CUTTING TIMBER LAND.

In the United States court Monday Elmer A. Hayes pleaded guilty to cutting government timber at Pine, Union county, and was fined \$200. Being unable to pay the fine, he was committed to the county jail for 100 days.

Speaking of this class of cases, United States district Attorney Murry said:

"A good many of these people who cut timber on government land get color of title to the land by filing a homestead entry, which costs \$16. The timber on a quarter-section of land is worth about \$1000. After the timber had been all cut the claim is abandoned. The land is of no value for agricultural purposes. Take this case, for instance. The land is on the mountain, where there are four feet of snow in the winter, which lasts from Nov. to April. You could not grow anything there. The land is valuable only for its timber. When land is surveyed it should all be designated by the surveyor, as agricultural land, or valuable only for timber, or that it is rocky, as the case may be, and a homestead entry should not be allowed on timber land. The register of the land office gets \$16 for each entry, and, of course, he is willing to take all of the entries he can get. A whole lot of timber was cut at Canemah, but since we have been prosecuting these people, there is much less of it being done."

The political fight is now fully on in Oregon. It is probable no money will be sent here from the East, but Oregon is regarded as a doubtful state in the east. In June the total silver vote on congressman was two to one for silver: On supreme judge the vote stood: Bean, republican, 40,450; Burnett, democrat, 18,623; Gaston, people's party, 26,439; total opposition 44,757; opposition majority 4,307. But judge Bean ran ahead of his ticket and Mr Gaston ran behind; so that there is a combined vote of about 10,000 over the republican vote. It is thought the gold democrats will cast 3000 votes. This would leave a margin of 7000 for Bryan, and will be increased by the silver republicans. The fight will be close with chances in favor of Bryan.

An observer who has been keeping tab on the conduct and chances of the boy for good positions with business men, writes an exchange: "Every boy is spotted, and when vacancies occur in banks or in other positions of responsibility, they do not go to those who put in their time smoking cigarettes and aping the styles of dudes and mashers, but to the intelligent lad who is anxious to do all he can for his employer. A straight, clean, manly boy never has to hunt for a job. He's always wanted."—Exchange.

Secretary Morton states that 30,000 acres of timber are consumed every day in the United States, in factories, railroads, fences, farm houses, and buildings. At this rate we will shortly have no forests left unless steps are taken to foster organization for tree planting, and yet the wanton destruction of our western forests, by fires and otherwise, goes merrily on. "We never miss the water till the well runs dry."

Secretary of State Kincaid has decided that the Bryan electors, which are to be designated as "Peoples, Democratic, Silver Republicans" on the official ballot, have the legal right to the use of the name of "Democrats," notwithstanding the objection of the so-called "National Democrats," who never held a primary or state convention, and therefore he has certified to their nominations to all the county clerks.
