Public Notice.

In accordance with section 3418, page 1501 of Hills Annotated Laws of Oregon, I hereby give notice that at the general election held on June 1, 1896, a majority of all votes cast were against swine running at large in Gilliam county, Oregon; and that in 60 days from the date hereof, it will be unlawful for swine to run at large in said county, under penalty of \$5 for the first offense, and \$10 for each and every subsequent offense, to be recovered from the owner of the swine by civil action in the name of the State of Oregon, before a justice of the peace of the precinct in which such owner or keeper or either of them may reside; and such penalty shall be for the benefit of, and when collected, paid into the common school fund of the county in which such action is brought, within 60 days after such animal is proved to be at large.
