

The coronation ceremonies of the Czar of Russia are going on at Moscow, lasting three weeks and costing \$7,000,000. Saturday, 6th, there was to be a popular feast, and tables had been spread for 500,000 people, and each person was to get a mug as a souvenir. At an early hour teams loaded with those mugs came to the plain of Hodynsky near Moscow and one of the attendants threw one of the mugs into the crowd. There was a wild rush made by the populace, and 3600 people, men, women and children were crushed to death and over 4000 others wounded. Ample police force had been provided for the event but it was so early in the morning that but few were on the grounds. No Americans or other visitors were killed, it being too early for them.

Chicago Record: Grover Cleveland's latest performance has brought joy to the hearts of about 30,000 clerks and office-holders. But think of the sorrow it inflicts upon about ten times as many individuals who have been expecting to be office holders. The country will commend President Cleveland's new order. It is in the interest of good government and clean politics. It marks the final triumph of the merit system. We say this in spite of the fact that there are other extensions which should be, and will be made in the comparatively near future. But with 85,000 places forever removed from politics it is plain enough that the government is fully and finally committed to the merit system.

There is no longer any question that the Chicago convention will declare for the free and unlimited coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1, and there is little doubt but this issue will win at the November election. A majority of voters in the United States believe that free coinage would better their condition, and they will never change their minds until it is tested. Whether or not it will be disastrous is a question, but it cannot be a great deal worse than the present uncertain condition, and possibly the sooner the experiment is tried the better.—Times-Mountaineer.

The Oregonian has been victorious in this campaign, in that it has disrupted the republican party and placed the populists in power. Of course it defeated John H. Mitchell, and that was its desire. Sylvester Penoyer will be our next United States senator. It cannot be otherwise. The St. Louis platform will be for a gold standard, and John H. Mitchell cannot inspire confidence among republicans on the platform or among democrats off it. Sylvester Penoyer will be their choice.—Independence West Side.

It seems strange that the man who will undoubtedly be the republican nominee for president hasn't the courage to open his mouth on the paramount question of the currency. Does McKinley think that the American people elect presidents merely to satisfy the ambitions of aspirants? If so, he is a woefully mistaken man. Silence is golden sometimes, and possibly McKinley expects to have his constructed in that way. But if he does he is a coward for beating about the bush in such a manner.—Exchange.
