Since the last message of President Diaz of Mexico the gold papers have less and less to say about that country. He says the cash revenue for the fiscal year ending June 30th was \$50,000,000, the largest ever recorded in the history of that republic while the surplus on hand at that date was \$4,500,000, and is now \$6,000,000. At the time silver was demonetized in the United States, Mexico was bankrupt. Now she has all her debts adjusted, nearly all paid; she meets the interest promptly; has a large surplus on hand, and has expended \$600,000,000 in public improvements in the last twenty years. We are being told every day that the election of Mr. Bryan and the carrying out of the policy of the platform on which he stands would result in Mexicanizing the United States. The question is, would it not be a good thing to be Mexicanized that way?—Salt Lake Tribune.

Some criminal statistics which have just been published will doubtless interest a great many people. They give the number of murders and suicides which were perpetrated in this country in the year 1895 and they show a considerable increase in both classes of crime, as compared with the figures of the previous year. In 1890 there were 4200 murders, and last year the figures had risen to 10,500.
