 74. He was the man who first planted the federal flag on the summit of Lookout mountain.
Lieutenant John Milley, in charge of the heavy artillery at the Persidio, San Francisco, has just completed the work of mounting a 50-ton rifle on the ridge near Fort Winfield Scott. This is the second modern rifle to be added to the heavy artillery on this coast, within two years.
A Havana dispatch says: The local guerrilla force of San Antonio de los Baños has killed nine insurgents with side arms, besides the leader Collazo. General Serafino has fought the insurgents near San Cristobal, Pinar del Rio. They had eight killed and carried off many wounded.
