Circuit court convenes here next week. There being several criminal cases to dispose of, it is expected that a large crowd of people will be present at this term.

Oscar and Blain Maley, Marion Lamberson, Ed Meek, Billy Holmes and Ray Barton all left Monday for a couple of weeks' hunting in the Blue mountains in Grant county.

We are not betting very heavily on the presidential election this year, but we are willing to wager a few cords of wood, yet in the tree, that the next president's name will be William.

The Journal errs in stating that H. P. Steers and J. R. Frazer have been subpoenaed as jurors for circuit court next week. Neither of them were subpoenaed, as both are out of the county.

Talk about no money in the country! O. S. Munger was in town several days this week, with nearly \$2000 gold coin in his jeans—the proceeds of the sale of his band of sheep to Rettie & Patterson.

If the lively little town of Heppner keeps up its present lick it bids fair to become the rival of Chicago as a paradise for divorce-getters. Last week there were ten divorce cases in circuit court in that town.

L. W. Darling and Alex Hardie made a \$100 bet yesterday on the presidential election—the former that Bryan wins, the latter that McKinley carries off the premiums. One or 'tother is liable to be out \$100 after the election.

Dr. Oglesby has purchased the Prof. J. C. Campbell property and will move in next week. He also purchased two lots in the block south of Miller's livery barn and will build a stable and buggy shed on them.—Junction City Times.

There is one state in which there is no doubt which way it will go, and that is Colorado. The democratic electoral ticket has been endorsed by the republican, populist and silver conventions, insuring a solid front for Bryan and Sewall.

The Methodist Episcopal conference concluded that they could not spare Rev. Barnhart from the circuit just now and he was appointed to preach at Arlington for the ensuing year; Rev. F. S. Johns at Fossil and Rev. R. C. Motor at Prairie City.

The Condon Brass Band has engaged the Armory hall and will give the grandest ball on Thanksgiving that has ever been given in the county. The band expects to give a concert also in about six weeks, which will be worth coming miles to hear and see.

A man in Michigan who had no confidence in banks hid \$12,000 in currency in his parlor stove. The other day his wife, who did not know the money was there, kindled a fire in the stove and the man is nearly crazy over the loss of his earnings of a lifetime.

A large attendance is expected at the ball at Condon on Friday evening of this week. The grand march will be played at 8:30 by the brass band. Tickets for sale by Ed Moore at Barker's store, \$1. The management last week decided to sell tickets, including supper, but they have abandoned that idea.

Maine held a state election last Monday and, like Vermont last week, went republican, as usual, only the majorities in both states are a little larger than usual. Arkansas had an election also last week and the democratic majority is nearly 70,000—more than double the largest majority ever given before.

The Fossil Flouring mills will commence their fall run on Wednesday, September 23d. The quality of their flour will be the same established grade as formerly. Those desiring to exchange will do well to haul their grain in early and avoid bad roads and weather. None but good dry wheat taken, under any circumstances.

Wiley Miller arrived here Friday from Looking Glass, Douglas county, and will remain here a couple of weeks putting in a crop on his excellent farm north of town. He and his wife like this section and climate much better than the valley and they expect to move back again next summer, which their many friends here will be pleased to learn.

Rev. Talmage, the greatest living divine, advises the poor people to vote for silver, because it is their cause and will give them back the property which under the gold standard has gradually slipped away from them. He believes Bryan will win, as it is a struggle between the rich men on one side and the poor on the other, and the poor greatly outnumber the rich.—N. Y. World.

A Bryan club was organized here last Saturday, and started off with a membership of 35 names, which they expect to triple before long. I. A. Henderson was elected chairman and W. A. Goodwin secretary. A number of enthusiastic speeches were made, the principal speakers being I. A. Henderson, L. W. Darling and B. K. Searcy. The club meets again a week from next Saturday at 2 o'clock.

The riskiest election bet we have yet heard of is a \$10,000 bet that a Pennsylvania man made last week that Bryan will carry that state—the heretofore strongest republican state in the union. Four years ago the state went republican by 63,747 out of 1,078,989 votes, and he feels confident that 35,000 more votes will be cast for Bryan than for McKinley. However, we believe that he will be \$10,000 poorer after the election.

Fire has destroyed the village of Ontonagon, Michigan, the former home of E. A. May, E. L. Johnson, W. A. Goodwin, and their families. The large mills of the Diamond Match Company were completely destroyed. The flames then descended into the business and residence quarter of the city and finally lodged in 105,000,000 feet of sawed lumber on the dock. The destruction of the village was complete. The loss is nearly \$5,000,000. About 1800 men, women and children are homeless and in need of clothing and shelter.

The Heppner Gazette has been waging a vigorous war against the county court of Morrow county for allowing its officers to buy all the court house supplies, instead of the court letting such contracts to the lowest bidder. It says the officers make several hundred dollars each year by ordering supplies of city firms at outrageously high prices and getting from 25 to 40 per cent off the list prices, which the officers pocket, but which ought to and would go to the county if the court would look after such business. The Gazette believes that no county can avoid going behind under such careless management, and adds that if there are any "snags" or "rake-offs" the county should get the benefit of them instead of the officers, who are already getting more than their services are worth.

Just as we go to press we learn that a frightful accident befell Mr. Johnathan Boyer while threshing at A. Hartman's ranch three miles north of town. His pants got caught on the tumbling shaft and before the machine could be stopped he was wound around the shaft in a terrible manner, breaking one leg at the thigh and injuring him internally. Dr. Hogan is attending him. Should his injuries not result fatally he will be disabled the balance of the summer. It is only a year since Mr. Boyer lost his wife, and as he has a large family of small children, this is indeed unfortunate.
