Mr. J. W. Armstrong, a farmer living near Mitchell, says the Monitor, has demonstrated this season the value of what is termed small farming. He has only a small amount of land in cultivation, but will cut 55 tons of hay, 400 or 500 bushels of potatoes, a large amount of beets, carrots, turnips, etc., also 40 or 50 bushels of apples and a partial crop of plums and prunes. But his best paying crop has been a patch of red raspberries covering about 9 square rods of ground, from which he picked and sold 857 pounds of berries, receiving therefor \$35, besides those used on his own table. This amply demonstrates the fact that a person from a few acres properly managed may make a living in this country regardless of free trade, free silver or any other popular fallacy.
